Super-Forts Carry War To Heart Of Japan

Rain Bombs On Capital City

TWENTY-FIRST BOMB-ER COMMAND, SAIPAN (AP)—A mighty armada of B-29 Super-Fortresses blasted Tokyo today with hundreds of tons of bombs, opening what Gen. H. H. Arnold said was "an attack which will be carried on relentlessly from the air until the day of land-sea invasion" of Japan's home islands.

An undisclosed number of Super-Forts roared from newly-completed air bases here at dawn for the 3,000-mile flight which marked the initial attack on Japan's capital by land-based planes and its first bombing since April 19, 1942.

Gen. Emmett O'Donnell of Japan, N. Y., 36-year-old former West Point football coach, led the historic night attack, believed to be the largest ever made by land-based planes and its first bombing since April 19, 1942.

Gen. O'Donnell, who has been promoted to major general, led the 20th Army Air Force operating from the command of Gen. H. H. Arnold, President Harry S. Truman.

The first of these base south and east of Tokyo creates a 100-mile square of Japanese coastal cities.

Early reports gave no indication of the bases reported. But the Army said it received word yesterday in Washington that a Super-Fortress can carry 10 tons of bombs. Some B-29 flights are known to have made 100-plane sorties.

The tactic, known as "the carpet," was untried. Gen. Arnold's personal report to President Roosevelt said:

"Not hit and run."

"This operation," he said, "is no worse than a bombardment raid."

Hinson Over Tokyo

Charlottian Has Part In Big Raid

TWENTY-FIRST U. S. BOMB-ER COMMAND, SAIPAN (AP)—The American Super-Fortress raid on Tokyo today apparently took the Japanese by surprise, said Brig. Gen. George H. Hinson, who returned last night on returning from the attack on the Nippon capital.

The General said the Japanese had expected American resistance and that anti-aircraft fire was meager and inaccurate.

He took them by surprise again," said O'Donnell of Japan, N. Y., who led the mighty force of B-29s in the first attack against Tokyo industries.

"Certainly they were up in

Tokyo Reports 70 Planes In Attack

A Japanese Imperial communiqué reported about 70 Super-Forts participated in the raid on Tokyo today (Japanese time) and claimed three were shot down. The communiqué, recorded by the Federal Communications Commission in a Tokyo broadcast, said the B-29s raided Tokyo for two hours, starting at 12:20 P. M.

"Our damages have been slight," the Imperial communiqué said, and that report was confirmed in Tokyo. Now there are three enemy planes shot down."

Previous unofficial Tokyo Radio broadcasts also tried to minimize the damage, according to the Japanese communiqué.

Denon official Japanese News Agency said in a broadcast that the raiders carried only light mis-

sles and incendiaries and that they did not do great damage.

All bombs dropped by the enemy planes were set to detonate immediately after impact, the communiqué said.

Denon said Japanese civilian deaths were negligible, according to the Japanese communiqué.

The broadcast claimed that the bombers still were in the sky over Tokyo when the San Francisco-based broadcast was made.
