48-HOUR OFFENSIVE

Nazi Fuel Plants And Rail Yards Hammered

Seven Terrific Attacks Made

LONDON (AP)—The sixth and seventh blows in a 48-hour offensive by roughly 11,000 bombers were struck today against seven German fuel plants and the Saarbrücken railroad yards. Almost 1,300 Fortresses and Liberators with a 1,000-fighter escort smashed the targets in the Leipzig area and the Saarbrücken yards eight miles ahead of the U. S. Third Army.

British Mosquito and four-engine Lancaster bombers, based out of three bases in England, Hamburg, Zeitz and Lüneburg, about 100 miles southwest of Berlin, were hit by the waves of Fortresses and Liberators.

Eisenhower Had To Delay Attack

WASHINGTON—General Eisenhower had to delay his general offensive until enough artillery ammunition accumulated, Secretary of War Stimson disclosed today.

In a news conference discussion of the critical need for ammunition, Stimson gave this outline of the situation in Europe. "We experienced a series of artillery difficulties. First was the limitation imposed by disrupted railroad lines for the delivery of ammunition available in the ports. As the railroad situation gradually improved, the next hindrance was the incapacity of the ports to deliver the ammunition available in great Britain."

Reds Seize Rail Station Of Eger

LONDON (AP)—Russian troops have captured Eger, 60 miles northeast of Budapest in Hungary. Marshal Stalin announced tonight in an order of the day.

Eger is an important station on the Budapest-Moskva railway and a link in the main railway line between the Danube and the Baltic. The capture of Eger is a major victory for the Red Army. The town was captured after a bitter battle.

Superfort Attack Hits Jap Capital

Nip Resistance Is Ineffective

All Super-Fortresses which participated in the third B-29 strike on Tokyo Wednesday night returned to their base, a Twentieth Air Force communiqué said today.

In the three raids on Japan's capital, two Super-Fortresses were lost. The crew of one of these was rescued by a destroyer. Returning airmen reported that anti-aircraft fire was meager and inaccurate. Results were not observed because of a cloud cover.

It was a moonlight raid, but heavy clouds prevented bombardiers from sighting the target and precision instruments were used. Targets were the industrial area of Tokyo where some of Japan's heaviest war-making industries are concentrated.

A medium-altitude force participated in the raid, but the stable forces of the two previous B-29 attacks were not observed.

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Lindern Falls In Great Push Of Ninth Army

Americans Fight Through Beeck Toward Munchen Gladbach

LONDON (AP)—Ninth Army Americans captured Lindern and fought street by street through burning Beeck today up the railroad to Munchen Gladbach in the great Allied offensive cracking the Roer River line before Cologne and Dusseldorf.

Survivors of the Elite SS garrison of strategic Lindern were captured with the town 14 1/2 miles from the Prussian arsenal and rail city of Munchen Gladbach. Most of the Beeck garrison were killed; the stragglers fled toward nearby Wurm.

The First Army at the southern end of the critical 25-mile front on the Cologne plain captured Lamersdorf and Grossau and emerged from the Hurtgen Forest pinlands. Lt. Gen. Courtney H. Hodges' troops fought a seesaw battle for an Inde River bridge at Inden, winning it, losing it, and then regaining the western end of the small span.
