### VOTERS MUST MAKE DECISION TODAY

## Will It Be Roosevelt Or Dewey?

Both Appeal For Big Vote

The flood of argument—Republican and Democratic—that orators pour out to America every four years is about over for this time, and tomorrow the people will speak.

For 17 hours, over the various time zones of the country, an estimated 40,000,000 men and women have given their vote to one of two candidates, whether they want Franklin D. Roosevelt to be President for a fourth term, or whether they want Governor Thomas E. Dewey to take over the job.

THE GREAT ISSUE

The great issue—who is the better man to speed victory and guide the peace.

Both the President who was Governor and the Governor who would be President are expected to continue their remaining words largely to appeal for a big vote.

Election eve for the Vice-Presidential candidates had home, Republican Governor John W. Bickett at Columbus, Ohio, and Democratic Senator Harry S. Truman at Independence, Mo.

Spreading again of the running mates, Bickett and Truman have campaigned together and harder than any other Vice-Presidential nominees, each leading a varied assortment of workers in the field to convince the people that the election of his man is essential.

But, like voters over the country who know this fact just as well as the candidates, are also 114 candidates for Congress, Senator and Representative, and the winners will have important say in peace-making and employment.

## Roosevelt Slightly Ahead Of Dewey, Four Polls Show

NEW YORK (AP)—Four of five nationwide polls show President Roosevelt slightly ahead of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, his Republican opponent, on election eve.

The first Gallup poll, released today, gives Roosevelt 51.5 per cent and Dewey 48.5 per cent of the civilian popular vote. Gallup's 48 individual state surveys show Roosevelt with 103 electoral votes sure for Roosevelt, and ten states with 35 electoral votes for Dewey. The remaining twenty states, with 241 electoral votes, are classed as "united states," in which neither candidate leads by more than 2 per cent of the vote.

The Fortune survey of Public Opinion gives President Roosevelt 52 per cent of the popular vote, as compared to Dewey's 48 per cent. These figures were questioned by answers to "attitude questions."

SECRET BALLOT

A secret ballot poll conducted by the survey gave the President 52.5 per cent and Dewey 47.5 per cent.

Emil Hurja, associate publisher of Pathfinder Magazine and who has been identified with Republican political activity this year, said a poll which he supervised in 25 counties in fifteen states indicated Dewey's election by an electoral vote of 361 to 167 with the New York Governor getting 52 per cent of the popular vote.

Other polls were unchanged from previous announcements. The Crossley poll gave the President 52 per cent of the popular vote. A Newsweek Magazine survey listed 20 electoral votes for Roosevelt and 247 for Dewey—Pennsylvania listed as undecided, was not included.

## Great Air Siege Of Reich Goes On

LONDON (AP)—More than 1,800 American bombers and fighters attacked industrial targets in Western Germany again today as the Allies carried the mightiest bombing siege of the war into the third straight day.

The main target area of over 1,100 Eighth Air Force Liberators and P-51 Mustangs for the day was the Ruhr region. Other targets included industrial and rail objectives in the Ruhr Valley.

The bombers were escorted by 700 Mustangs and Thunderbolts.

STUTTGART ATTACKED

British Mustangs bombed and dived into southern Germany and attacked the rail city of Stuttgart late last night to keep the enemy's lines of communication open.

A force of probably more than 700 British Lancasters and Halifaxes with their bombs and incendiaries attacked the city of Stuttgart, a second day of the attack, with German fighters in the Ruhr valley.

Heavy bombers of the Italian-based U. S. 15th Air Force dropped a heavy concentration of explosives on an important power station at Bolzano on the Brenner Pass railway in northern Italy.

Other American bombers from the Mediterranean attacked military targets in the Vienna area and in northern Yugoslavia.

Eastern Front

Premier Joseph Stalin has announced Germany is on the verge of catastrophe. Stalin held the invasion of France as the big reason the Red Army was able to drive the Nazis from the soil of Russia.

He declared that a total of 120 German divisions have been destroyed during the past year.

A great crowd gathered in Moscow today to celebrate the 24th anniversary of the Russian Revolution and to honor Stalin, president of the United Nations, for his leadership in the war.

Red Army forces now are battling the Nazis in the suburbs of the Hungarian capital, Budapest. The Germans say that Soviet forces around Budapest are preparing and reinforcing for the final assault on the city.

Home Front

American voters will name their next President tomorrow. Both candidates will make final speeches to the nation. Dewey will make a broadcast speech at 11 this evening, RCTV, and President Roosevelt will make a broadcast speech at 10:30 p. m. tomorrow.

The enemy still holds the village of Schmidt, two miles south-east of Veszprem. But it is believed that enemy casualties in the Schmidt area were heavy today.

American and British aircraft carried over Germany to great strength today, hitting the Nazis from both the west and south. More than 1,000 American bombers and fighters led off the day's assault with heavy attacks on oil refineries in the Hamburg-Harburg area and objectives in the Ruhr Valley.

About 150 fighters escorted British heavy bombers followed in over the Ruhr, with one of the heaviest attacks on the city of Gelsenkirchen.

## Soviets Two Miles From City's Heart

Powerful Russian Encirclement

LONDON (AP)—Furious fighting raged in the suburbs of shell-torn Budapest today as heavy Russian infantry forces joined armored vanguards which had penetrated the defenses of the Hungarian capital from the north and south on the east side of the Danube River.

The German radio announced early today that Soviet tanks crashed into the southern metropolitan limits, only two miles from the heart of the city, while a Bucharest broadcast said other Red Army units, racing around the eastern edge of the capital, shored the northern suburbs through Ujpest.

At the same time Red Army troops threatened to cut a bridgehead across the eastern fork of the Danube, just south of Budapest. The bridgehead, across the island which divides the river into two arms for 30 miles, was the main objective.

FREE TO RUSSIA

The city's German and Hungarian defenders were being captured at the rate of 1,000 a day in the southwest, the Budapest radio announced.

Moscow announced Hungarian reports quoted by Bucharest indicated the bulk of the German and Hungarian forces were fleeing to the western part of Budapest.

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OPTIMISTIC—Marshal Stalin, head of all the Russians, said today that Germany is "on the verge of catastrophe."

STALIN SEES END FOR NAZI GERMANY

LONDON (AP)—Germany is "on the verge of catastrophe," Marshal Stalin declared tonight in an address in which he said Russia, the United States and Great Britain have "made plans for a secure peace."

It is not enough to win the war, he said, we must make a future "impossible" for the enemy.

He declared that a Moscow broadcast announcing the end of the Russian Revolution.

He hailed the invasion of France as the operation which ended the Red Army's drive to the German front.

In a 42-minute review Stalin predicted the end of the war.

The United Nations face a new, more serious, more difficult victory, but a firm peace organization to give the world a new era of peace.

The only way to create a new world is to create a new world, he said, and the United Nations to preserve peace and security.

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## Germans' 15th Army Mauled In Allied Push

U. S. First Army Keeps Up Pressure From Hurtgen To Schmidt

LONDON (AP)—Allied assaults threw the Nazis back across the Maas today along a 50-mile front to the sea—marked only by two small enemy pockets. British field officers declared the German Fifteenth Army had been half destroyed in the fierce West Holland offensive that began two weeks ago.

As the British and Canadian armies drew up to the water barrier sixteen miles south of Rotterdam on a potential new assault line, the British estimated that 65,000 Germans had been killed, captured and wounded while being driven northward from 25 to 15 miles.

Declaring Field Marshal Walter Von Model's 15th Army had suffered a "serious setback," British Army spokesmen said British and Canadian forces had bagged 25,000 prisoners in the drive that opened north of Antwerp on Oct. 22. The campaign freed 1,200 square miles of Dutch territory and 570,000 Netherlands. Already Allied dived and minewepers were clearing the West Schelde approach to Antwerp.

Yon Model attempted to defend southwestern Holland and the sea gate to Antwerp with an army of approximately 110,000 the British said.

Of the 25,000 prisoners, 13,000 were taken in the pocket south of the Schelde, and 8,000 on the Schelde islands.

There is no doubt Von Model's 15th Army has been greatly depleted, a British Army spokesman said, but that he has been mauled into serious defeat. His divisions have been cut to almost a quarter their strength.

The Allies hold all the south bank of the Maas from north of Scherpenheuvel to the sea except for two small pockets, each four miles long and two miles deep. The bridgehead at Mook and Willemstad, 16 miles south of Rotterdam.
