

France Asks For Pacific War Role

WASHINGTON (AP)—France has told the United States it would like to contribute forces for the battle of the Pacific.

Two important questions involved from the French viewpoint are (1) the status of French troops in the Pacific and (2) lend lease after the defeat of Germany.

France is determined to retain these colonies and American policy appears in support of this view.

LEND LEASE MOVE
The United States is now completing a draft of a lend lease agreement to be negotiated with Gen. Charles de Gaulle's national committee, but actual talks have not yet begun.

The draft is similar to agreements signed with other United Nations. The only lend lease arrangements with the French so far are an agreement signed with de Gaulle in 1941 covering French colonies outside of Africa, and a modus vivendi written last year on French North and West Africa.

The question on whether France will participate in the Pacific war and thus receive lend lease remains open in this draft, however. But American policy has been to include in campaigns those of the United Nations particularly concerned.

There is also a possibility that lend lease to the French in Europe will be continued after defeat of the Nazis on the basis of the occupation of Germany.

The French have expressed publicly their desire to participate in the occupation of Germany, particularly the Rhineland, the European Advisory Commission has begun consultations with de Gaulle's representatives on this subject.

Veteran Of Two World Wars Dies At His Club

NEW YORK (AP)—Lewis R. Stuyvesant, 42, of Tranquillity Farms, Alhambra, N. J., formerly of the U. S. Consular Service in India, died yesterday at the Knickerbocker Club.

Stuyvesant served in the First World War and was a member of the de Gaulle force in the current war after being in the American field service. Returning to this country, he entered the Marine Corps from which he was discharged last year.

A graduate of Princeton University in 1927, he was the son of the late Rutherford Stuyvesant and Princess Karaman Chikina of Belgium.

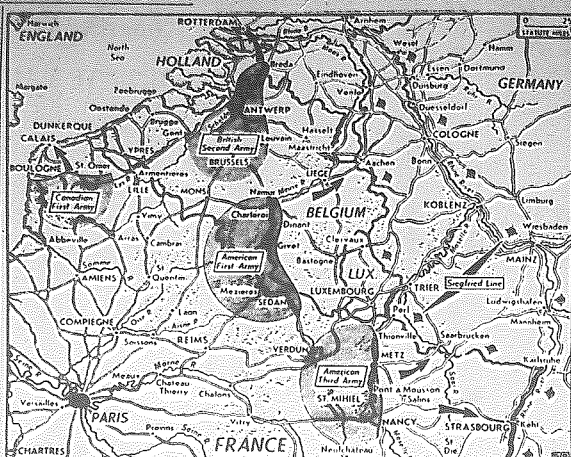

"Chicken Overseas, Army Style," will soon be a tentative piece of resistance on the menu at overseas field hospitals and Air Corps Centers, an announcement from Col. C. L. Woodward, commanding officer of the Charlotte Quartermaster Depot, revealed today.

The chickens, which are frozen, will be frozen and shipped "ready to cook" to the overseas field hospitals and Air Corps Centers. Col. Woodward estimates that chickens prepared in this manner will save 30 per cent in weight and an appreciable amount of shipping space.

Pilots Amaze Generals In Supply Deliveries

POPE FIELD—Panes of the Troop Carrier Command which in the early days of operations took the Himalayan hump in stride, flying through some of the world's most rugged terrain, are proving vital in Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's battle against the Japs in the China-Burma-India Theater.

Stories of how the transport planes winged their way over the "hump" and behind enemy lines to deliver equipment, food and ammunition are now being told by the pilots themselves, offering a new angle on the story of the First Troop Carrier Command, of which Pope Field is an installation.

Among the pilots returning are men with as many as 100 trips of transports in that area. In February of this year, delivery of troops on the front lines, behind enemy positions, rose to the formidable total of 5,600,000 pounds. This was in addition to the 10,000,000 pounds of supplies and equipment being moved forward and evacuated the dead, wounded and sick.

On one occasion, Gen. Merrill ordered emergency delivery of mortar and automatic weapon ammunition for his heavily-armed jungle fighters. The squadron, which had developed a technique for such an emergency, made a night flight to deliver the ammunition and food. With no regard for the weather and upon two hours' notice, the squadron's ships headed out on a hazy, dark night through the rugged mountain passes of the Kukuang Valley to deliver the emergency cargoes.

In a citation for that feat, Gen. Merrill said: "Your hard work made it possible for us to do our job." Another general, so enthusiastic that he didn't bother with military wording, simply wired the squadron commander: "All of this headquarters are damned proud of you."

The squadron arrived in China early in February, 1943, supplied the Fourteenth Air Force for six months and then moved to India to fly thousands of food missions to Gen. Stilwell's Army and to Gen. Merrill's Marauders. In addition, its planes also supplied British troops in Burma.

During the period of Feb. 12, 1942, to June 20, 1943, the squadron completed 1,176 trips over the "hump" without loss of equipment or personnel. In April and May, 1943, it was credited with flying 60 per cent of the tonnage over the "hump" with only 10 per cent of the tonnage over the "hump."
