## Northern Capital Taking Over Mills

Vital elements of Southern business are beginning to view with alarm the current unprecedented grabbing of Southern cotton textile mills by Northern capitalists.

This means the advent of relatively large-scale absentee ownership and probabilities of shakeups in the management which heretofore were headed by men of the South. Various indications point to the probable investment of considerable totals of "refugee" and other foreign funds in the South's cotton factories.

The cotton trade and the numerous industries at Charlotte, which are tying their fortunes directly in dealings with the mills, are taking the gloomy view of this marked change. A general feeling of uneasiness is unappreciable. Widespread disruption of long-established business relations between mill managements under the absentee ownerships and their suppliers appears inevitable—that is the real basis for the gloomy view.

**FAMILIAR MERGER**

Cotton textile industrial leaders and dealers in the industry's securities explain uniformly that this wave of buying of mills is a process of "integration." In effect, it is another form of the familiar "merger." The aim of integration is to effect a balance of productive capacity for each of the various divisions within a single corporate operation.

An outstanding case of mill buying at astonishing prices was this, one of a half dozen or more similar deals recently involving North Carolina companies by central Northern corporations paid the record price of \$669 per \$100-par share for the entire issue of a Rockingham company's common stock.

Available reports indicate that this integration is being accompanied by cutting the various, highly important and profitable business relations in Northern cities, the loss falls upon the South's spot cotton dealers, the warehousemen, the distributors of mill supplies.

## Gal Looking For A Job Should Take Tip From Air Line Scout

CAIRO—(AP)—American girls looking for an interesting postwar career might take a tip from Gladys Entekind, who is talent scouting for flight hostesses. Entekind, who is to fly the world's air lanes, says Gladys, who is chief hostess of TWA's International division, is one of the original "glamor girls" of the "clouds" and is still going strong after ten years of shepherding nervous passengers across the skyways.

Since she joined the first TWA hostess class late in 1935 she has spent more than 8,000 hours of her attractive life in the air and flown some 1,500,000 miles. That's equivalent to 60 voyages around the globe or six round trips to the moon.

"I am the only one of that original class left," she said. Most of the rest became casualties—to marriage, to flight hostesses' schedules, or to the service before they leave in the lurch of the wedding ring. And contrary to popular belief, the majority of them don't marry pilots. The pilots generally already have set up housekeeping.

**PRETTY AS P-38**

Gladys is petite, blue-eyed and dark-haired, and had to stand up very straight to make the old air-minimum of five feet one inch to get her first job. She weighed 95 pounds then. Now she is up to 112, but no unbiased observer would say it was a pound too much. She is pretty as a P-38.

Today Gladys would have difficulty in landing a job as flight hostess because with the advent of steeper planes they looked for taller girls. They went from five feet two to five feet six inches now, with a top weight of 120 pounds. Other qualifications are a nurse's certificate or one year of college training, pleasant disposition and ability to dress neatly. Starting pay is 150 bucks monthly, and raises come regularly.

Girls average about 85 hours a month in the air—more in Summer when schedules are heavier, and less in Winter. Gladys says fear of accidents affects them little after the first few flights. She herself has never been even in an emergency landing.

She is a native of Coatesville, Penn., and took up flying after graduation from the University of Pennsylvania.

## U. S. Given Red Protest On Bulgaria

### Drafting Reply To Moscow

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A new tension beset Russo-American relations today with Radio Moscow charging the United States violated a Big Three agreement on Bulgaria and is working to sabotage it.

The State Department has not yet acknowledged receipt of the sharp note from the Kremlin, but the Soviet broadcast reported it already had been delivered, and responsible officials here said privately that a reply already was being drafted.

The development capped an unsteady week which already has seen the United States register protests with Moscow on the situations in Iran and Manchuria, in line with the new sterner policy for international relations.

**BYRNES IN SPARTANBURG**

A State Department spokesman said there probably will be no official comment on the Soviet blast until Secretary Byrnes returns to Washington. Byrnes reportedly was at his home in Spartanburg, S. C. for the week-end.

Officials admitted privately, however, that the State Department is preparing a global list of trouble spots which may possibly extend to include Bulgaria, had considerably widened the gulf of misunderstanding between this country and Russia.

The Bulgarian affair developed this way:

At the Moscow conference of Foreign Ministers, it was agreed Russia should give friendly advice to Bulgaria to broaden its Communist-dominated government to include two members from opposition parties.

Oppositionists declined Cabinet posts subsequently offered, however, on grounds they would be mere fig-leaves with no real power.

Thereupon, the Bulgarian Government—with Russian backing—declared it had no further responsibility for carrying out the Moscow decision.

In a communication to Bulgaria made public Tuesday, the United States said it was disappointed in the oppositionists.

It said the U. S. never understood that pressure was to be applied to opposition parties to nominate two candidates for "pro forma" inclusion in the government.

It said, with no real functions to perform.

Furthermore, the communication said, the U. S. held the view that the participation of the oppositionists should be under conditions similar to those in the case of Nikolai V. Novikov, charge d'affaires of the Soviet Embassy, deposed last week.

He said he had been trying to bring about a stabilization of the Bulgarian political situation so that the country could be accorded British-American recognition.

The spokesman's disclosure of Britain's stand followed Russia's.

## Tragedy In Britain

### 34 Killed When Grandstand Falls

BOLTON, Eng.—(AP)—A grandstand crash killed 34 persons, by police accounting, at a championship soccer game attended by 70,000 here today. Many others were injured.

Two retaining walls gave way in the grandstand sending a wave of spectators surging forward. The first of the spectators who fell were blanketed by new waves of the crowd tumbling through broken barriers.

Bodies were piled four deep in places, and some were swept into the playing field.

**TWO WOMEN DIED**

At least two of the dead were women.

Private cars augmented the fleet of ambulances and police and fire vehicles used to carry the casualties to the Bolton Hospital. Spectators who had been perched from companions at the game crowded the street outside the hospital seeking information.

The crowd witnessing the game surpassed the previous 69,812 record for the Burden Park Stadium set in 1933.

Today's game, between Bolton and Stoke City, ended in a scoreless tie. The Bolton Wanderers, however, moved into the English Football Association Cup semifinals with an aggregate score of 2-0 since they had defeated the Stoke City team in the first leg of the quarter-finals last week.

The first crash of the stand was impossible across the field and not until ambulances arrived to rush casualties from the area did it settle over the cheering crowd.

**PLAY RESUMED**

The accident suspended play for a minutes while casualties were removed. The game was resumed later when a referee cleared the field.

Part of the grandstand, with a 2,000 seating capacity, is used by the Ministry of Food for storage purposes.

## 49,000 Die In Hupeh

CHUNGKING—(AP)—A Chinese dispatch reported today that famine and pestilence had claimed another 49,000 lives in southern Hupeh Province adjoining Hunan Province, the "rice bowl of China," where even worse conditions were described by UNRRA officials this week.

A semi-official dispatch said the Central Government garrison and civilians in Tungking, southernmost section of Hupeh Province, faced starvation. The dispatch blamed a thirteen-day strike by Communists, there was no elaboration or confirmation from other sources.

**SUPPLIES NEEDED**

Meanwhile the Kuomintang National Party Congress was told by Minister of Food Hsu Kan that China faced a serious food shortage and that supplies were needed urgently from the United States and Canada.

He ascribed conditions to a general collapse of village economy, had communications, a lack of means to transport food to famine areas, and the feeding of Japanese prisoners.

To alleviate the situation he suggested a quickening of the Japanese repatriation program, disbandment of puppet forces, utilization of every possible means to rush food to stricken areas, and faster movement of UNRRA shipments.

CHUNGKING—(AP)—Central News Agency said today Russian troops had withdrawn completely from Mukden and that fires had broken out in several parts of the city, largest in Manchuria. There was no elaboration of the reference to fires.

**Americans May Seek To Make Manchurian Study**

SHANGHAI—(AP)—The possibility of an overture to the Russian commander in Manchuria in the interests of permitting American military officers to enter that area was mentioned today amid unconfirmed reports of a large scale Soviet troop withdrawal north from Mukden.

A source close to General Marshall, special U. S. Envoy to China, said that an invitation to the Russian commander to appoint Soviet representatives on truce terms for Manchuria might overcome opposition to American entry.

**TRAINERS LEAVE**

The reports of the withdrawal from Mukden came from the Chinese Central News Agency, which said 22 Russian troop trains had left that largest Manchurian city for the north since Thursday. The reports suggested that the long delayed Chinese government forces from Manchuria in favor of the Chinese may be begun.

If the Russians accept an invitation to participate in such truce teams in Manchuria, however, it would be questionable if the American member could hold the chairmanship in each case as in China.

It can conceivably be increased considerably with the intervention of a second American member, the settlement of China's civil strife.

Strangely enough, the Chinese Communists rather than the Central Government are pressing their case for General Marshall's committee of three—Marshall, Gen. Chen, a Communist, Gen. Chang Chun, Central Government—to take over disputed areas of Manchuria.

**MARSHALL PETITIONED**

The No. 1 Communist, Mao Tse-tung, has joined other leaders in petitioning General Marshall to extend truce team activities there where large groups of Communist and Central Government forces still are maneuvering for advantageous positions.

There is no doubt that General Marshall and his two committees are most anxious to visit Manchuria and see conditions there. A source close to the committee said, "but that is unlikely now."

## Way Open For Pauley

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Big, scrappy Ed Pauley wouldn't say "yes" to the Navy's offer to let him lead the way on a mission to the Gulf of Mexico to investigate the withdrawal of his nomination to be Undersecretary of the Navy.

As hearings on the appointment headed for a sixth week, a Senate Naval Committee member who declined to be quoted by name said the withdrawal may come next week after an expected conference between the nominee and President Truman.

But Edwin W. Pauley was emphatic that he has no intention of quitting until he is personally satisfied that he has blatted all the testimony offered against him and his reputation is cleared.

In this vein he told reporters that to him confirmation to the important Navy post has become "a lesser issue" than vindication of his integrity.

**WILL ANSWER CHARGES**

"I'll be here until every single charge is answered and until I feel that a majority of the committee is satisfied that there is no basis for the accusations against me," he declared.

"I won't even consider the matter of a withdrawal until all of the evidence is in," he said.

Considerable confusion prevailed as to what the exact score was. Pauley's opponents declared yesterday he had backed down on an informal agreement to abandon his fight for the Navy post. Senator Charles McNary, Republican, one of his chief critics, used the words: "A grand double cross." But McNary's Broadcaster, System reported later that Pauley still intended to withdraw from the contest after presenting his case.

## Disgruntled Personnel Hit

### New War Dept. Policy Upholds Firing Of Men From Army Paper

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Army personnel who "lack loyalty to the Government and Constitution of the United States" are to be barred henceforth from "sensitive duties" by the War Department last night as including assignments connected with atomic energy.

These duties were defined by a new War Department policy announced at officer candidate schools, aviation cadet training, and cadets in connection with testing of atomic energy.

In announcing the new policy, the Department upheld in effect the authority of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters to remove two staff members of the Pacific edition of the Stars and Stripes. The service paper is published under the War Department's information and education division.

The men removed were Sgt. Kenneth L. Petrus of Chicago, managing editor, and Capt. Bernard D. Rubin, Waterbury, Conn., columnist. Their transfer from the Pacific Stars and Stripes staff was accompanied by the assertion that they had been Communists and each had "at times" favored his public writings with Communist thought.

Petrus denied he ever had been a Communist. Rubin said he had resigned from the party before his induction.
