

\$48,000,000 Improvements Four-Year Med School Is Provided In Proposal

RALEIGH (AP)—Without an opposing vote, the House passed today and sent to the Senate the \$48,000,000 permanent improvements bill that among other things, calls for a four-year medical school and teaching hospital at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

Duce's killer, and know he was terrified under the name of 'Col. Valerio'."
