

Accident Injuries Fatal to Former Canajoharie Man

CANAJOHARIE, July 9.—Funeral services were held yesterday morning in Herkimer for Lewis Hall, 29-year-old manager of the Mohawk Valley Concrete Company plant in St. Johnsville, which is affiliated with the Burgess Construction Company here.

For 10 years prior to his recent transfer to St. Johnsville, Mr. Hall

had been employed by the Burgess Company in Canajoharie and near-by communities, where he is remembered by many acquaintances. He and a fellow-worker, Carl Winch, were en route to Plattsburgh for a holiday fishing trip last Thursday, when a taxicab crashed into the rear of Hall's stopped car as he was examining the motor. Removed to a Glens Falls Hospital, he died there Friday evening. Winch escaped with minor injuries.

The funeral service yesterday was attended by business associates and friends from Canajoharie. Burial was made in Oak Hill Cemetery, Herkimer.

(Editor's Note: Our Hal Boyle, returning from a two-day absence, insists he is the first man to come back alive from a trip on a "flying saucer." You may take his story or leave it.
