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Eisner Is Jailed To Awaiting Deportation Hearing Government Forces

Fugitive Red Denied Bail In Britain

U. S. Admits Ship Seizure Threatened

LONDON (AP)—A London magistrate today sent Communist Gerhart Eisner back to jail for at least eight days to await a hearing on whether he will be returned to the United States as a fugitive from justice.

Eisner refused bail by the Bow St. Court, which ordered him "remained in custody." He jumped \$2500 bail to the United States and fled as a runaway. He now must show cause why he should not be extradited.

Eisner's counsel offered "substantial" surety in his bail plea, but Magistrate J. W. Eastwood said Eisner "has been convicted of a crime" and is a "political" character.

Eisner's counsel has never been a member of the Communist Party of America, said the attorney. "He is and has always been a German National."

On a speech at a dinner in New York City, Eisner said he was not the No. 1 Communist. I am not an average Communist individual.

While the hearing was going on, members of the House of Commons argued about the Eisner case. One Labor member said, "I am not a Communist. I am not a Communist. I am not a Communist."

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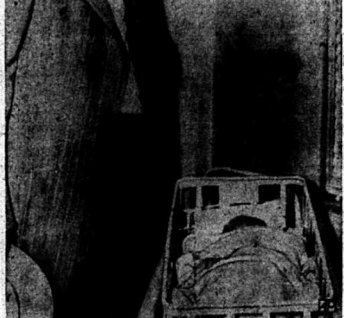
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'KISSING JIM' IS FATHER

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Democrats Hopeful Of Housing Victory

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democratic leaders hope to hand President Truman this week at least one major victory in his program. They are hoping for a new housing bill.

The House tentatively set a vote for Thursday or Friday on the administration's multi-million dollar housing bill. It calls for a far-ranging program of slum clearance, low-rent public housing and farm housing aid.

House passage would head the legislative toward the President's desk. The Senate approved it April 21 by a 70-20 vote.

However, there still is a possibility the measure may be delayed in the House Rules Committee. Moreover, Republicans are expected to try to amend it before it reaches the floor.

Others slowed
Meanwhile, other parts of Mr. Truman's program still sit rough or slow going.

In the first four and a half months of this Congress Mr. Truman has seen passed only one major bill based on his domestic legislative proposals of the 1948 political campaign. That one, compelling retroactive aid to military and naval personnel, is a number of years.

Now, with only two and a half months remaining before Congress is supposed to adjourn, here is about the way other portions of his program are getting on:

Four Killed As Tornado Hits Texas

Storm Smashes Amarillo Area

AMARILLO, Tex., (AP)—A skipping, whipcracking tornado chewed up a four-square mile area in Southern Amarillo last night, killing four people. About 70 were injured.

It was the first destructive tornado in the 25-year history of this Panhandle capital of 102,000 people.

Dawn found Red Cross and volunteer workers still picking their way through acres of shambles. It looked as if the big, black, swirling mass had dipped in, stirred everything up, and then sped it around.

Although many sections of Amarillo were hit, the tornado's most destructive blow fell on the southern area, dotted heavily with new homes of veterans. A near-cloud-burst and hailstones as large as marbles added to the damage.

HELP COMES
Ambulances and highway patrol units from Amarillo and a 200-mile radius, bringing injured to the crowded hospital. Red Cross people in from St. Louis.

To property damage may be added heavy loss to crops in the wheat and sorghum fields. Part of the state which just up to the neck of the Red Cross.

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Even When Inflammatory Right Of Free Speech Upheld

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court split 5-4 today in declaring the right of free speech exists even when the utterances stir people to anger and unrest.

The majority opinion prompted a speech by Justice Jackson that "if this court does not temper its doctrinaire logic with a little practical wisdom it will convert the Constitutional Bill of Rights into a suicide pact."

The case involved a \$100 fine imposed on Arthur Terminiello for a speech he delivered in the Chicago Auditorium Feb. 7, 1946.

Terminiello appealed from an Illinois Supreme Court decision upholding his conviction on a disorderly conduct charge. The Illinois court said he made "wild, intemperate and inflammatory speech."

Justice Douglas delivered today's majority decision. Chief Justice Vinson wrote a dissenting opinion. Justice Frankfurter wrote a dissenting opinion.

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Dollar Shortage Easing Truman Reports Europe Gains

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman today forecast a 30 percent slump in the critical dollar shortage in Europe by the middle of this year.

He coupled with his report a "satisfactory progress" a warning that the Federal Reserve Board "extensive" economic expansion and

reform if they are to become independent of American aid by the end of 1953 when Marshall Plan dollars are to give out.

His sum-up was in a report to Congress on the European Recovery Program during the last quarter of 1948. Mr. Truman also said that the Marshall Plan had advanced in China had a "disastrous" effect on the economic and political position of Nationalist China and had thereby helped the Communists.

Realization of production and the Marshall Plan's external position may be anticipated.

The total dollar deficit of the 1948-49 European Recovery Program countries on capital and current account was \$2.5 billion. The deficit for 1949-50 is estimated at \$3,500,000,000.

Federal Official Sees Reuther

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Government stepped into the Ford strike today.

It assigned Arthur C. Visk, Detroit conciliator, to keep in touch with the union—company negotiations and authorized him to sit in on them, or stay out, whichever seemed to hold the most promise of speeding a settlement.

He conferred here with Walter C. Reuther, president of the striking CIO United Automobile Workers.

A. C. Reuther announced he would confer by telephone with Henry Ford, president of the Ford Motor Co.

China already had stepped into the Ford strike, sending a telegram to both sides last week urging that if they did not reach a settlement, the Government would have to take a hand in settling the dispute.
