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CLYDE HOEY'S 'NEW LOOK'

The editor of *The Asheville Citizen*, Don Sherrill, writes in a special article from Washington that Senator Clyde R. Hoey, who personifies the Old Look in his dress and general demeanor, is giving Washington *The New Look* in investigations.

Recalling some of the sensational, headline-smashing investigations of the recent past by both Senate and House Committees, Senator Hoey has expressed his purpose is to probe the "five per centers" in going off with dignity and decorum. "Nothing like that has happened in a long time," says the Asheville editor, adding: "Senator Hoey has different ideas. He is chairman of a subcommittee charged with studying the antics and habits of the 'five per centers.' No white hot television lamps. No tub or table thumping.

REFLECTIONS ON VOTING HABITS

The statisticians have had time to do a little more figuring on the recent Virginia Democratic primary. What they have found out is a distressing commentary on the state of politics generally, not only in Virginia.

Slightly more than 315,000 voters turned out to participate in the hottest primary Virginia has had in many a year. Yet this was something less than half the total number of registered voters, and about 17 per cent of the population of voting age.

The Washington Post, in a completed series of articles, points out further that the victor, John S. Battle, got only about 20 per cent of the number of registered voters and less than 8 per cent of the number in the state of voting age. The second man, Francis Pickens Miller, got nearly 17 per cent of the registered voters.

Says The Post: "It is not unreasonable to suppose in the light of these figures that the state of Virginia imposes a powerfully inhibitive influence on the voter. The obvious fact of what passes in Virginia for a holy contest primary campaign, Virginia was not interested in the outcome. NOW that the ECA has finished before the Senate, it is timely to take a look at the legislative process by which this result was achieved. Salaries For Teachers

Editor, The News: SOME time ago a salary raise for our public school teachers was reported. I wish to convey a thought about our teachers which I feel to be of great importance to all our citizens, for in one way or another we are all affected by their work. The matter I have in mind is the fact that our teachers must measure up to a state standard before they can start in any sort of remunerative work as teachers. I wish it might be possible for our state school officials to sit down and evaluate the time, hard work, and special study it takes for one to prepare for this most important task. I have gone over some figures recently pertaining to the financial details of schooling and training for our public school teachers, such as board and room, high tuition, motor cars, and clothing, not to mention many other things, that come equally as high.

In face of these facts I have compared the wage scale of other lines of employment, such as truck drivers, bus operators, and cotton mill workers, which demand very little, if any, special education and training, and yet the scale of salaries of the last-mentioned is from 30 to 50 per cent higher than that of our teachers.
