Truman Calls For Steel Truce Extension

President Appeals To Both Sides

Direct Bargaining In Dispute Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman, walking to block a week-end steel strike, today asked (1) six more days of truce, and (2) direct bargaining between union and the steel companies.

In a letter to both sides, Mr. Truman said:

"I am sure that the national interest requires, and the American people have a right to expect, an early settlement.

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They probably won't stay that long. "Around Nov. 1" is the target date of Congressional leaders for final adjournment.

Despite messages sent to Democratic members last week by party leaders, the House doesn't plan to transact any major business this week. Party spokesmen explained that the recall messages merely were intended to ensure the presence of a quorum, 211 members.

Republicans followed through with their plan to bring up the military establishment, the Interior Department, the foreign economic recovery program and some miscellaneous Federal agencies.

Pending legislation, however, those agencies are being financed on a temporary basis until they can be reauthorized.

Still another appropriation bill will be introduced to finance the foreign arms-and-ammunition program, and now being debated by the House.

What other legislation will be given preference during the rest of the session probably won't be decided until the President's budget is introduced.

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Delivers U. S. Policy Speech

Acheson Sees Peaceful Solution

NEW YORK (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson today reaffirmed his belief that East-West differences can be ended peacefully, but warned that a solution will not be quick or easy.

In a solemn American policy speech before the United Nations assembly, Acheson promised the 50 national delegations the United States is ready to do its part.

His declaration blamed Russia for the "profound sense of insecurity" which he said has engulfed large areas of the world and has led to such steps as the formation of the North Atlantic Alliance.

CITIES ASSEMBLY'S TASKS
It is the main task of the Assembly, he said, to try to solve the problems which lie behind the cold war.

"I pledge for the United States that we will do our part to a concerted effort to this end," he said.

Acheson made no direct appeal to Russia for a general settlement, but did call for Soviet cooperation on several specific problems.

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Only 400 Negro Units To Be Asked

No Housing For Whites In Plan

Further public housing in Charlotte was drastically reduced today when the City Council, by a six to one vote, authorized application for all advance of Federal funds for construction of only 400 dwelling units for Negroes except in the Negro section.

The Charlotte Housing Authority had proposed a program of 1,200 additional Negro units and 200 white units and had requested the Council to approve its application for \$2,000,000 in Federal funds to finance the plan and to acquire the land.

High Commission Takes Over

Military Rule Ends In West Germany

BONN, Germany (AP)—Military Government rule in Western Germany ended today when it was replaced by a high commission of the United States, Britain and France.

The ceremony opened with a speech by the American High Commissioner, General Lucius D. Clay, who said the military rule was a necessary step during the war.

The occupation statute was a "new chapter in German postwar history," he said.

The High Commissioner, however, asked the chancellor to consider, as soon as possible, making revisions that would allow the Germans still greater freedom than they now have under the statute.

He said that members of the High Commission "will do our best to fulfill the terms of the statute."
