Reds Not Trying For War Truce, Hodges Charges

Still No Buffer Zone Agreement

MUNSON, Korea.—A United Nations force negotiator said today "we're busting our guts trying to get this war settled" but the Reds are making "no attempt to get a reasonable solution."

The statement came from Maj. Gen. Henry I. Hodges, chairman of the U. N. truce subcommittee, during a recess in the sixth joint subcommittee session at Panmunjom.

The negotiators met three hours but failed to make headway toward creating a Korean cease-fire line. Another meeting is scheduled tomorrow (7 p. m. Tuesday EST).

The Communists continued to press their proposal that would trade indefensible territory in West Korea in the Ongjin area for important military positions along the battlefield. No progress toward a solution was made.

At Panmunjom, within sight of burning leveled Seoul, Hodges said the Communists "have made no trade, no offer, no attempt to get a reasonable solution."

"They say they will withdraw from the Ongjin and Yonan peninsulas. This is absolutely meaningless. It makes no difference to us and it makes no difference to them. There isn't any armistice."

The two peninsulas are west of the battlefield. They protrude below the 38th Parallel, old political boundary line between North and South Korea. Ongjin is cut off by water from the rest of South Korea.

DEFENSIBLE POSITION
The Allies want U. N. troops left in a defensible position along whatever cease-fire line is created for the armistice. Their latest proposal is for a 2½-mile wide buffer zone along present battle lines.

Under the Reds' counterproposal, U. N. troops would be reduced to five to 15 miles southward from their present ridges.

Hodges said the Communist negotiators objected to giving up Kae-nung, former site of truce conferences, as asked in the U. N. proposal.

"They said that we (Allied troops) are not anywhere near the line," Hodges commented. "That is true today. Prior to the negotiations last July, our people were in as much control of the area as the enemy."

Egyptians Prepare For Underground War
CAIRO, Egypt.—The British cut traffic for five hours today on the highway between Cairo and Ismailia, British base at the mid-point of the Suez Canal.

Stevadores Return To Military Piers

NEW YORK.—(AP)—Insurgent stevedores ended their boycott of military piers today, but other dock workers still marched in the dock strike which has immobilized the world's biggest port.

For the first time since a billion-dollar, sixteen-day waterfront shutdown began, defense loading and unloading jobs apparently were fully manned by regular longshore workers.

Picket lines disappeared from the military docks in Staten Island, Jersey City and at Brooklyn's huge Army base, where more than 500 rebel strikers straggled back to work.

But elsewhere along the pier fronts, the police detained only one on Hudson River pier and a non-striker succeeded for a second day in circumventing the picket barriers.

At Pier 90, where the big British liner Queen Elizabeth II is being loaded with military supplies, police shut out 250 strikers heading back to work.

Here and there, fistfights flared about the dock. But there was no general disorder. Police detained one picket temporarily.

The more than 20,000 strikers, many in Boston, are in revolt against a new contract and have

defied orders of Joseph Ryan, president of the AFL International Longshoremen Association, to return to work.

But while Ryan was being challenged by his own East Coast stevedores, he himself was changing the leadership of West Coast longshore boss Harry Bridges.

Bridges' union has held on despite the domination of the West Coast stevedores contract.

John J. Sampson, leader of the wildcat dock strike, agreed yesterday to the lifting of the blockade of military cargoes, but a 10-day strike will stand until and continue the strike's "against other shipping."

Sampson's statement somewhat dimmed earlier hopes that a settlement was near. The promising signs had come in a statement by a New York state mediator, in the strikers' agreement with the Army, and in a back-to-work vote among Staten Island longshoremen.

Customs officials said last night that a record 122 vessels and 132 pilots were immobilized. They added that non-striking longshoremen attempted to work only one of almost a score of ships that arrived here yesterday.

3 Vessels Burn After Collision At Buffalo

Great Lakes Skipper, Helmsmen Heroes
BUFFALO, N. Y.—(AP)—Twelve seamen were reported dead or missing today after a freighter struck a gasoline-loaded barge and a resulting explosion set three vessels ablaze in Buffalo harbor.

The Coast Guard said a charred mass of debris in the cabin of the tug, doubtless probably contained bodies. At first, the Coast Guard had reported the mass was a pile of at least four bodies.

Three bodies had been recovered earlier. The Coast Guard listed nine other bodies as missing.

The Great Lakes freighter was named the Erie. The oil barge Mgratia shortly after 3 P.M. (EST) last night, and the barge loaded with 80,000 gallons of gasoline showed the freighter and the tug, which was pushing the barge, into Buffalo harbor.

Two crewmen from the Penobscot and one of the two barges were listed as missing.

Capt. Louis Guyette of the Penobscot and his helmsman, Roy Haskins, both of Port Huron, Mich., died heroically in their jobs as the freighter's pilot house. His body also was recovered earlier.

At least six of the 40 crewmen reported missing. The other six vessels were injured, apparently not seriously, the Coast Guard said.

They were damaged by the burning barge. They rammed their vessels' sterns into the dock, so that several crewmen were able to slide down a rope to safety.

"The captain saved us, the captain saved us!" screamed Jimmy Haskins, who was in the deckhand shipping for the second time. Straws streamed down his cheeks.

Edward Myers, 37, a watchman on the Penobscot, and old hand on the lakes, described his skipper's heroism:

"The old man and Roy stayed in the tower, put her in reverse and sent her back toward the dock. He was both dead when we rammed the dock. It had a line and about 12 of us slid out in it."

The bodies of Guyette and Haskins were found in the forward deckhouse.

Thousands watched from the north harbor area and was reported to have come from the Erie.

The flames lapped about 300 feet skyward and swept over the barge, flooding the fore section of the freighter.

Conscientious Objectors' Beliefs Key, Judge Rules

HUNTINGTON, W. Va.—(AP)—A Federal judge has ruled it's what you believe, not what church you belong to, that determines if you are a conscientious objector to military service.

The decision by Judge Harry E. Watkins of Fairmont, W. Va., might have repercussions on the draft law. The established principle has been that you must belong to a church specifically opposing military service to qualify as a conscientious objector.

Coins Sees Our Army At All-Time Strength

TOKYO.—(AP)—Gen. J. Lawton Collins said today the United States next year will have its largest peacetime army in its history—equal to 27 divisions—with the call-up of three more National Guard divisions and 100,000 reservists.

The Chief of Staff did not name the three divisions to be called up. Collins indicated the 27-division force might not be evened out. He said America's armed strength would be dictated by the situation in the world.

Collins made the statement at an informal gathering of officers of the 27th Army Corps and the Japan Self-Defense Force at Sasebo, near Northern Command at Sasebo. A release from Corps headquarters said Collins listed the 27-division army at 12 Regular Army divisions, nine National Guard divisions including three to be called, and regimental-sized units to make 27, which broke windows in Las Vegas.
