Leaves Stolen Car Trail

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union showed off a bristling array of tactical weapons of atomic capability today in the long-awaited parade marking the 40th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution. There was no display of missiles of intercontinental or intermediate range.

The biggest weapons displayed were a pair of what appeared to be single-stage rockets looking to be 20-25 feet long, with a range guessed at 400-500 miles. The big puzzler of the show was a pair of giant mystery guns of unusual design and seemingly capable of firing shells with atomic warheads. Today's parade seemed to emphasize greater mobility and harder hitting power for the Soviet arsenal.

Moscow radio, in its broadcast about today's parade, said the Soviet Union showed off a "new type of artillery based on the principle of jet propulsion." It added: "According to the information displayed among the diplomatic corps and foreign representatives, one could but guess at the performance of these rockets."

Most Western military men said they were stumped by the big guns. "They just don't add up," one of the best informed said. "The rockets appear to be heavy for their carriages and recoil."

They estimated the outside diameter at 16 inches with a bore probably ranging from 12 to 14 inches. The muzzles were covered by cloth caps.

Soviet Notes Date Without Trip To Moon

WASHINGTON — If the Soviets celebrated their 40th revolution anniversary last night with another fabulous space venture, there is no sign it was a trip to the moon.

This was the word this morning from the U. S. Naval Observatory, where scientists kept an especially close watch through last night. "We had the moon under observation all night," said Cmdr W. M. Robinson, acting superintendent of the observatory. "Nothing showed up on it."

Actually the American astronomers had their scopes trained on the moon anyway in connection with studies relating to the multinational International Geophysical Year program. Last night being a busy time with their regular program.

The Russians themselves have given no indication of immediate plans to reach the moon. It was too big for the usual session in the Cabinet room and was shifted to the broadcasting room in the basement of the White House.

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Three-State Hunt Pushed For Slayer

Kentucky State Police have thrown roadblocks around a little town of Lancaster today and started a farm-to-farm search for a man believed to be the heartless killer of two North Carolina state highway patrolmen.

The killer still has not been identified. The man, which has been extended into Kentucky from Tennessee and North Carolina, moved into the Lancaster-Richmond, Ky., area following positive identification today of the killer's car abandoned last night in Chattanooga.

State troopers and Garrard County police officers believe the man may be on foot. They found a 1957 Dodge abandoned 40 miles northwest of Lancaster early today. The car was the third new automobile the high-speed killer had wrecked in his perilous flight 225 miles north from Chattanooga.

The killer may be on foot, police officials say, since the last car—which he rammed into a telephone pole—was abandoned and no other autos have been reported stolen in the area.

Blood stains were found in the high-powered 1957 Chrysler stolen in Chattanooga last night and abandoned in Stanford, Ky., early today.

Blood stains were also found in the Dodge, the car he last abandoned. Police officials also said firearms were found in the Dodge.

Police reconstruct his headlong flight this way: He abandoned the 1957 Oldsmobile around midnight last night in Chattanooga, Tenn. The car has been positively identified as the car used in the getaways from the murders of Pfc. W. L. Reese near Elberne and Pfc. J. T. Brown near Stanford Tuesday night.

After abandoning the Oldsmobile, the killer apparently stole a high-performance Chrysler 30-C, a car capable of making up to 140 miles per hour.

Leaving Chattanooga, the murderer headed north over US 77, the mountain-climbing Chattanooga-Cincinnati highway.

Over two hundred miles north of Chattanooga at Stanford, Ky., the Chrysler was wrecked and abandoned.

CHEVY WRECKED
Then the killer stole a Chevrolet and headed toward Lancaster, just a few miles away. Somewhere less than ten miles, this car was wrecked also.

But the driver made it into Lancaster and pulled up to the rear of Elliot Motor Co., a Plymouth-Dodge dealer.

He entered the rear of the building by breaking into a glass window and reaching inside to release a door latch.

At 4:30 a.m., Lancaster police spotted the abandoned and beat-up Chevrolet.

He then stole a new Dodge and headed toward Kentucky highway 32 and Richmond, Ky.

About four and a half miles outside Lancaster he drove the car into a pole and abandoned it, leaving behind some firearms.

IN THAT AREA
Telephone reports to the News from Lancaster, Richmond and Lexington, Ky., say Kentucky State Police believe the killer is hiding in the neighborhood.

They say there are no reports of stolen vehicles there.

The killer, who apparently has been driving at top speed, appears to abandon cars rather than stop at filling stations.

North Carolina State Highway Patrol Maj. C. A. Speed said a Bible and gloves were found in the Oldsmobile abandoned in Chattanooga.

Robert Terry Jr., a Negro hitchhiker who witnessed the first murder, earlier told police he left the Bible and gloves in the killer's car.

Meanwhile, State Highway Patrolmen rushed Terry to Chattanooga to positively identify the 1957 black Oldsmobile he drove from North Carolina.

The escape car bore Pennsylvania plates and Penn State Police reported the license plates were stolen from Joseph Babayk Jr. of Carrollton, Pa.

They also said a hardware store at nearby Barnesboro, Pa., was burglarized on Monday night or early Tuesday morning and it believed the burglar used the Olds in his getaway.

The car was found filled with luggage, a .22 caliber pistol, a 44 Magnum pistol and ammunition for a 30-30 rifle.

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MacArthur Gets Boost For Job

WASHINGTON — Sen. Butler (R-Md.) today urged President Eisenhower to recall Gen. Douglas MacArthur to duty and give him full command of a unified missile and rocket program.

In a telegram to the White House, Butler said Russia with her earth satellites has won the first victory in a challenge for control of outer space. At the same time, he said, the Reds have scored a great propaganda success and "brought fear to the hearts of free people."

Chief responsibility for that situation, Butler went on, rests on intense rivalries within the U. S. armed services in the rocket-satellite field.

It is imperative to eliminate the jealousies which keep these programs "grounded," Butler said. He added that the job requires a man with "a shining sword of proved capacity," a knowledge of the inner workings of the military establishment and "the confidence and respect of all Americans."

Butler nominated MacArthur as the "one man who stands out" in those respects.

In retirement, MacArthur is chairman of the board of Sperry-Rand Corp.
