BUDAPEST — Hungary's Communist regime today accused Col. Weiwei F. Dallam Jr., U.S. Air attaché here, of photographing military objectives. It ordered him to leave the country within a week.

### Death Toll 13

BREST, France — The death toll in the flaming collision of an American-owned tanker and a Greek freighter off Brittany mounted to 13 today. Another sailor was listed as missing.

### Flee Before Fires

LOS ANGELES — A brushfire, roaring out of control in southern Riverside County, today raged eastward and homes in Dawson Canyon near Corona. Residents were ordered evacuated.

### Fight Short-Cut

WASHINGTON — Southern senators protesting what they called "a legislative lynching" fought today against a parliamentary short-cut in handling the House-passed civil rights bill.

### Bomb Ban 'If'

WASHINGTON — U.S. officials said today the United States is prepared to offer suspension of atomic weapons tests only under a first-step disarmament agreement providing also for halting production of nuclear weapons.

### Arms Plan Agreed

WASHINGTON — South Korean Ambassador You Chan Yang said today he understands the 16 allied powers have agreed on a program for modernizing weapons in South Korea.

### Peace Hunt Urged

WEST BRANCH, Iowa — Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission said today "the chief humanists of our day" from all countries should meet to seek a plan for world peace.

### Trial Delay Denied

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Court of Appeals today denied any new delay in the conspiracy-bribery of Teamsters Midwest boss James R. Hoffa. The trial resumed this afternoon and proceeded with selection of a jury.

# Her Letters Took 'Flying'

NEW YORK — Nine-year-old Janet Capron airmails letters like no one else in the world. She just tosses them out of her fifth-floor Park Ave. apartment. And she gets answers.

It started innocently enough on April 24, Home because of a cold, and feeling lonely Janet penned a couple of letters.

SHE SIMPLY addressed them "Dear Somebody" and tossed them out the window. Within a reasonable time she received answers: One from Rangoon, Burma, and the other from Ft. St. John, Alaska.

Janet's first reply came from Ft. St. John, Alaska. The writer, Lt. Frederick H. Magee, opined that Janet might be surprised by getting a letter from "somebody far away." But after all, Magee wrote, "mysterious things happen in this world."

"I know what it's like not having letters," he wrote. "It can be very lonely. So don't let it get you down. There are many people in this world who are lonely."

THE NEXT letter came from Rangoon and began: "As I was sitting down under a palm tree in front of my house, your letter came blowing into my lap, driven by the first monsoon wind."

The writer, begging off his inability to write English well, said the letter was written by an uncle named Min Kahun.

The letter deliveries and answers are explicable. When Janet tossed her letters out the window two months ago, a neighbor, David B. Magee happened by. He figured it might be good fun to send the letters off to his two sons, in Burma, Frederick, at Ft. St. John, and Christopher, stationed with the United States Information Agency in Burma.

They wrote Janet as the "elder" brother suggested. "I know what it's like not having letters," he wrote. "It can be very lonely. So don't let it get you down. There are many people in this world who are lonely."

## Hungary's Freedom Will Strengthened

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — A U.N. committee said today that the people's will for independence in Hungary "has only been strengthened" by the Soviet Army's unaided suppression of the uprising in that country last October and November.

But the General Assembly's special committee on Hungary also declared that Soviet arms "disarmed" the Hungarian majority for political rights and fundamental freedoms now.

It said that the Communist regime of Premier János Kádár, installed by the Russians, has no popular support and that rigid Communist controls "immediately removed by the uprising" are being reimposed step by step.

### THE ACCUSATION

In a 291-page report to the assembly, the five-member investigating committee accused Soviet troops of indiscriminate slaughter of women and children, mass arrests, summary executions and thousands of deportations. It said estimates of Soviet forces in Hungary varied from 75,000 to 200,000 men with 1600 to 4,000 tanks.

The committee reported that many of the soldiers apparently were Mongols and Tartars from Central Asia who had been told they were being sent to Egypt to throw back "Anglo-

## 48 Others Are Hurt In Storm

FT. BRAGG, N. C. — "The ground was sizzling — just burning up."

Thus one soldier described the encampment of a National Guard division on its Army paratrooper base last night after two bolts of lightning, less than 10 minutes apart, killed two guardsmen and injured 48.

The Army identified the dead as Sgt. J. C. Walter Lee, Milam, 26, and Pfc. Arthur Belton Norris Jr., 19, both of Kannapolis.

An Army spokesman said four of the injured men were admitted to the hospital as patients, none seriously hurt. Those admitted and their injuries:

Pfc. William D. Deal, 17, of Newton, upset stomach; Lt. Col. Alvin R. Hillebrand, 47, of Durham, injured eye; Sp. 5, H. Wyatt Jr., 29, of Mocksville, moderately sprained back; and Sp. 3, Webster J. Linker, 42, of Concord, admitted for observation and rest.

The base hospital called in off-duty personnel to handle the 48 patients who poured in for treatment for five or six hours after the fierce electrical storm swept across Ft. Bragg. Field aid stations gave first aid treatment on the spot.

### BEAR BRUNT

Units of the 30th (Old Hickory) Division of the North Carolina National Guard bore the brunt of the storm's attack. The 10th Paratrooper Division was encamped for summer training in a wooded area 10 miles west of the main portion of the base.

Striking at supersonic, the lightning skipped around the bivouac area as many of the soldiers stood in a row, axes kits in hand.

"The men in front of me were knocked down like bowling pins," said Pfc. Gary Truesdale of Hickory. "My metal mess gear was launched from my hand and bent at all of shape."

Capt. Joseph E. Orland of Kannapolis recalled the ground shook something terrible and his feet felt like the ground was sizzling — just burning up.

Then Capt. Orland took off his shoes to see if the lightning damaged his feet.

I just put my bare foot on the wet ground when another bolt struck like the first one. That bolt stunned both my legs and hip, and I was knocked to the ground along with other people in the tent," the captain said.

He remembered much of what happened after that. I was brought to the hospital here and with the exception of a funny feeling in my head, I was all right. An Army spokesman said four of the injured were admitted to the hospital as patients, none seriously hurt. The other injured remained in the hospital overnight to catch up on their sleep before returning to their units.

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa. — The pretty blonde daughter of a Swedish air attaché and a Senate page boy — whose parents learned they were rushing into romance too fast — emerged from 18 days of hiding today only to run a road of a highway speed patrol.

## Japan's Favor Asked Of Court In Girard Case

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department today appealed to the Supreme Court from a decision barring the government from interfering with William S. Girard to the Japanese for trial.

A petition to the nation's highest court said the decision by U.S. Dist. Judge Joseph C. McCarrahy was "clearly wrong."

The petition said the "public interest in an early disposition of the case" is so great that the high tribunal should act at the earliest convenient date.

By implication, there was a request in the petition for the high court to handle the case before taking its recess.

The petition noted that an appeal had been filed in the U.S. Court of Appeals here, but said the government wished the Supreme Court to take the case at once so that an early final decision might be had.

"The overwhelming likelihood is that the United States will be in full compliance of holding respondent's trial without delay and expects him to be turned over promptly."

### DOUGLAS GONE

The Supreme Court has planned to adjourn for the summer next Monday, and Justice Douglas already has left Washington for the West Coast preliminary to a summer tour of the Middle East.
