Volcano Explodes

JAKARTA (AP)—More than 1,500 villagers fled from the Merapi volcano area in Central Java today after the mountain threw out clouds of ash that blotted out the sun. Other villagers in the region were being evacuated.

Algiers Rocked

ALGIERS (AP)—A dozen sharp earth tremors shook the Orleanville region of Algeria throughout the night, rocking the area where some 1,000 died in a 1954 quake. There was only slight damage but many Orleanville residents poured into the streets in near panic.

Youth Sentenced

ROCKVILLE, Md. (AP)—David Hall, 15, who admitted slaying a classmate during an argument after a sledding party last January, was found guilty of second degree murder early today. He was immediately sentenced to 18 years in the Maryland Penitentiary.

Trial Ordered

DETROIT (AP)—Lawrence Richard Turner was ordered held for trial yesterday on a charge of first degree murder in the June 12 sex-slaying of 6-year-old Mary de Caussin.

Tremors Reported

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—Strong earth tremors were reported in Chile early today. There was no immediate word of any casualties or damages.

10 Climbers Killed

PONTRESINA, Switzerland (AP)—Ten Italian mountain climbers, including two women, were reported killed today in one of the worst mountain accidents in years. They crashed down some 600 yards and must have been killed instantly.

Shootings In Cuba

SANTIAGO DE CUBA (AP)—A score of fire-bombings and sporadic shooting here last night emphasized sympathy in certain quarters for Fidel Castro's rebellion against the government of President Fulgencio Batista.

Reds Shell Quemoey

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Chinese Reds fired 19 shells at Quemoey today. The Nationalist Defense Ministry here said no damage or casualties resulted.

Rail Service Out

NEW YORK (AP)—All Long Island Railroad service along a 5.8 mile stretch between Pennsylvania Station and the Winfield section of Queens was halted today by a fire in a Long Island City powerhouse.

Here is his eyewitness account.) Take a close look at Cameron. Walk through the main street. Tip-toe over fallen power lines. Walk through the ruin that was once a neighbor's house. Pick up the shoe of a dead wife. Look at a couple of bodies. It is an indescribable scene. Move on. Tears and shows of emotion after yesterday's revelation of the vast destruction and loss of life gave way to a numbness today.

'I'm Going Back And Rebuild...'

LAKE CHARLES, La. (AP)—Henry H. Ratcliff sat on the edge of his army cot, took a long drag on a cigarette given him by the Red Cross, and vowed that "with the help of the Lord, I'm going back to Cameron and rebuild my house."

"I'm going back to Cameron," Raymond Barber is going back to find his family. They are all dead. Barber, 37, a chief engineer on the "Silver Star," a fishing boat, lost his wife, Margaret, and three children, aged 12, 10 and 7.

WAREHOUSE DAMAGED

The winds blew a plate glass window out of a furniture store and the front out of a newly constructed tobacco warehouse. Trees were blown down and limbs were scattered all over the streets. No injuries in Greenville were reported.

WILL REBUILD

Most say they will go back to their towns and rebuild. The 34-year-old Ratcliff is a routeabout for Pure Oil Co. "I had a home and everything that goes with it," he said as he sat shirtless, without shoes and with jeans speckled with mud.

TRIPS DOWN

Allen said a few trees were blown down in the county and a few limbs in the city, but there were no injuries. Power lines were knocked out but property damage was fairly high.
