Panama Bound

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army today ordered Col. John C. Nickerson, convicted of divulging missile secrets, to a routine job in the Panama Canal Zone. He will be deprived of his privileges of rank and command.

Torture Told

PARIS (AP)—An international commission which toured French prison camps in Algeria reported today French troops had been guilty of torturing Algerian nationalists. But it added that such practices were not general.

Dam Bill Stalled

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Reclamation Subcommittee today voted 19-2 to defer action on the Senate-passed Hells Canyon dam bill until Feb. 1. The action appeared to be the end for this congressional session of the issue authorizing construction of a high federal dam on the Snake River between Oregon and Idaho.

Testing Changed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershhey said today only one college qualification test will be offered in the next school year instead of the three given in previous years.

Fire At Pole

TOKYO (AP)—Fire struck Japan's Antarctic base camp at the South Pole yesterday, burning down one hut and destroying files of observation data, radio reports from Ongul Island said today.

British Threat

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP)—The British threatened today to step up their air strikes against rebellious tribesmen in Muscat and Oman unless the rebels stop their fight against the British-ruled Sultan. If the rebels don't give up, "a responsible British source said, 'the air attacks will be increased considerably.'"

Japs' Plea Spurned

TOKYO (AP)—Communist China announced today it had rejected a request by the Japanese government to locate some 35,767 Japanese missing on the Red mainland.

Cabinet Resigns

TUNIS (AP)—The Tunisian Cabinet resigned today to give newly named President Habib Bourguiba a free hand in charting the future of the republic proclaimed yesterday.

New Protest Seen

LEWES, England (AP)—Dr. John Bodkin Adams was fined \$2,330 today for violating laws covering larceny, cremation and dangerous drugs. He pleaded guilty to 14 of 16 charges against him. The 58-year-old society physician, acquitted last April in London of a charge that he drugged a wealthy patient to death to profit from her will, pleaded innocent to the other two counts against him here, and the court dismissed them.

South To Fight For Rights Jury Trials

Filibuster Use Seen In Offing

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) said today Southern Senators will use "every weapon in our arsenal" to defeat the civil rights bill unless a jury trial amendment is adopted. His unmistakable notice of a filibuster—although he didn't use the word—was sounded after President Eisenhower sent word to Republican senators he opposes this or any other major change in the bill's section on voting rights.

ALREADY STRIPPED

The administration measure already has been stripped by a 52-38 Senate vote of a section to empower the attorney general to seek federal court injunctions to enforce civil rights other than voting privileges. The big issue now, as the Senate nears the end of a third week of debate on the House-passed bill, is whether to require jury trials in some contempt of court cases arising from the enforcement of voting rights under another section of the legislation.
