DETROIT (P)—Police said a 16-year-old boy rammed a 30-inch steel-tipped hunting arrow into his father's chest today as the elder man argued with his wife in the bedroom of their home on Detroit's north-west side.

Action Expected

WASHINGTON (P)—Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) said today he expected Attorney General Brownell to be "constantly pressed" by Vice President Nixon to use the full powers of the civil rights bill against the South.

File Bill Passed

WASHINGTON (P)—The House today passed, 314-0, a compromise bill aimed at preventing defense lawyers from searching freely through FBI files. This sent the measure to President Eisenhower.

New Flu Reported

WASHINGTON (P)—The Public Health Service today said new outbreaks of influenza were reported last week in five states, but most of the cases have not been confirmed by laboratory tests.

Ready To Quit

WASHINGTON (P)—The House today notified President Eisenhower at noon it had completed its business and was ready to adjourn. This is a required formality before the House ends a session.

Missile Tests

WASHINGTON (P)—Russia was reported today to have fired at least four long-range ballistic missiles since June and to have tested many more of shorter range over a longer time.

Plotting Charged

CAIRO (P)—Eighteen Egyptians have been arrested on a charge of plotting to turn Egypt into a Communist state, the newspaper Al-Ahram reported today. The report said they would be tried in a military court.

Device Fired

ATOMIC TEST SITE, Nev. (P)—Scientists detonated an atomic device aloft today in what was termed a "pure test" for scientific purposes. It flashed across the sky at 7:40 EST.

Governor To Fight S. C. Rights Probe

COLUMBIA (P)—Gov. Timmerman promised today he will not cooperate with any civil rights investigation commission that may be created and come to South Carolina. He told a news conference the creation of the commission under a civil rights bill passed yesterday by Congress would be "a mockery of the Constitution" which protects all rights. The governor also lashed out at President Eisenhower's civil rights stand as "a disgrace to the office he holds and I think history will so report it."

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (P)—Segregationist John Kasper didn't do so well in Tennessee's capital city. The self-described "professional rabble rouser" from the north came to Nashville several days ago to combat first grade grammar school desegregation in the city school system.

Stassen Says Reds 'Serious'

WASHINGTON (P)—Harold Stassen arrived from London today, and said he would report to President Eisenhower that he believes Russia is still "seriously negotiating" for an East-West armament agreement. Stassen, presidential adviser on disarmament, told newsmen on landing at National Airport that "no one should feel that any agreement is just around the corner."

He Gets Good Meal, Also A Jail Ticket

HONOLULU (P)—Noel K. Kaai has found a fool-proof method for getting into jail—where he says he feels at home. The 56-year-old unemployed laborer was released from a one-month term for refusing to pay for a meal he ate at a restaurant. Kaai walked straight to the Star Cafe and ordered freely from the menu. When the bill arrived, he announced he had no money. The proprietor offered to accept his hat for security while he went to get some money. Kaai firmly declined, and asked he wouldn't move until the proprietor called for a police officer. Kaai drew 60 days.

Final Senate Vote Is Overwhelming

WASHINGTON (P)—The first civil rights bill to pass Congress in more than 80 years was on its way to President Eisenhower today. The Senate completed congressional action on the compromise measure late last night after 39 hours of continuous session, passing it by an overwhelming 69-15 vote. The House had passed the bill last Tuesday.

House-Passed Aid Bill Far Below Request

WASHINGTON (P)—The House today passed and sent to President Eisenhower a \$3,433,810,000 foreign aid money bill. This is a billion dollars below Eisenhower's original request. The House action cleared from Congress the last equal appropriation bill for the current fiscal year—and perhaps the most disputed one. The Senate passed the compromise measure last night, 58-19.

EXPECTED TO SIGN

Although the President has indicated his disappointment that the measure does not carry more money, he is expected to sign it. The bill totals about one billion dollars less than the \$4,400,000,000 originally asked by Eisenhower, and is well below the \$3,800,000,000 he later said was indispensable.

Boy, 14, Explains Stabbing: '... Had An Urge To Kill'

CHICAGO (P)—Police said a 14-year-old boy fatally stabbed the father of a schoolmate early today and told them he did it because "suddenly I had an urge to kill." State Atty. William Guild of DuPage County identified the boy as Clyde Walker of suburban Flowerfield. The victim was Pasquale Arthur Capitelli, 36, of suburban Lombard, assistant administrator of Presbyterian Hospital, Chicago.

ATTENDED PARTY

Guild said two hours before the slaying young Walker had attended a party at which Capitelli's daughter, Consuelita, 13, also was a guest. Walker and Consuelita are classmates at Sacred Heart elementary school in Lombard. He said the boy related in a statement: "After the party broke up I went home and went to bed but couldn't sleep, so I got up and started walking around."
