

\$6,800 Taken At Pisto Point On Gaston Payroll

Nervous Youths Flee Toward South Carolina

GASTONIA—Two boys about 16 years old held up the assistant paymaster of Myrtle Mills here this morning and fled toward South Carolina with the plant's entire payroll, \$6,839.33.

The boys, one of whom brandished a pistol in a shaky hand, made their getaway in a 1952 or 1953 black Ford, which they had backed up to the mill's payroll office, a white frame building about 30 feet from the mill.

The employees were to be given their envelopes at 1 p.m.

At 10:30, the gunman, a sandy-haired youngster who spoke with a "southern accent," entered the payroll office.

"He had a pistol — it looked like an automatic," Mr. Dellinger said. "He told me to 'hand it over or I'll give it to you.'"

"He told me to 'lay down on the floor, flat down and said, 'You stay there 'til I get out of here.'"

"I was in the office by myself, so I did what he told me."

"Some ladies in the front of the office saw him run out and get into a black Ford."

Mr. Dellinger said the payroll was in a small wooden box and the gunman grabbed it up in his left hand, continuing to hold the pistol in his right.

The car, which bore South Carolina plates, roared off toward Gastonia, witnesses said.

York County (S.C.) police and South Carolina state highway patrolmen immediately set up roadblocks. The Gaston County police department put every car to work cruising the county in search of the getaway car.

State highway patrolmen in Gaston County concentrated men on roads in the southeastern and western areas of the county.

Ray Moore, special agent in charge of the Charlotte office of the FBI, said the Federal officers will enter the case if it more than \$5,000 of stolen money is transported across a state line.

He said he has warrants against Curran in Gaston County against the holdup men and they cross a state line to avoid prosecution.

He said the FBI is in close contact with the Gaston County authorities.

Local police received information the black Ford had crossed the South Carolina line about 10:45 but thought later in the morning the youths could have backtracked toward Gastonia.

Mr. Dellinger said that at 10 a. m. a young man between 18 and 19 had walked in and asked questions.

He said the man was dressed in a suit and tie and carried a briefcase.

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Mayor Egan (Center) Is Arrested And Escorted To Aurora Jail

School Plea Taken Under Advisement

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A federal Appeals Court took under advisement today a request to permanently block the use of Little Rock High Schools as private, segregated institutions.

The three judges of the U.S. Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals gave no immediate indication when they would rule on the case.

Judge Joseph W. Woodruff ordered the clerk of the court to maintain the status quo until the court's decision is reached.

The 60-year-old mayor wouldn't leave until bond for four college youths had been posted. They had been arrested when they refused to disperse from the mayor's emergency citizen's meeting. Police broke up the meeting, declaring it an unlawful assembly.

The stumpy little mayor put up a brief struggle.

Egan had called the meeting to organize a law enforcement group to replace the city's 68-man police force, which he also has fired.

He was in the midst of a tirade against the world in general and Police Chief Donald Curran in particular when the chief and eight policemen walked into the courtroom.

"We got 10,000 people in America going back than anything they've got in Russia," Egan told the crowd of about 400. "And that Curran is the worst criminal in the whole world. He's worse than Khrushchev."

Curran, speaking over a portable loud-speaker, denounced out the mayor's words, as he said, "Mayor Egan, I arrest you in the name of the law for disorderly conduct and creating a disturbance."

"You'll hear about this," Egan shouted as the cops seized him. "This is going to be the most costly thing you ever did."

The crowd booted as the policemen grabbed Egan and took him down stairs and put him in a cell. About an hour later a friend posted \$200 bond and he was told he could go home.

He was later released. He wouldn't leave, he said, until similar bonds were posted for the four youths arrested on similar charges.

At 12:30 a. m., bond was posted for the college boys. Egan still refused to leave. He said he would stay until his 220-pound body guard, V. L. Stevenson, 59, of Chicago, was released. Police, however, held Stevenson for investigation and refused to let him go.

Egan, under persuasion from his wife, finally left the jail at 12:45 a. m. He ducked out a side door and got into a car.

The mayor's troubles with the police erupted about three weeks ago when he fired Curran and the police department put every car to work cruising the county in search of the getaway car.

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28-Year-Old Killing Told By Farmer

SOCASTEE, S. C. — A 59-year-old Horry County farmer who says his only remaining desire is to live the rest of his life "for God" has admitted a 28-year-old slaying, police reported.

Horry County Sheriff John Henry said Hubert L. Smith of Socastee admitted the fatal shooting of Alvie Cox in 1930 while they were in separate boats on the Horry side of the Little Pee Dee River, near Sandy Bluff.

The sheriff quoted Smith as saying he asked Cox to sell him some fish but that Cox cursed him and replied, "I haven't got any fish for you. You've been wanting to go with my wife, but I have something else for you."

Smith was 21 at the time of the shooting. He married two years later and has five children.

Henry said Smith has been repeatedly in the hospital since he was 22 because of his nervous condition.

Rich Backer Figure in Temple Blast

ATLANTA, Va. — A big-brother anti-semitic terrorism figure today in police investigation of the \$200,000 dynamiting of the Jewish temple here.

This financial angle of a fanatic hate-mongering ring was mentioned in one of two letters received at a police station today of five persons held for questioning about the early Sunday explosion.

Detective Capt. R. E. Little described the other paper as a scribbled draft of a letter addressed to an Atlanta Jewish leader before the Temple blast.

It said: "You will soon witness a terrifying experience."

"The detectives did not say precisely where either letter was shaken up considerably by the Jewish leader was ever mailed in the local citizens."

The officers said they are attempting to locate five men other than the five already held. They said an unidentified sixth man, a resident of Detroit, Mich., was subjected to questioning "when he began to spout off while in jail on another count."
