HAMBURG, Germany (AP) — The International Transport Workers Federation today ordered a world-wide four-day boycott of 1,200 "cheap flag" ships from Dec. 1 to Dec. 4. The word went out to refuse port facilities or to load or unload ships registered in Panama, Liberia, Honduras and Costa Rica.

8 Miners Saved

BANCROFT, N. C. — Eight Rhodessa (R.) rescue workers dug through a mud wall 900 feet underground today and released eight African miners who had been trapped for 36½ hours. Two miners were killed. Hot soup was sent to the survivors through a tube thrust down a two-inch drill hole.

Ship In Tow

PANAMA (AP) — A Panama Canal salvage tug today was towing the 3,500-ton Danish ship Hans P. Carl to Balboa after it was disabled by a boiler explosion off the Pacific coast of Costa Rica.

'Strong Action'

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Philippine leaders today threatened strong action to get custody of a Filipino Communist leader whose Indonesian Embassy has caused a street riot.

U. N. Group Blessed

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John XXIII today received a U. N. group which included representatives of Communist, Moslem and Hebrew countries and gave his apostolic blessing "to all present who wish to accept it."

U. S. Will Ask Reasons For Denunciation

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States will ask Polish leader Wladyslaw Gomułka to explain his move in joining Russia to denounce American policies as endangering world peace. Gomułka's remarks made Wednesday after talks in Moscow with Premier Khrushchev, have disturbed top State Department officials. Authorities are particularly upset over his outspoken support for new Soviet demands for an end to four-power control of Berlin. His denunciation of "American imperialism" returned at a time when Poland has appealed for more economic aid to bolster its shaky economy.

30 STITCHES

SHORT TALK

The two boys were carried to Memorial Hospital in an ambulance and treated for the serious cuts. Police were on the scene shortly after the cutting but executive officers at the police station didn't find out about the incident until Tuesday morning when a questioner by a News reporter. The injured boy said he thinks there were four boys and three girls inside the car. "All of them were drinking," he said, "the girls, too." Police learned the cutting one of the most serious to occur in Charlotte in a long time among teen-agers.

Virginia Area Combed For Killer Of Women

Thugs Kill Banker, Take 8 Gs

NEW YORK (AP) — A 48-year-old bank manager was shot and killed today as three robbers took \$8,000 to \$10,000 from a Queens bank. A customer in the bank received a leg wound. Police identified the manager as James F. Dugan. The robbery, after which three bandits escaped by car, was staged shortly before 11 a.m. at the United National Bank of Long Island, located at a busy shopping intersection in the Richmond Hill section of Queens.

STOLEN CAR

The bandits fled in a 1958 black Chevrolet sedan, which had been stolen in Nassau County. The auto was found abandoned at 89th Ave. and 123rd St., a half mile from the bank, a short time after the robbery.

DESCRIPTION GIVEN

One was described as male, white and weighing about 145 pounds. The second was described as male, white, 45 years old and weighing 180 pounds. He was wearing a dark coat and hat and sunglasses and was armed. First alarm came from deputy fire chief Paul Rusch who was driving a dark car in his official automobile. A clerk rushed from the bank and handed Rusch, reporting that the manager had been shot in a robbery. Rusch called the fire communications headquarters in Queens, which notified police. Patrol cars were sent racing to the scene. FBI agents also headed for the bank.

Rider Decline Cited Bus Fare Raise Request Unopposed

RALEIGH (AP) — The vice president of Charlotte City Coach Lines Inc. told the State Utilities Commission today his company had hoped to continue the present fare schedule for several more months, but a recent strike "made this course impossible." Merl C. Morrow testified at a hearing on the company's application for authority to increase its adult cash fares from 15 to 20 cents and to change the adult tickets or tokens from seven for \$1 to six for \$1. "No one appeared at the hearing to oppose the proposed fare increase," Morrow said. The principal reason for the proposed increase "is the persistent decline in the number of bus riders." He pointed out that for the 12-month period ending Sept. 30 his company carried 1,077,377 fewer adult revenue passengers than during the same period of 1957.

ODD CENTS INCONVENIENT

Morrow told the commission that an odd penny fare of 15 or 19 cents would be inconvenient and would cause delays in transportation schedules. The company cited figures showing that during the 12-month period ending Nov. 30 it expected to wind up with net income loss of \$12,838 under present fares. If the increase is granted, the company estimated it will have additional revenue of \$177,000 before taxes. Morrow told the commission that a 26-day strike of drivers and mechanics in October was costly to the company. When urban transit facilities are not available, riders turn to other means of transportation. He said "some of these riders will return to the system in coming months; many of them are lost forever." Morrow said, "We have 28 gasoline type buses that should be replaced in the next two years."

ICBM To Get Most Emphasis

WASHINGTON (AP) — The long range intercontinental ballistic missile and the cold facts of international relations may shove the intermediate range rocket out of the United States arsenal. That trend was indicated in a news conference by Secretary of Defense McElroy Thursday. McElroy hastened to say that the United States will go ahead with production of the Thor and Jupiter IRBMs to complete orders for weapons to be deployed to Europe—to England and probably to Italy. "But the defense chief also said that the farther you go down the road of the ICBM, the less interesting it is to employ additional IRBMs."

With the ICBM, which would be launched from bases in the United States, "we would have complete control," commented McElroy. This presumably meant that the United States would be free of the complications of sharing with other countries control of the missiles which, in the case of the IRBMs, would be fired from bases in allied nations. McElroy had another point to make: if an enemy had to use his own ICBMs to strike U. S. missile bases, the job would be more difficult at 5,000 miles range than at 1,500—the range of an IRBM. The first missile to be pitched would not be ours, but the enemy's.

Slain Strike Leader's Union Still Picketing

CHESTER, N. Y. — Pickets marched again today at the Chester Cable Co., whose president was arrested Thursday in the slaying of a onetime bank robber who was leading a wildcat strike. Thomas Murphy of Port Jervis, N.Y., leader of a group of employees seeking recognition for an independent union, said he and other workers were shocked by the shooting. But he said they would continue to press for their objective. A company president, Malcolm White, was in jail at Goshen on a first-degree murder charge, awaiting a hearing Dec. 1. The victim of the shooting, Alfred C. Dugan, 55-year-old New Jersey labor organizer with a long criminal record, had been engaged several weeks in an effort to switch the firm's 14 employees from an AFL-CIO union to a small independent organization. STILL OPERATING A wildcat strike was begun Monday by some workers, but plant production was continued by others who crossed picket lines. The 43-year-old White, who has spent some 15 years building up his company, recently took out a gun permit saying he feared violence might occur at his plant. A few days ago he began gathering information about Dugan's criminal record. Upon reaching the plant Thursday morning, White encountered Dugan. The two exchanged angry words and White shouted that he planned to reveal Dugan's record.

IN PURSUIT A short time later White drove away from the plant and Dugan followed in his own car. About half a mile away, White said, he noticed Dugan behind him and halted. Dugan also stopped and spoke out, White said. White said that as Dugan advanced, he thought the union organizer had his hand on a gun in his pocket. White said he then drew his pistol and began firing at Dugan. Two shots hit the union man, killing him. White returned to his office. He called police who arrived soon afterward. "I shot him," he told them. "He crossed picket lines. He was for bank robbery, armed robbery and mayhem."

2 Hostages Shot Down By Negro

BOWLING GREEN, Va. (AP) — A posse of hundreds combed the countryside near this central Virginia town today for a gunman who shot and killed two women last night after terrorizing a home for two hours. Police said the motive of the Negro intruder was robbery. The victims were white. Killed were Mrs. James S. Brooks, 33, mother of four and wife of restaurant operator James S. "Cap" Brooks, and her mother-in-law, Mrs. Kate Lewis Brooks, 74. Police said the gunman was shot after he spotted Brooks running to a nearby farmhouse to call for help. "You all think you are smart. Your husband was out there," authorities quoted the intruder as saying just prior to the shootings.

HURT IN SCUFFLE

Kenneth Van Allen, in the Brooks home to give a music lesson, was injured in a scuffle with the intruder. Van Allen, 35, was hospitalized in Frederickburg, 20 miles north of this town of 700. Authorities said the gunman was admitted to the isolated home by Jeanne Brooks, 8, who met him outside and invited him in when the man asked for help. Once inside, he produced a revolver. He tied the two victims on a sofa, then tied up the maid, Edna Mae Parker, 18, Negro. He then returned into the same room the four children — Jeanne, Mason, 7, and twin boys Lynn and Lewis, 5. State trooper B. E. Sitterson said earlier reports that Brooks and the intruder scuffled were incorrect. Van Allen, authorities said, apparently worked free of his bonds. The maid heard a scuffle and called Van Allen got in his car and drove off as the gunman shattered a window with bullets. White said, who started work at the Brooks home Monday, was held overnight in jail for what authorities said was "her own protection."



MAIL ORDER PISTOL USED— Boy Kills 'No-Good' Brother

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "My brother was an inferior person. He just had to die. He was a no-good person to be around. I couldn't stand the thought of Ted getting married and bringing kids into the world." This was 18-year-old Bruce Ginn, slight, brown-eyed psychiatric patient, talking to detectives and newsmen at the county morgue, by the body of his 14-year-old brother Ted, riddled with seven bullets from a mail-order revolver. Their parents, Harry and Ruth Ginn, are a deacon and deaconess at the Community Church in suburban Altadena, where the family lives. "Everything he did was bad," Bruce went on. "Instead of sitting straight he'd slouch. When he sat in a chair he'd cross his legs." A good friend of mine came to see me once and Edward (Ted) kept working a 30-30 in front of him. "I just knew he was never going any place and there was no use in his being around." "THAT WAS THE END" He quit talking to his brother 21 months ago "because he tore up some book covers. That was the end." "Are you sorry you killed your brother?" someone asked. "Not at all. I'd do the same thing again." "Last August I saw a magazine ad that said guns could be bought by mail order," he said. "I saved my money, and when I got \$10 for my birthday I had enough. I sent the people \$150 for the gun." They sent me an affidavit to fill out saying I was 21 and had never been in jail. "The gun came about the middle of October. I hid it in my desk drawer." "Last Wednesday, I thought this might be the day." Ted came home from school

and "like always, he changed his clothes and went into the bathroom." As Ted opened the bathroom door, Bruce was in the left arm. The bullet spun him around and he fell against the door, pushing it closed. "He began calling, 'Help... What's the idea?' I said, 'Let me see where you're hit.' I got the door open. "As Ted put his head around the door, I pulled the trigger." In the parents' bedroom, Bruce killed the boys' dog, Razz. At the jail his father, 69, a water company maintenance man, reached out in a comforting gesture. Bruce retreated a step, his head ailed. The boy was booked on suspicion of murder. Detective Sgt. Jim Walkie said a psychiatrist treated Bruce for a year and diagnosed his personality as schizophrenic with paranoid tendencies. He quit high school some time ago.
