All Spaces Filled For Big Event

Hundreds of thousands of persons lined Charlotte streets today for the 12th annual Carolinas Carrousel Parade. The crowds overflowed sidewalks, hung out of office building windows, stood on open truck beds and even climbed fire escapes to see the long parade, which observers said was one of the most colorful ever staged here.

It was a parade of gayly decorated floats, high stepping bands, clowns, storybook characters and giant balloons, all creating an illusion of fairyland and man's attempts to conquer space.

Several floats had actual missiles or models of missiles on them.

TWO-MILE ROUTE

Starting at the intersection of South and East Blvds., the long procession traversed the two-mile route that led up South Blvd. to Morehead St., along Morehead to Tryon St., and back to Tryon to 11th St. where it dispersed.

Riding on floats or in convertibles were Carrousel king and queen James J. Harris of Charlotte and Frances Hambricht of Clover, S. C., singer Betty Johnson, Miss America of 1958 Marilyn Van Derbur, television's Capt. Kangaroo, Mayor and Mrs. James S. Smith, motion picture actor Fuzzy Knight, princesses representing Carolinas communities and Carrousel officials.

The parade, which began shortly after 11 a.m., was led by a color guard, horses, and the high-stepping U. S. Air Force Drum and Bugle Corps.

RAMBLING REBELS

Then came the mayor, Miss America, and the Rambling Rebels of Gastonia, led by Miss Jo Ann Cheek of Charlotte.

Following this came the Carrousel royalty float, Betty Johnson and the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce float, proudly displaying a Nike Hercules missile made here.

The championship Wynyah High School band of Georgetown, S. C., stepped by proudly in their red and white uniforms flashing in the sun.

The Lanes, Inc. float showed Goldlocks and the Three Bears, and this was followed by Fuzzy Knight, smiling and waving to the crowd.

MOON ROCKET

Then came the Washington High School float, followed closely by fairytale characters and J. B. Ivey Co.'s rocket to the moon. The Southern Dairies presented Old Edna and Edna's presented Alice in Wonderland.

Capt. Kangaroo greeted the cheering thousands and was followed by the Charlotte Lines float, the York High School band and the trim, beautifully finished Merchants Association float.

The Charlotte Observer's float was next in line.

The Davidson College band was new, and King Neptune presided over a water court on Queen City Coach Co.'s float. Paganald showed a giant watermelon, and

U.S., Allies Press Final Space Offer

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United States and its supporters abandoned attempts of space regulations with the Russians and pushed a take-or-leave-it proposal today.

The 20 associated nations decided to act on their own after talks broke down between the United States and Russia over makeup of a committee to make recommendations for U.N. supervision of peaceful exploration of outer space.

The group, which already had put a space resolution before the U.N. General Assembly's Political Committee, decided to submit a new draft without further talks with the Soviets. The revised draft was handed in Friday night.

The Western plan calls for an 18-nation study group that would lay the groundwork for a permanent U.N. space committee.

James J. Harris Crowned As Monarch Of Carrousel

James J. Harris is king today. The insurance executive and civic leader was crowned ruling monarch of the Royal Society of Knights of Carrousel at a colorful ceremony in Charlotte Coliseum last night.

He took the scepter from retiring king Thomas L. Robinson, and then, with his queen Frances Hambricht of Clover, S. C., sitting on the throne beside him, dubbed a general and a senator dukes, a former Miss America and a former Miss Al. erica a duchess and 29 prominent men knights in the society.

The general was Mark Clark, commander of The Citadel, and the senator was North Carolina's B. Everett Jordan.

The former Miss America was Marilyn Van Derbur, who relinquished the title last September. The coliseum was beautifully decorated for the ceremony. Brightly colored pennants and banners hung from the catwalks. Lances, spears and coats of arms adorned the concrete facings of the side seating sections.

The ceremony started at 10 p.m. with reading of a short history and traditions of the society by Fletcher Austin. Then the court figures, and the red-costumed beaueaters, the blue-clad heralds trooped in line up before the throne.

The court friars were the Rev. James E. Fogarty and Dr. Lawrence I. Stiel. They gave the invocation.

Former Kings George M. Ivey, Herschel H. Everett and J. Norman Pease came in to take their places on the throne. Then a hushed silence fell on the court and the audience of 2,000 persons, anticipating the arrival of the new king. King James walked through the line of beaueaters and heralds, bowed to King Thomas, accepted his crown and scepter and put on with the business of the evening.

The 29 princesses representing Central Carolina communities were presented as Miss North Carolina, Betty Lane Evans and Miss Charlotte, Miss Pat Williams.

Girl Given Life; Appeal Prepared

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Attorney for Carl Ann Fugate, 15, convicted of murder, prepared today to appeal her case to the State Supreme Court if necessary.

A jury Friday found the slim brunette guilty of first-degree murder for aiding and abetting mass killer Charles Starkweather in one of his 11 admitted slayings.

A life sentence was prescribed for Carl, in contrast to the death penalty ordered for her ex-boyfriend last May.

Defense lawyer John McArthur said a new trial will be asked within the 10 days allowed. Sentencing normally follows rejection of the motion for retrial. But sentencing in Carl's case is a formality because the jury fixes the penalty in first-degree murder convictions in Nebraska.

McArthur said a Supreme Court appeal is planned if necessary.

In the absence of a court reversal, the state Board of Pardons and Paroles becomes Carl's last hope. But the board normally requires life terms to serve at least 10 years before they are considered for commutation of sentence or parole.

Carl was 14 at the time she and Starkweather embarked on a crime spree. Nine bodies of victims were found in a three-day period in the Lincoln area and Starkweather added a last victim in Wyoming just before he and Carl were captured Jan. 29. Starkweather subsequently admitted a previously unvoiced slaying in Lincoln to bring his victim list to 11.

Reds Keep Silent On Berlin Moves

Trans World Hit By Strike

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The worldwide operations of Trans World Airlines, the nation's fourth largest air line, were at a standstill today as the result of a strike by 7,000 union mechanics.

The mechanics walked off the job—some of them reluctantly—Friday. The company said it would furlough, without pay, most of its 12,000 other employees. Flights in progress were allowed to continue to their destinations, but no new flights were started.

The TWA walkout began as other union mechanics voted to end a 37-day strike against Capital Airlines, which operates east of the Mississippi River. Capital said it would resume its flights Sunday.

Capital was the second air line to reach agreement with the International Assn. of Machinists. Northwest settled with the IAM last Monday. Besides TWA, the union is engaged in contract dispute with Eastern and Northeast. The latter two have not been struck.

Another air line — American — is threatened with a strike by the Air Line Pilots Assn. ALPA spokesman said in Chicago that a tentative strike deadline of 11:59 p.m. Tuesday had been set for 154 pilots employed by American.

As the TWA mechanics left their jobs, there was a spokesman that some didn't have their hearts in the strike. Fourteen of them, employed at the TWA overhaul base here, asked the union to remove Cliff Miller, chairman of the union's District 142, which embraces TWA mechanics.

Miller, a spokesman, said they asked the international to name a trustee to take over TWA negotiations from Miller. The spokesman said the request was made in a telephone call to Al J. Hayes, international president, in Washington.
