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Court Evasion on Segregation Is Illegal, White Trials Rescheduled Nov. 17

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court declared today states cannot resort to "evasive schemes" to continue racial segregation in schools. Thus it dealt a blow to such plans as those calling for leasing public schools to private groups.

Under Alabama law, the governor had no authority to reduce the sentence below life imprisonment. The state constitution gives him the power only to save a condemned man from the electric chair by commuting the sentence to life.

ATHENS (AP)—Prime Minister Constantine Karamanlis said today Cyprus independence would be acceptable to Greece as a solution to the problem that has brought bloodshed to the island for three years.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass. (AP)—The New Bedford Standard-Times today reported that Associate Justice Felix Frankfurter advised the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People on matters of policy for about 10 years immediately before his appointment to the U.S. Supreme Court.

ROME (AP)—The Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) reported today Soviet Russia is speeding toward its goal of topping the United States in production of milk, meat and butter.

HAVANA, Cuba (AP)—Cuban rebels said today they had killed 25 soldiers and captured an army commander in a clash near Marfo, about 20 miles northwest of Santiago.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Martin F. O'Donoghue was reported today to be considering resigning as chief monitor over the Teamsters Union unless given more power to enforce reforms.

PARIS (AP)—Premier de Gaulle has won his fight. Returns from the most sweeping referendum in French history today gave him a resounding personal triumph and a strong constitution for a Fifth Republic.

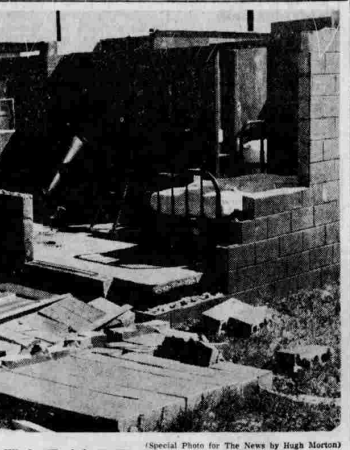

West Wind, Low Tide Cut Down On Storm's Damage

WILMINGTON — Hurricane Helene was plenty harmful — but she could have been pure, living hell.

At 7:04 a.m., the tide was high. Helene was southeast of here. Since winds traveled in a counterclockwise direction from the eye of a hurricane, the first and more severe winds blew from the east on the high tide.

At 12 noon the winds had shifted to the northeast, with the tide nearly low, at a speed of 61 miles an hour with gusts to 102.

At 1 p.m. Saturday the wind was from the north and beginning to work in pushing the tide out to sea.

At 2:02 p.m. the wind was blowing 66 miles an hour with gusts to 110. But by this time the wind was screaming out of the north.

Bondsmen Hearings In October

Superior Court Solicitor Grady Stott said today he expects to try charges against Judge Basil M. Boyd and former clerk Allen M. White of City Recorder's Court during a special session of Superior Court beginning Nov. 17.

A special term of court had already been ordered for Nov. 24, but the conflict with Thanksgiving holidays prompted Mr. Stott to put the date up a week.

Mr. Stott said today he will try two cases against three professional bondsmen disposed of by Nov. 17.

Judge Nettles indicated that the bondsmen will be tried during the next term of Criminal Court that starts on Oct. 27.

Judge Nettles is scheduled to preside over that term of court.

Bondsmen Leo Reynolds, C. B. Bridges, and J. H. Brantley are charged with conspiracy to obstruct justice. Judge Boyd is charged with willful neglect of duty, and Mr. White with willful neglect of duty and embezzlement.

All of the charges, except embezzlement against Mr. White, are misdemeanors. Embezzlement is a felony and carries punishment up to 10 years in prison.

All of the men are free at the present time under \$1,000 bonds.

Judge Boyd stepped down from the city court bench voluntarily after he was indicted. He has been city recorder since the City Council re-elected him for a two-year term in May, 1955. He was re-appointed in May, 1957, for another two-year term.

Judge Boyd has retained the services of five local attorneys to defend him against the charge. He and his lawyers have been granted the permission to examine city court records that were impounded by the grand jury in the course of its investigation.

When Judge Nettles ordered the grand jury investigation, he said, "I cut chips fall wherever they may."

Judge Pro Tem Peter H. Gerts has been presiding over city court since Boyd stepped down.

Thief Finds Second Trip Unprofitable

DAYTON, Ohio (AP)—Service station attendant Max Stapleton is not a man to let disaster strike him.

A week ago, he was robbed of \$70. The same man walked up to Stapleton's station Sunday and found that Stapleton (1) had recognized him, (2) was barricaded in the back room and (3) was armed with a .38-caliber revolver.

The holdup man emptied his gun into the door of the back room. On the other side, Stapleton emptied his gun right back. No one apparently got hurt.

When the smoke cleared, Stapleton had police, he could hear the holdup man rifling the cash register. But Stapleton was ahead of him then too. It was empty.
