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Leaders (And Kids) Declare Vocational Center A 'Must'

Over 200 city and county high school students have signed up for courses that may never be offered in a school that may never exist.

They're the first — or hope to be the first — students in the proposed Industrial Education Center.

Right now the future of the center is shaky.

The federal government stands ready to sink funds into it. The state will allocate \$320,000 as a starter.

The City School Board has made the Central High School building available as a center.

School officials, the Chamber of Commerce, community and industrial leaders say it is essential to the development of this area.

EAGER TO START
And the students are eager to begin.

The hitch is the county commission. It is estimated it will take \$320,000 to begin renovation and remodeling of the school building.

Commissioners have said "no" to the requested allocation. Dr. E. H. Garinger, city school superintendent, is greatly concerned that Charlotte and Mecklenburg are "missing a golden opportunity."

"The plans have got to have people," he told his board yesterday. "Either we train our own, or they bring in people."

The opportunity to get federal and state help in setting up a vocational training center is one the county "ought to grab with enthusiasm," he said.

OTHERS TAKE OFFER
Elsewhere in North Carolina other communities, such as Greensboro, High Point and Winston-Salem, have taken advantage of the money and equipment offers.

"Something terrible is going to happen if this is not straightened out," Dr. Garinger said.

An attempt to straighten out the situation was to be made this afternoon at a meeting of representatives of the Chamber of Commerce, city and county school boards at the chamber's office at 2 p.m.

The vocational center is planned for high school students who will not go to college and for adults in the community who want to become skilled workers.

Dean Davis, supervisor of the trade and industrial education program for city schools, said the center will not be a "dumping ground" for students. They will have to take a battery of tests, including ones to determine their interest in mechanical aptitude and manual dexterity.

TO BE SELECTIVE
"We're going to be selective," Mr. Davis said. His statement applies to adults attending the center, as well as to high school students.

So far, Mr. Davis has visited five of the city and county high schools. He'll visit his last one today to explain the courses and operation of the center.

In Charlotte and Mecklenburg, about 30 per cent of the high school graduates do not go to college. "These are the ones we want to appeal to," Mr. Davis said.

Visiting in the different high schools, Mr. Davis said he has found students to be very enthusiastic about the program.

Two hundred is a conservative estimate of the number of students who have indicated they would want to be included in the industrial education program.

With the future of the center uncertain, Mr. Davis said he has not contacted Negro high schools, or, started signing up adults.

PROGRAM PLANNING
Here's the way the center will fit into the high school program. Ten courses are scheduled. Only one of them is specifically for girls, but they will be admitted to other courses.

Students can elect to take one course which will be taught three hours each day. They will not lose their senior status.

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Segregationists Take Little Rock Defeat

United Berlin Requested

GENEVA (AP)—With secret Big Four talks on Germany scheduled to start Friday, U. S. Secretary of State Christian A. Herter urged Russia today to negotiate a Berlin settlement which would unite that divided city under its own constitution pending German unification.

Diplomatic informants said Herter spoke at the outset of today's brief session of the four-power foreign ministers conference in advance of his departure for Washington with the British and French ministers to attend the funeral of John Foster Dulles.

Russia was represented at the session by Valerian Zorin because Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko already had taken off for Washington.

Earlier, Gromyko and Lloyd, who represented the West, agreed that on Friday when the conference resumes it will go into private sessions.

SERIOUS TALKS
The private meetings are designed to permit more serious negotiation on Berlin, and possibly on a summit conference.

Herter spelled out details of the Berlin proposal previously presented to Russia as part of the western package for German reunification, European security and disarmament. Gromyko has already rejected the western plan.

Herter noted the connection between the Berlin proposal and the package but did not stress it. Western officials have said they recognize they may have to make an interim arrangement for Berlin outside the package.

The U. S. secretary declared that Soviet action in 1948 broke up four-power control of Berlin and divided the city. This violation of wartime and postwar allied agreements, he said, but did not remove Russia's obligation to work with the United States, Britain and France in treating Berlin as a united city.

Berlin Quiet Is Predicted
BERLIN (AP)—Tomorrow is the deadline Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev originally set for ending the military occupation of West Berlin, but the Soviet embassy gave assurances today that nothing will be done to disturb the city now.

J. V. Behrman, chief Soviet spokesman in East Berlin, expressed surprise when asked by a reporter if the Communists planned any action on the May 27 deadline.

"Premier Khrushchev has said on several occasions that we will not undertake to alter the status of Berlin while negotiations are in progress and there is hope that negotiations can result in a solution," he said.

West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt also predicted that "nothing will happen tomorrow."

Herter, Couve de Murville and Lloyd, wearing dark gray suits, went directly from the palace to the airport. They made no statements. Mr. Herter accompanied her husband on his mission to the Dulles funeral.

Talks Suspended For Dulles Rites
GENEVA (AP)—The Big Four foreign ministers suspended their conference on Germany today and took off for Washington to pay their last respects to the memory of John Foster Dulles.

A U. S. Air Force Constellation carrying Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville of France thundered into the sunlit sky. It is due in Washington at 9 a.m. tomorrow.

Soviet foreign minister Andrei A. Gromyko led the exodus from this conference city in early afternoon. He was traveling by commercial aircraft but will return to Geneva with Herter and Lloyd Thursday night. Couve de Murville will return alone.

Departure of the western ministers came after an 80-minute session of the conference at the palace of nations at which Herter spelled out details of a seven-point plan for unification of Berlin as a first step toward German unity. The plan had previously been presented to Russia and rejected.

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Mikoyan Calls Dulles 'Very Great'
MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet first deputy Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan says John Foster Dulles was the type of statesman the Kremlin respects—strong, dedicated and intelligent.

"I am very sorry that he is dead," Mikoyan told newsmen last night. "Not only I, but the whole Soviet government."

It was the first extended comment by a top Soviet official on the death of the former U. S. Secretary of State, who so often was the target of Communist propaganda attacks. Mikoyan spoke off the cuff at the Argentine Embassy's national day reception.

"Dulles was a very great statesman," said the No. 2 man in the Soviet government. "He was very intelligent. He was a strong partisan advocate. He was like strong men. We do not like uncertain ones. We prefer such (strong) people to those who are smooth but not intelligent."

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3 School Board Men Will Be Replaced

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—Gov. Orval E. Faubus met a major defeat yesterday in Little Rock's integration feud with the recall of three segregationists from the school board.

Faubus had put himself squarely behind the segregationists in the recall election which sprung from an uprising of a group of citizens over the firing of 44 teachers.

All three of them were defeated, including the board's president Ed J. McKinley who was ousted by a vote of 13,347 to 11,855.

At the same time the three moderates, who said they prefer some integration to no schools, were a vote of confidence by retaining their seats.

It is now up to the Pulaski County Board of Education to fill the vacancies. The board's five members, all political unknowns here, have kept their own counsel as to their plans.

ON TV TWICE
Faubus twice went on television in the closing days of the bitter campaign to plead for retention of the segregationists. He called the controversy over firing of the teachers a smokescreen for integration.

The governor urged the ouster of the three moderate members. Their supporters had started the recall movement. The moderates walked out of a board meeting May 4 when the segregationists began their teacher purge.

Two days later a group of business and professional men organized a movement to stop the teacher purge. They pledged themselves to recall the three segregationists.

Today Robert W. Laster, Little Rock traffic judge and the worst beaten of the segregationists, said: "Well it looks like the people want integrated schools, doesn't it?"

The other two segregationists, McKinley and Ben Rowland, were silent. So was Faubus who was reported at the governor's mansion to be at Stuttgart, Ark.

Laster was recalled by a 14,002 to 11,146 vote and Rowland, by 15,601 to 11,146.

Everett Tucker Jr., leader of the moderates, retained his seat by a 12,223 to 12,094 vote. Ted Lamb had the hardest haul among the moderates but ran up a 12,973 to 12,502 favorable vote. The third moderate, Russell Matson, kept his seat by a 12,963 to 12,326 edge.

The six school board members were elected last December after the former members bought up the contract of Sept. Virgil T. Blossom and then quit themselves.

BITTER DUPEL
From the start the board was split in bitter dispute. The three who attempted the teacher purge were pledged to support Faubus in his fight with the federal government over integration. The other three had been denounced by the governor as integrationists.

Tucker, Lamb and Matson denied they were integrationists. Faubus closed the four public high schools last fall under laws he had sponsored at a special legislative session a few months before.

The closing was endorsed by a 3 to 1 vote at an election. Faubus called out the National Guard in the fall of 1957 to stop nine Negroes from attending Central High School. He said he had done it to prevent violence but federal courts ordered him to stop interfering with integration. President Eisenhower then moved in federal troops to enforce it the rest of the school year.

Here's One Man Who Stays Busy
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Non-Licensed Drivers Top 1,500 Mark

Capt. of Traffic James B. Stegall said today about 1,500 persons are operating motor vehicles in Mecklenburg without valid driver's licenses.

Stegall said this number, in his opinion, is a conservative figure.

"This means that about 1,500 persons are driving who have no license, or their license has expired or their license has been revoked."

During 1958 city police made 590 arrests for improper driver's licenses.

"And you can figure that a lot of people who don't have licenses got by without getting caught," he said.

Sgt. John Kelly Wall, chief records clerk for the county police, said county and state police arrested about 1,000 people for invalid driver's licenses during 1958.

NO PADDING
He said the 1,000 arrests is a conservative estimate. Mecklenburg and county police in Mecklenburg have made 80 invalid license arrests.

City Police are putting road blocks up in different sections of the county to check driver's licenses.

Sgt. Roy Phillips said last week he was checking licenses on Queens Rd. and in two hours he stopped 15 drivers who didn't have a valid license.

Another problem for local police is people who drive here with out of state licenses.

"Some states don't have as rigid a driver's exam as we have here," Capt. Stegall said, "and some people try to keep on driving with an out of state license."

The State Highway Patrol is also putting road blocks up in the county to check licenses.
