## Core Of Golf Ball No Toy For Junior To Be Knifing

Golf balls are made to hit straight, slice or hook. But not to cut.

Junior, keep your knife to yourself. Cutting into the heart of a golf ball may be dangerous. Two local youngsters can give uncomfortable testimony this week.

Robbie Furr, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Furr, Tyvola Rd., cut into an old golf ball last week. His Boy Scout knife hit the heart of the ball — and a white substance shot out and damaged his eye. He is going to be all right, but the accident could have been much more serious.

### SECOND ACCIDENT

The same thing happened to another youngster.

The substance was in the heart of golf balls are apparently not too dangerous. But the pressure within the ball is. Ed Worrell, an expert on such things with E. J. Smith and Sons here told The News today that there are 2,000 pounds of pressure per square inch in the heart of a golf ball. This much pressure, when released all at once from a knife or nail puncture, can do abrasive damage to the skin or eye even if the substance in the heart of the ball is plain water.

### MANY LIQUIDS

Golf ball manufacturers, Worrell says, use syrups, sugary substances, castor oil and sugar liquids for centers. These are usually frozen and the ball wrapped around it. Then it melts, giving the ball a liquid center.

"I don't think the substance in the centers of balls are harmful," he says, "for no acids are used in American balls. I would think, however, that 2,000 pounds of pressure should be tampered with and youngsters should be very careful."

Dr. Walter R. Graham, who treated the Furr youngster, says, "I think a warning is in order. The cases thus far have been minor, but this could be a serious injury under some circumstances."

He says he has not determined what the substance was in

the ball young Furr cut into, but it apparently was not an acid. Some balls do contain a small amount of silicon.

Mr. Worrell also offers another warning: Some balls use solid centers. If the centers are

cut, the solid substances can become a fast-moving projectile under the 2,000 pounds of pressure.

"Leave the golf balls for you to cut up on the course," Worrell adds.

## Missing Woman Eludes Kidnapers

GUYNOM, Okla. (AP)—An Ohio woman dashed into police headquarters here about midnight and said she had just escaped from a man who had kidnapped her in Albuquerque, N.M.

Police Chief R. L. Shephard, 25, of Akron, Ohio, as saying she had been hit in the stomach and forced to accompany the man and another couple.

Mrs. Bailey, mother of two children, had been sought since a hastily scrawled note appealing for help was found in a service station restroom at Tucuman, N.M., yesterday.

Chief Shephard said Mrs. Bailey related she slipped out of a motel here to report the abduction. Police then arrested the man she said kidnapped her. The second couple was arrested in a separate room.

FBI agents were trying to establish the true identities of the three persons with Mrs. Bailey. The Ohio woman, Chief Shephard said, told him she and her husband had been separated two weeks.

Chief Shephard said he informed Mrs. Bailey's two children had been placed in custody of the State of Arizona.

The search for Mrs. Bailey began yesterday after a hastily scrawled note was found in the restroom of a service station at Tucuman, N.M.

The note, written on the back of a personalized check, said: "I've been kidnapped. Help please."

It was signed "Jeanette Bailey," and bore this postscript: "Headed for Amarillo."

A traveling companion of Mrs. Bailey expressed fears for her safety.

Miss Tonya Barstall, 27, of San Francisco, said she and Mrs. Bailey and the two Bailey children had left Akron by automobile May 29 for San Francisco.

They stopped in Albuquerque about two weeks ago and had been there since, sharing a small apartment, she said.

Miss Barstall said Mrs. Bailey had worked several days in an Albuquerque tavern.

In Akron, Eugene C. Bailey, husband of the missing woman, said his wife had left on vacation.

# 38 Injured In Blast Set By 'Mad Bomber'

## Gromyko Opens New Attack Plan

GENEVA (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko opened a drive in the Big Four conference today to break the Western-made link between the present meeting of foreign ministers and a later summit conference.

Gromyko's attack could overshadow a final refusal by the Soviet Union to yield on the West Berlin demands, even under heavy Western pressure.

He told foreign ministers of the United States, Britain and France that their insistence on a link between the present conference and a summit parley is artificial and "altogether invalid."

In effect, Gromyko argued that even though there was a failure here to raise the Berlin tension and make progress toward East-West agreement, there should be a summit meeting anyway. President Eisenhower has said he would not attend a heads of government meeting under such conditions, and at the moment that is basic Western policy.

### WEST DEMANDS

The Western powers demanded that Moscow stop threatening them with a separate East German peace treaty, and get back to negotiations for ending the West Berlin crisis.

At the outset, Gromyko displayed readiness to soften the bite but not to pull the teeth of the Soviet campaign to force U.S., British and French garrisons out of the divided city.

Gromyko assured the Western powers that he did not intend his proposal for the one-year deadline on the Western occupation of West Berlin as an ultimatum. He said he could not understand what all the excitement was about. He urged the Western ministers to stop using the terms dictate and ultimatum.

### CALLS STATION

He spoke at a semipublic meeting in the Palace of Nations after U.S. Secretary of State Christian A. Herter called on him to state for the record what he had told Herter in a secret session Thursday.

Herter and his Western colleagues have declared the conference to be on a day-to-day basis now, carried their onslaught against Soviet proposals for an ultimatum, and have set the final three-hour session of the fifth week.

They have threatened to break off next week unless the Soviets pull a diplomatic retreat over the weekend.

Agreement was reached for a secret session Monday.

## Tew Will 'See' Friends In Raleigh

Where there's a will, there's a way.

And Tew Dellinger, a man with a great will, now has a way to go to Raleigh to attend the golden anniversary celebration of his old school.

To most people, this wouldn't be a problem. But Tew is blind and paralyzed except for the use of one arm and hand.

He has been blind since youth and so afflicted with arthritis that he has not walked for the past 22 of his 42 years. Gradually he has lost the use of all parts of his body except his right hand and arm.

But Tew Dellinger has not given up by a long shot.

So when some of his friends

among them Mrs. Connie Miller and Mrs. Frieda Phillips, learned that he wanted to attend the reunion of alumni at North Carolina's School for the Blind in Raleigh, they started looking for a way to get him there.

They didn't have far to look. The Charlotte Lifesaving Crew volunteered an ambulance and driver for the trip.

### OFF TO RALEIGH

Jimmy Pound, with Sammy Cain as attendant, left early this morning with Tew on the way to Raleigh. They will return tonight, bringing Tew back to Providence Nursing Home.

"I'll get to see a lot of people I haven't seen since 1936," he said. "I say 'see' because I'm in the habit of it. I won't really get to see them, but I can talk to them."

He had been reading "The Upper Room" in braille. "I used to read a lot, but you need two hands to read braille well, and two years ago I had a blood clot on the brain which paralyzed my left arm and hand. I try to read a little each day to keep in practice."

### LONGEST TRIP

This is not Tew's first trip from his bed, but it's his longest one. He has been carried to his hometown, Cherryville, and back, and he has attended the Lions Club's annual picnic for the past five years.

But this is his big trip. "It's going to be a long ride," said Jimmy, the driver, from the front seat of the ambulance. "That's all right," said Tew Dellinger. "I'm going to enjoy it all."

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## Police Seek Picture Of Bellevue Escapee

BOSTON (AP)—Police hunted a "mad bomber" today in the wake of an explosion which shattered a rapid transit train station 30 feet above a busy Boston intersection Thursday.

They also sought a picture of a man who was accused of having threatened to bomb Cuban leader Fidel Castro when the latter visited this country recently. The man reportedly fled New York's Bellevue (City) Hospital.

The picture will be shown to victims and to others who were in the area when the device exploded about 2 p.m. yesterday.

Three agencies, Boston police, state detectives and the Boston Fire Department, are investigating.

The FBI, which had agents on the scene yesterday, indicated that at present it had no active interest. Normally the FBI would not be involved officially unless there was suspicion of a subversive act.

### INJURED IMPROVE

Massachusetts General Hospital spokesmen, meanwhile, reported improvement in the condition of the three most seriously injured. Although the names of all three were on the danger list none was found in a dying condition.

Police probing through the ruins found six dry-cell batteries near some shattered fragments of the metal lockers.

The said the batteries were covered with a sulphide residue indicating they were part of a bomb. Police said the bomb might have been activated by an oncoming train.

Two detectives said tests by police chemists of bits of the wreckage and parts of a smashed locker indicated a bag of powder weighing 20 to 25 pounds caused the explosion.

Investigators said the bomb went off with the explosive force of a 500-pound Air Force bomb World War II.

The blast blew apart the big 38-year-old p a g d a-type waiting room on the elevated station of the Metropolitan Rapid Transit Authority.

### SOME INSIDE

It caught several persons with in the waiting room and on the outdoor station platform. Some of them were blown 30 feet to bus Canal and Congress streets by the blast.

Six were injured as they sat in a train approaching the station. The blast stopped the train 20 feet away. Only three seconds after the train would have been in direct line of the explosion.

Others were injured on the street below by the terrific concussion and by flying debris.

Windows were broken in buildings as far as 150 feet away and as high as the 14th story.

Scene of the blast is directly across the street from the North Station railroad terminal which also houses the Boston Garden sports arena.

Eight hours after the 2 p.m. (EDT) explosion, the switchboard operator at North Station received an anonymous telephone call that a bomb had been placed in that 14-story structure.

The operator said the caller also said that the afternoon blast "was meant for McGinnis. Pat."

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## Admissions Of Guilt Entered In Rape Case

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A sheriff's deputy testified today that within hours after the rape of a Negro code he had a confession implicating four white youths.

The officer, W. W. Slappey, told a male white jury trying the youths for rape that he talked with the youngest, Ollie Stoutamire, 16, shortly after his arrest.

Slappey testified:

"I asked him did he have intercourse with the girl. At first he said no. The other three did and he didn't. I asked him again if he was sure and he said: 'Yes sir, we did.'"

The defense fought bitterly but vainly to prevent introduction of statements taken from the quarters after their arrests. Circuit Judge W. May Walker allowed the state to proceed in offering the statements.

A second defendant, Patrick G. Scarborough, 20, Slappey testified:

"He said he didn't know exactly what happened, that he was asleep in the back seat."

### ELDEST QUOTED

Slappey then quoted the eldest of the defendants, William T. Collinsworth, 23, as saying:

"He said two of the boys had intercourse with the girl but he didn't know which two it was, but he wasn't one of them."

The defense already has admitted that the girls had had relations with the code, Slappey did not testify as to admissions by the fourth defendant, David L. Beades, 17, because the deputy was not present when this youth made a statement.

Slappey estimated the statements he took were made between 4 and 5 a.m. May 2, three to four hours after the girl was raped.

The witness said that after he arrested the four defendants and was taking them in his car to the jail that they were laughing and joking and I told them that that was no time to be joking, that they could be facing the electric chair.

State Atty. William D. Hopkins scored a major point in introduction of the admissions of guilt at the trial.

## —HE'S 'NOT RUNNING FOR ANYTHING'— Nelson Pays Visit To ke

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller visited President Eisenhower in his fast, hand-shaking progress around town. But in reply to questions about bidding for the Presidential nomination in 1960, Rockefeller would go no farther than to say he will cross that bridge when he comes to it.

### ANY BRIDGES?

As he emerged from Eisenhower's office, a newsmen asked if he had "crossed any bridges this morning."

With a smile, Rockefeller replied that he had not.

"The President is always generous in his interest in what is going on in New York, and I have a continuing interest in organization problems here," Rockefeller said.

Rockefeller noted that before becoming governor he served for five years as a member of

the President's Committee on Government Organization. For a time also he was an advisor to Eisenhower on psychological warfare.

Twice reporters asked whether he and Eisenhower discussed politics — particularly the potential rivalry for the GOP nomination between him and Vice President Nixon. Twice Rockefeller replied that politics did not come up.

"I've got a lot of work to do in New York," Rockefeller added.

He said the subject of his talk with Eisenhower was "mutual legislative problems," and he really came just to pay his respects.

Rockefeller entered the White House by a side door and expressed surprise when he found two photographers and a reporter waiting for him.
