Canada To Blame

June's Been Good Month—For Colds

The month of June has been a good one for colds. It has been both cooler than usual and hotter than usual during June, the Weather Bureau at Douglas Airport said today.

Last night's low temperature of 56 degrees came within one degree of matching the record low for the date established in 1879. Earlier this month the mercury topped 90 degrees on several occasions. The average daily high temperature for June runs from 65 to 85 degrees here.

Charlotte and vicinity will remain under the influence of a cool mass of Canadian air through tomorrow, the bureau predicts. Despite last night's near-record low mercury reading, the weathermen insist it "won't be too unusual." Invasion of cool air from Canada is a fairly frequent occurrence, the bureau maintains.

Rounding out the month of extremes, the bureau reports last week's high temperature of 92 degrees is about four degrees above the usual top reading of 88 degrees in mid-June.

COOL AIR MASS

The cool Canadian air mass now resides along a ridge extending from Eastern Canada through the Southeast.
It will remain in control of Charlotte's weather tomorrow, with a low evening reading of 58 expected, before giving way to slightly warmer temperatures Sunday, the weatherman predicts.
A "weak" system in the Mid-West will come to town Sunday, bringing with it scattered showers or thundershowers.
The five-day outlook prepared this morning by the bureau anticipates a return to cooler tem-

May's Living Costs, Pay Up

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Living costs hit a new peak in May.
Small rises in prices for nearly all types of consumer goods lifted the Labor Department's cost index one-tenth of one percent from the April level.
At 124 per cent of the 1947-48 base period, the index was the highest it has ever reached.

And the prospect is for a further small increase during the summer months.
In reporting the figures today, the Labor Department said spending earnings of factory workers, meaning their pay after federal tax deductions, also hit a record.

The average for the factory worker heading a family of four was \$31.08 a week. It was \$22.49 for the single factory worker.

EARNINGS HIGHER

These earnings came were 35 cents higher than the record set in April.
The department said the rise in spendable earnings was due in part to longer working hours and higher pay rates.

The buying power of the worker is up about 9 per cent from a year ago because living costs have changed very little since then.
H. E. Riley, price chief for the department's Bureau of Labor Statistics, said, the living cost index has been moving within an extremely narrow range for a year. The May index was only three-tenths of one percent above the May 1958 level.

'No New Hope'

Gromyko Turns Down Proposal

GENEVA (U.P.)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko today refused to accept the West's latest proposals for a stopgap Berlin solution even as a basis of discussion.

A British delegation spokesman said Gromyko advanced new proposals for an interim Berlin arrangement but these have given "no new hope" to the West for a solution.

"Mr. Gromyko has not accepted the Western proposals even as a basis for discussion, the British spokesman said.

"Furthermore the Soviet position as put forward this afternoon by Mr. Gromyko, coupled with Mr. Khrushchev's speech has given no new hope to the Western delegations for a solution."

END DEMANDED

In Moscow, Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev declared in a speech at the Kremlin that the Allied occupation of West Berlin must end. The British statement, echoed by other Western delegations, was issued during an intermission between two secret sessions of the Big Four foreign ministers. It immediately posed the likelihood that U. S. Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd and French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville would raise with Gromyko the question of recessing the conference.

They arranged to meet Gromyko again at 3 p.m. (11 a.m. EST), evidently to give Gromyko their initial reaction. They had gone into his villa expecting to get a reply to their last chance offer made earlier this week for a compromise Berlin settlement.

Presumably that is what they got, but a Western statement said only:

"The meeting lasted 35 minutes. The Western foreign ministers said they wanted time to study them and then to the French delegation headquarters. The foreign ministers will meet again at 5 o'clock."

Plane's Attackers Probably Korean

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The Communist MIGs that shot up an American patrol plane over the Sea of Japan were more than likely North Korean, Secretary of Defense McElroy says.

McElroy told a news conference Thursday he bases that opinion on the direction from which the planes came. In the area of the Sea of Japan, the MIGs were fired from the direction of the Korean Peninsula, he said.

McElroy said it was ridiculous to raise a fuss about whether the American patrol plane was adequately armed or not. Its World War II vintage guns "are not going to knock off a MIG anyway," he said.

PEACEFUL MISSION

The defense secretary said the really important thing about the incident was that the U.S. Navy plane was on a peaceful mission over international waters and was jumped by "an irresponsible pair of fighters."

The U.S. plane's tail gunner was severely wounded by the attacking jets, and his gun was knocked out before he could return the fire. Crew members agreed the attackers were Soviet-built MIGs or MIG 17s.

Other gun targets on the plane had been destroyed so radar and cameras could be installed.

A photograph of the enemy planes which one of the crewmen snapped in the confusion of the attack could pin down the nationality of the planes beyond doubt.

The picture is being sent to Washington for evaluation. A Navy spokesman said "It is not known when and if it will be released."

Ike Deplores Rejection Of Strauss

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—President Eisenhower said today that the American people are the losers of the highly unusual step of calling newsmen into his White House office to read a brief statement.

At the outset, Eisenhower noted that the Senate last night refused to confirm Strauss for the cabinet post.

The turn-down came in a dramatic post-midnight roll call, 49-46.

WORDS OF PRAISE

Eisenhower went on to praise Strauss warmly.
He called Strauss a man who has loyally, honorably and effectively served his nation under four presidents.

Eisenhower said further that if the nation is to be denied the right to have officials of proven ability and integrity in responsible government positions, then "indeed it is the American people who are the losers in this sad episode."

The statement was squarely in line with the position the President has taken throughout the long fight — that Strauss is an effective, dedicated and upright public servant.

OPPOSITIONS ARGUE

Opponents on the other hand had argued that Strauss had been devious and less than frank in his dealings with Congress and the people.

The issue of public vs. private power had also come into the attack through Strauss' connection as head of the Atomic Energy Commission with the bitter Dixie-Votes controversy.

Eisenhower read his handwritten statement before a hastily set-up battery of cameras and lights.

He strode briskly into his oval, green-carpeted office after a conference in a small anteroom with Strauss.

SHORT VISIT

The Strauss visit was hastily set up after last night's Senate action. It ran about 20 minutes.

On arrival at the White House, Strauss smiled broadly as he stepped from his car. He hurried past waiting newsmen, saying: "I'm late for the boss."

Strauss did not go with the President to Eisenhower's office after the conference.

The Ross boy was being given emergency treatment at Memorial Hospital at noon. Police said he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Ross.

Louisiana Politicians Get Case Of Jitters

BATON ROUGE, La. (U.P.)—Hoarsely screaming curses, Gov. Earl K. Long of Louisiana battled all the way with sheriff's deputies Thursday night as they hauled him to a mental hospital for the second time in three weeks.

"I'm not going to get in there," he yelled when they tagged him into a sheriff's car to take him to southern Louisiana State Hospital at Mandeville, 50 miles to the east.

This latest chapter in the weird and tragic story of Earl Kemp Long pitched Louisiana politicians into additional jitters. Who is to take over the duties of governor?

Lt. Gov. Luther B. Frazier, it is supposed, will step into the breach, as he did when members of the Long family flew a drugged and unwilling governor May 30 to a psychiatric clinic at John Sealy Hospital in Galveston, Tex. However, nothing is certain.

In his New Orleans hotel, the lieutenant governor hastily declined to say one word on the situation.

NO COMMENT

"Oh, no, I have nothing to say. I have no comment," he said as he ducked into an elevator.

He told another reporter: "I don't know what my status is. I don't know what is going on."

Atty. Gen. Jack Grimmon said: "The only thing I can say is the law provides that if the governor is unable to serve, the lieutenant governor acts as governor ad interim until the disability is removed."

Then he added: "However, I am not attempting to tell the lieutenant governor what to do."

The fantastic evening leading immediately to Long's detention at Mandeville began Thursday morning when the restless governor informed his wife and doctors at Ochsner Foundation Hospital in New Orleans that he planned to leave.

Twenty-five buildings were gutted in fires set by demonstrators last night. They included municipal offices, post offices, police posts, clinics and schools.

Strong police patrols watched over the rowdy townships of Cade Manor and Chesterville, centers of the overnight disturbances. The police kept the residents of those tin-shack townships went back to work this morning.

Jenkins confirmed, however that groups of women — enraged at raids on illicit stills — used government regulations against brewing beer at home — were carrying on their protest.

Ignited Prematurely

1 Killed, 5 Hurt In Missile Mishap

NAHA, Okinawa (U.P.)—One U. S. Army man was killed and five others injured today when a Nike missile ignited prematurely at a launching site near Naha Airport.

A U. S. military spokesman said the missile was in a horizontal position when the accident occurred. The rocket pulled several hundred yards, then broke apart in an open field near the launching site, there was no explosion.

The military spokesman said all six missiles were without pending notification of their next kind.

It was the first such accident to occur on Okinawa, a big U. S. base in the Far East.

The army has two types of Nike missiles, the Ajax and the Hercules. It could not be learned immediately which type was involved.

The last serious Nike missile accident May 22, 1958, at an aircraft battery in Middletown, N.

Names of the dead man and the injured were withheld pending notification of their next kind.

The Ajax, brought out in 1952, reportedly travels about twice the speed of sound, is 22 feet long, and can operate up to 60,000 feet above the earth.

The larger, venter Hercules can be fitted with a conventional or atomic warhead and has a range of 30 miles. It is said to be capable of knocking down entire formations of enemy planes.

Protest Rages For Home Brew

DURBAN, South Africa (U.P.)—African women massed around beer halls again today in a demonstration for home brewing rights that has cost the lives of four Africans and put 24 in hospitals.

Col. R. D. Jenkins, deputy police commissioner, announced police have summoned three heavily armed troop carriers from a depot in Cape Province, 350 miles away, to help restore order.

Some 2,000 people gathered to watch the re-enactment and filming of the 33-year-old patrolman's murder. Portable lights illuminated the block. Cameras were mounted on trucks. Tape recorders picked up the noise of the blank cartridges fired in the re-enactment. Dozens of cables criss-crossed the street and sidewalks.

ESCORTED BY POLICE

The filming started as soon as Coyle, 34, reached the city. He made the seven-hour trip from Waltham, Mass., in a Philadelphia police patrol car. Three detectives brought him back. Before he left Massachusetts, John went to a mortuary and

identified the body of William. He also pleaded guilty in District Court to charges ranging from intent to murder to two Massachusetts policemen to kidnapping. And he agreed voluntarily to the return to Philadelphia.

William was killed and John captured Wednesday after a 48-hour manhunt in a woody swampy section where they tried to hide after abandoning a car they had driven from Philadelphia.

The moviemaking followed a statement made by John to authorities immediately after his capture. John seemed to enjoy the first degree murder conviction, he said.
