



Mrs. Hawks Watches Resuscitation Attempt

Woman Quits Bed To Save Boy, 7

MINNEAPOLIS — A Minneapolis woman quit a sickbed last night to rescue one of two boys who scaled a fence to get to a swimming pool at her home after they had been warned away earlier.

She is Mrs. Stanley Hawks, who lived in a pull to safety John O'Connor Jr., found lying unconscious at the pool's bottom when she was alerted to his plight. The boy was reported in still critical condition early today at General Hospital.

Hawks, vice president and secretary of the Minneapolis Star-Tribune, said he had spotted the boys earlier after they had climbed the fence, were tearing up bushes and tossing them into the pool. He chased them away.

When the boys came back a short time later, he summoned police. But before officers arrived, one boy came to the door, told Mrs. Hawks his pal was at the bottom of the pool.

Although suffering from the flu, Mrs. Hawks removed her outer garments, dove in and pulled John out. Her husband, still recovering from pneumonia, called the fire department rescue squad.

Until it arrived with oxygen tanks, Mrs. Hawks applied artificial respiration. Police said that probably saved the victim's life.

ORDER AUTHORIZING \$8,000,000 SCHOOL BUILDING BONDS

WHEREAS, The Charlotte City Board of Education has certified to this Board a resolution passed on April 20, 1959, showing that adequate school facilities are not now available in the Charlotte City Administrative Unit to comply with the requirements of the Constitution of North Carolina for the maintenance of schools six months in every year, and that it is necessary, in order to maintain such six months' school term, to erect additional school buildings, remodel and enlarge existing school buildings, and acquire necessary land and equipment therefor, to provide additional elementary and secondary school facilities in said Unit, the estimated cost of which is \$2,925,000; and

WHEREAS, The Mecklenburg County Board of Education has certified to this Board a resolution passed on April 20, 1959, showing that adequate school facilities are not now available in the Mecklenburg County Administrative Unit to comply with the requirements of Section 3 of Article IX of the Constitution of North Carolina for the maintenance of schools six months in every year, and that it is necessary, in order to maintain such six months' school term, to erect additional school buildings and other school plant facilities, remodel, enlarge and reconstruct existing school buildings and other school plant facilities, and acquire necessary land, rights of way and equipment therefor, to provide additional elementary and secondary school facilities in said Unit, the estimated cost of which is \$4,075,000; and

WHEREAS, said resolutions request the Board of Commissioners to take all necessary steps, by the issuance of bonds or otherwise, in order that such additional school facilities may be provided; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners has carefully examined the facts and has determined and does hereby find as a fact that said statements of the above mentioned resolutions are true and that it has become the duty of said Board of Commissioners, acting as an administrative agent of the State in providing a State system of public schools, to order the issuance of bonds of the County of Mecklenburg so that the school facilities mentioned in paragraph 1 of this order and in said resolutions may be provided in order to maintain the six months' school term in the County of Mecklenburg as required by Section 3 of Article IX of the Constitution, now, therefore,

BE IT ORDERED AND RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners for the County of Mecklenburg:

1. That, pursuant to The County Finance Act, as amended, and in order to maintain the six months school term in the County of Mecklenburg as required by Section 3 of Article IX of the Constitution, the County of Mecklenburg, North Carolina is hereby authorized to contract a debt, in addition to any and all other debt which said County may now or hereafter have power or authority to contract, and in evidence thereof to issue School Building Bonds in an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$8,000,000 for the purpose of providing funds for erecting additional school buildings and other school plant facilities, remodeling, enlarging and reconstructing existing school buildings and other school plant facilities and acquiring necessary land, rights of way and equipment therefor, in order to provide additional elementary and secondary school facilities in the County of Mecklenburg, such bonds to be in addition to the \$8,000,000 School Building Bonds authorized by an order finally passed March 10, 1958, of which \$2,000,000 bonds have not been issued.

2. That a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and the interest on said bonds when due shall be annually levied and collected.

3. That a statement of the County debt has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

4. That this order shall take effect when approved by the voters of the County at an election as provided in said Act.

The foregoing order was finally passed on the 25th day of May, 1959, and was first published on the 26th day of May, 1959. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said order must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

Fu Manchu's Creator Dies

LONDON — Dr. Sax Rohmer, creator of the mystery story villain Dr. Fu Manchu, died last night after a long illness. He was believed to have been about 70.

The evil doctor, who set the pattern for oriental evildoers in 20th Century fiction, made his debut in 1913 in "The Mystery of Dr. Fu Manchu." In 1914 he next 44 years Rohmer, turned out a long series of Fu Manchu stories. The last, "The End of Fu Manchu," appeared in 1957.

Films and radio added to the wily Chinaman's fame.

Rohmer learned the writing trade as a young newspaperman in London's Fleet St. before World War I.

The first Fu Manchu book set him on the road to success. In the 30's he was much in demand as a film writer adapting his own works into movie scripts.

He twice killed Dr. Fu Manchu off but revived him in response to popular demand — an experience shared with Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, who once ended the life of Sherlock Holmes but later brought him back.

Rohmer's works were banned by Nazi Germany because Hitler's followers assumed from his name that he was Jewish.

fire on the craft at close range. Machine gun bullets cut down soldiers as they stepped from the ramps of the boats. Units were landed in the wrong places. Squads and companies were landed without leaders and the men milled about in an agony of confusion with no one to tell them what to do other than burrow into holes in the sand. And still they came, piling up on the beach, shoulder to shoulder.

I lay on the beach and thought: "This time we have failed. I wonder when they'll come over that bluff and finish this thing." But no gray-clad figures came down the bluff.

And suddenly I felt a strange sort of peace. The panic, fear were gone. If death had to come, then must. I climbed out of my hole and began doing what I could to help and to watch the bravest men I've ever known.

Justice Vasconci said he had no idea what a walnut tree is worth, and took the case under advisement.

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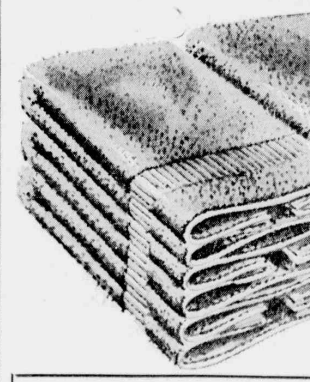

Miner Made 'Kinda Mad'

WHITESBURG, Ky. — Orville Sturgill is a man slow to anger. But right now he's "kinda mad."

His temper flared when the striking coal miner learned his family had become a news item in the Communist Party newspaper Pravda.

The paper ran a picture of Sturgill's wife and five of his eight children standing in front of their tiny cabin. It was captioned "Kentucky coal miner, 1958," and carried comment to the effect that some Americans were starving to death.

"That kinda made me mad," the slow-speaking Sturgill said. "We're having a little bit of a hard time but we're getting by all right."

As a matter of fact he'd rather be starving and be a free man than be a billionaire in Communist Russia.

STRIKE PAY

Sturgill and his family are living on \$30 a week from the United Mine Workers during the UMW strike in eastern Kentucky. They live in the one-room cabin on two acres of land Sturgill owns in a remote section of hilly Letcher County. Sturgill worked in a small truck mine near his Cram Creek home before the three-month-old strike began.

The picture of his quiet wife and barefooted youngsters was taken in April as part of Associated Press strike coverage. Sturgill is one of 7,000 miners out of work, in Letcher and six other counties.

"The kids have got shoes, too," he said.

As for the cabin, it won't be home after this weekend. The family will move into a four-room house built by Sturgill and his fellow miners elsewhere on his two acres.

"I won't owe a dime on it," Sturgill said. "That's how we do things down here. We get together and build somebody a house. Everybody helps."

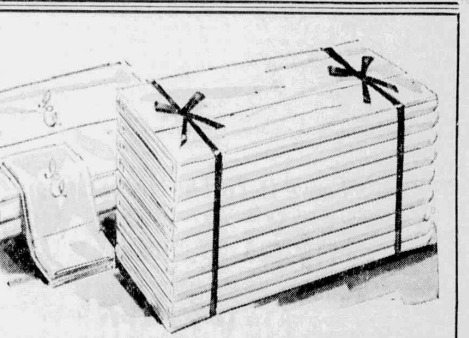
