

Peace Rules As Ecuador Takes Terms

10-Mile 'No Man's Land' Agreed On

BUENOS AIRES—(AP)—Ecuador has accepted a proposal by the United States, Brazil and Argentina to mediate her border dispute with Peru, the Argentine Foreign Ministry announced last night.

Ecuador is willing to establish a proposed "no man's land" about ten miles on either side of the disputed territory.

Demilitarization of the area should be carried out in such a way that evacuated garrisons would be guarded by police. Ecuador was reported as suggesting.

Peru's agreement to mediation was reported by the Argentine Foreign Ministry last Friday, but border garrisons clashed anew almost immediately after.

Garrisons along the frontier have clashed during the past few years in a continuation of a 10-year-old dispute over ownership of upper Amazon jungles.

The most serious recent tangle occurred July 3 and lasted three days.
