Not For Adoption

Parents To Keep Triplet Daughters

SOUTHPORT (AP)—A poor tenant farm couple with 10-day-old triplets said today they have received so many offers of help they will not consider any longer putting the babies up for adoption.

"I don't think I can possibly part with them," said the 35-year-old Mrs. Nathan B. Miller, as she waited for doctors to release her and the girl triplets from the hospital here. **WOULD REGRET IT**

"I'd live to regret it for the rest of my life," she declared emotionally. "It probably would drive me sick with worry." Miller, 35, was buying the makings of the formula the babies will get. At their five-room frame home in Wimsbrow, 30 miles from here, the Millers' three older children were preparing for the homecoming.

A telephone call during weekend reportedly offered Miller as much as \$50,000 each for the babies. He indignantly refused.

No detailed list of gifts and offers of help had been made, but the Millers had received many telephone calls, letters and telegrams. People have promised them furniture, clothing, food, money. An anonymous donor said he'd pay for \$100 worth of groceries, provided they kept the babies.

Linda, smallest of the triplets, weighed 3 pounds at birth and was kept in an incubator for a time. The other two are Brenda, 4 pounds, 11 ounces at birth, and Glenda, 5 pounds, 14 ounces.

TWO VIEWS

The older daughters, Peggy 17, and Frances, 15, were overjoyed. The son, 12-year-old Jimmy, had a more practical point of view.

"I'm glad Mommy decided to keep them, but I wish they were boys," he said. "My sisters are too scared to play football with me."

Miller, a \$25-a-week farmhand, also gets a government disability payment of \$15 a month for a peacetime army injury.

Miller said an unidentified long distance telephone caller had made him an offer of thousands of dollars for the children. "I believe he said \$100,000 each," said Miller, who is hard of hearing, "but it may have been \$3,000. I may be poor, but nothing would make me part with any of my family for money. . . I think the offer was an insult."

'Guest Books' Tell

What Do Yanks Think Of Reds?

NEW YORK (AP)—The Soviet Union has set up a direct pipeline to find out what effect the Soviet exhibition has upon American viewers.

Visitors have been asked to give their impressions in several guest books scattered around the 10-million-dollar, six-acre cultural and scientific exhibit.

Perhaps the books will be taken back to Moscow for careful scrutiny by cold war strategists. If so, here's some of what they'll read:

"Big Brother is watching you."

"I saw this on July 4, 1959, a date commemorative of American independence—thank God for it."

"Russian music is for the birds—if they'll take it."

"Why don't you practice what you preach and the world situation might be a little better."

"It's not the showcase that counts—it's action and good will."

"So what else is new?"

"Let my people go. (signed) A Jew."

"I note that you display vividly the German cruel treatment of your people. I have not seen pictures of your treatment of the Poles or the people of Latvia, Hungary, to mention a few."

"I missed seeing your typical Russian home (dump) and your labor camps (Slave camps)."

" weren't there many Jews in the throwing off of the yoke of the Czar? But not a Jewish name is among your great leaders. How come?"

Several writers were apparently shocked by some of the comments.

"Reading the insults and lack of understanding recorded in this book almost makes me ashamed to admit these are my countrymen."

To these apostolites one writer wrote:

"Maybe these so-called comments (really facts) wouldn't be written if the Russians really strived for peace, but let's face it, their ultimate goal is the overthrow of our government."

Crewmen Flee Burning Ship Off Louisiana Coast

Stricken Vessel Beached

CAMERON, La. (AP)—The master and crew abandoned the flaming Belgian motorship Anvers early today moments after the stricken vessel was beached.

The Coast Guard said magnesium explosions prevented any attempts to board the ship and fight the fire.

The ship's master, Henri Sanger, and the remaining 11 men on the vessel were taken to Cameron, five miles southwest of where the Anvers was beached.

TOWED INTO PORT

Two lifeboats with 26 other crew members, including the master's wife, were towed into Cameron earlier from the vessel.

A Coast Guard spokesman said one U.S. Navy man, not identified, received a possible fractured ankle in the latest maneuver.

The Anvers, which sails out of Antwerp, was towed to within three miles of shore before it was abandoned.

The 442-foot vessel has a gross tonnage of 3,153. Its cargo consisted of iron, cotton, lumber, iron ore, carbon black, synthetic latex, menhaden fish oil and rice. It was bound from Freeport, Tex., to Lake Charles, La.

The ship was anchored about six miles south of Cameron when the fire broke out.

FOAM FAILURE

Some 700 gallons of foam, flown to Lake Charles and then brought here by truck, apparently reached the scene too late. Earlier efforts to fly foam to the water went awry after six foam canisters burst when dropped to the area.

The Coast Guard said the fire started in the engine room and raced out of control to the number four hold. There were two injuries but no death reports.

Ex-Judge Faces Murder Charge

CHESTERFIELD, S.C. (AP)—W. E. Redfern, who has appeared before a variety of South Carolina tribunals in the past 18 months, goes to court again Tuesday—this time charged with murder.

The former Chesterfield County probate judge is to be tried for the pistol slaying last October of his long-time friend, Randolph Hursey, 56. Hursey was fatally wounded at his Chesterfield funeral home.

Apparently, there were no witnesses to the shooting. Redfern claims it was an accident.

A long trial is indicated. Defense attorney T. Lamar Caudle says he will be ready with 30 defense witnesses when the case is called in General Sessions Court.

Circuit Solicitor Robert Kilgo of Darlington, the state prosecutor, says he also will be ready to try the case. The trial has been postponed three times since last November for various reasons.

Redfern was charged early last year by ex-Gov. George Bell Timmerman Jr., with running a marriage mill at the Chesterfield probate office, and with drunkenness and misconduct.

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Redfern contested Mrs. Pussier's qualifications for the general election returns in a series of hearings before the State Board of Canvassers and the South Carolina Supreme Court.

The court finally ruled that Mrs. Pussier was the duly qualified probate judge.

Chicago Visit

Royal Couple Gets Rousing Welcome

CHICAGO (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II stepped ashore in Chicago today to a greeting of army artillery, ships' whistles, and the cheers of thousands of spectators massed around Buckingham Fountain Landing.

A cordon of police struggled to hold back other thousands trying to approach the reviewing stand on the dock.

The royal yacht, Britannia's barge brought Elizabeth and Prince Philip ashore promptly at 10 a.m. The yacht was moored outside the breakwater.

A 21-gun salute began when the launch started toward shore. In close formation, a flight of jet fighters roared low over the scene. Hundreds of small pleasure craft followed the barge.

It looked like an amphibious assault, a scene reminiscent of World War II.

13-HOUR DAY

So began the Queen's 13-hour day in Chicago.

The Queen was wearing a short-sleeved summer dress, elbow-length white gloves, a flowered hat and a string of pearls.

She was smiling and looked rested after spending all day Sunday on the voyage from the Queen Mary, Canada, to Chicago.

C. S. Chief of Protocol Wiley Buchanan greeted the Queen and Philip officially. The royal couple then passed down a long line of officials, including the

ambassadors to the United States from the United Kingdom and six Commonwealth nations.

An honor guard of soldiers, sailors and marines stood stiffly at attention while the band saluted Elizabeth with "God Save the Queen." It followed with the "Star Spangled Banner."

Prince Philip stood beside Canada's Prime Minister John G. Diefenbaker during the playing of the anthems.

QUEEN ESCORTED

Gov. William G. Stratton of Illinois and Mayor Richard J. Daley of Chicago escorted the Queen as she reviewed the guard of honor.

With pious pointed toward shore, 20 U. S. warships—the greatest concentration in Lake Michigan since the War of 1812—lined up in tight formation during the ceremonies.

The white-uniformed crews were massed on deck, standing at attention.

Stratton, welcoming the Queen and her husband, said, "We hold a great and deep affection for you personally."

He said her visit to Chicago would "strengthen the bonds that tie Britain and the United States together so closely."

The mayor wished the royal couple "a most pleasant and happy stay" in the city.

Replying, the Queen said, "My husband and I are very glad to be here. We have been looking forward for a long time to visiting the City of Chicago and the State of Illinois."

"You will find us very keen and inquisitive sightseers," she said. They then entered the automobile to go to the first stop, the International Trade Fair.

Council Gets Revised Code For Building

A revised City Building Code that will set up a Building Standards Board was scheduled to be given the City Council today for study.

Acting Chief Building Inspector James B. Bell said the revision is not call for his changes.

"They put into more usable form what we have," he said. One of the chief functions of the seven-member Building Standards Board will be to study the present city code and recommend changes that will bring it up to date. The recommendations will go to the City Council.

BOARD OF APPEAL

The proposed board also will give technical assistance to the building inspection department and act as a board of appeal.

It is the hope of Mr. Bell's office that eventually all building codes for Charlotte can be consolidated into the state code and a supplement.

Before the proposed revised building code can become effective, it must be approved by the North Carolina Building Council which meets July 14.

It may be too late to have the code approved at this meeting, Mrs. Bell said. The council meets every six months, and a called meeting might be possible.

Membership on the Building Standards Board would consist of an architect, an engineer, a general contractor, a home builder, a member of the Electrical Advisory Board and a representative each from the plumbing and mechanical equipment industries.

These members would be named by the city manager with the approval of the City Council.

At present the different codes—er "pieces" of codes as Mr. Bell calls them—are contained in a handful of pamphlets. They cover heating, gas, oil burning equipment, electrical and plumbing work.

The revisions scheduled to go to the City Council today are to be found in Article 1 of the City Building Code and Chapter 7 of the City Code. Changes involve administration and procedure.

Also added to the code are 1958 additions of the North Carolina Code and the 1958 North Carolina Uniform Residential Code. The residential code is not law, Mr. Bell said, but a recommended code of the North Carolina Building Inspectors.

The uniform residential code is not vastly different from the existing city code, but it goes into greater detail, Mr. Bell said.

Road Fatalities Down

Violence Takes Staggering Toll

Traffic deaths over the Independence Day weekend were far under the pre-holiday estimate of 350 but the nation's overall violent deaths hit a staggering toll.

Traffic fatalities were less than the 310 reported over last Memorial Day, also a weekend and covering a 54-hour period.

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However, only one traffic death was reported in Chicago. New York and Texas reported the most drownings, 19 and 18, respectively.

Carolinas Violence Takes 18

At least 18 persons died by violence in the Carolinas during the July 4 holiday, 13 of them in North Carolina. Eight of the North Carolina fatalities were on the roads.

The eight highway fatalities were just over half of last year's 15.

South Carolina's record was even better, with only one highway death reported last Sunday night. The state had four drownings.

Two Charlotte men, Alexander Webb, 38, and Francis J. King, 41, were killed when their auto was struck from behind near Monroe.

Mrs. Betty Willford Faison, 39, of Clayton, died in a two-car collision on U.S. 64 near Asheville.
