

Neither Red Nor Dead, President Promises

Kennedy Given Honorary Degree

President John F. Kennedy stood beneath a cloudless blue sky in Kemm Stadium here today and told the world, "We shall be neither Red nor dead, but alive and free—responsible to the traditions of North Carolina and the Nation."

More than 30,000 persons were in the stadmin to hear the President, who had come to Chapel Hill to accept an honorary degree and help the University celebrate its

His 14-minute speech was not a major foreign policy address, as had been widely expected, but amounted rather to reassurance to the people of the United States and a call for calm courage, firm resolve, and realistic under-standing of the world situation.

"Our task is to do our best," the President said.
"Not to be swerved by the faint-hearted, the unknowing, or threats."

In reference to the North Carolina motto, "Esse Quam Videri," Mr. Kennedy said, "What this country needs is men who look at things as they are rather than as they seem to be."

But, he warned, "It is a dangerous delusion to be fieve that the policies of the United States can be accomplished in one slogan.

"All of us here are destined to live out our lives in uncertainty," the President said, and the American proone-ctainty, the President said, and the Andreas po-ple should met expect either total victory or total defeat. "Whether honorary or carned, the degree is a proud symbol of the University and the State," said. "I am honored to be admitted to the fellowship of this honored and ancient University." He said that North Carolina had long been an elight-

ened state and that he could think of no better reason for this than the University here. He cited the long list of leaders who have gone forth

from the University, mentioning Luther Hodges, former Governor of North Carolina and now Kennedy's Secre-tary of Commerce; Frank Graham, former president of the University, former U. S. Senator, and now a United Nations mediator; and Gordon Gray, also a former president of the University who has held high positions in Republican and Democratic administrations, Referring to himself as one who had come from "a

small kand-grant college in Massachusetts, Harvard," the (Continued on Page 8)
