

### Harrison Sheriff Continues Raids Along Rural Road

GULFPORT, Miss. (AP)—Harrison County Sheriff Curtis Dedeaux continued his rural-road raids, cleaning up gambling, narcotics, prostitution and whisky. The latest raids Thursday night brought charges against nine persons for a narcotics and prostitution operation in a rural area north of Biloxi.

These followed raids against four establishments two nights earlier, three against gambling, and a fourth in which \$22,000 worth of whisky was destroyed in a beachfront store.

Dedeaux said the gambling raids were postponed three weeks because of recent municipal elections. The whisky store owner, Mrs. Myrtle Walker, said her stock was destroyed because she refused to give Dedeaux four cases of whisky for an election party.

Narcotics charges were filed against Al C. Roberson, 50, bootlegger and ex-convict; Grady D. Allen, 58; and Mrs. Fay Allen, 55. Allen and Roberson were listed as owners of the raided Alcatraz Club.

Prostitution charges were filed against Alfred E. Stewart, 24, a Biloxi cab driver; Troy Jordan, 63, operator of the club; and three men and an unidentified woman. The Allen was arrested at a tourist court Friday morning and Roberson and two unidentified men were arrested at Roberson's home.

Syringes, needles, cooking spoons, distilled water and drugs were confiscated at the house.

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI) — Two airmen were killed Saturday when their T-33 jet fighter crashed on a runway at Maxwell AFB here, marring a gigantic Armed Forces Day celebration. Identification of the victims were withheld pending notification of next of kin. Authorities reported the fighter crashed at the south end of the runway near U. S. Highway 31 north.

Thousands of persons witnessing Air Force flyovers and other exhibits at Maxwell, rated the second busiest military airport in the nation, were shocked by the flaming crash. An Air Force official said, "The victim's bodies will be brought to the military hospital here. Thank God the bird didn't go down in the crowd — the accident could have been very much worse."

An audience of about 400 parents and school children assembled at the school to watch the show. The performers were kindergarten and first grade pupils.

The Rev. S. S. Morris, Chicago president of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said "We feel it (such shows) helps to perpetuate a racial stereotype that misrepresents the Negro. I'm surprised such a thing was even planned in Chicago."

### Delta Council Blasts Omnibus Farm Bill At Senate Hearing

STONEVILLE — George C. Cortright, past president of Delta Council and chairman of the Farm Policy Committee, presented the Council's views on the Omnibus Farm Bill in Washington Thursday before the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry.

Cortright said the bill is a complete departure from "time-proven concepts of government-farmer relations," and that it failed to provide proper guidelines for program administration and development so carefully included in all prior farm legislation.

"It appears that Congress would be relinquishing the major portion of its legislative prerogatives, retaining only a veto power over certain kinds of farm programs," Cortright stated. "Delta farmers do not wish Congress to abdicate any of its legislative authorities to the Executive Branch."

Cortright said that, while the Secretary should seek producer advice in formulating new programs, any legislation authorizing advisory committees should provide for the "free agent status" of the committee structure.

SINCE no advisory committee could represent all viewpoints of agricultural interests, "it is absolutely necessary" that programs get "full congressional review," Cortright stated.

Delta Council also opposed extension of marketing orders to cotton and other basic commodities; the substitution of baleage and poundage allotments for acreage allotments; a compensatory payments and dollar limitations on participation in agricultural programs; elimination of the minimum national acreage allotment for cotton; authority to set price supports between 8 and 90 percent of parity for basic commodities; authority to exempt certain classes of farms from marketing quotas; and changes in the method of distributing col-

ton acreage allotments. "With good administration of the current program, the future of cotton can be bright," Cortright said. "Great progress has been made in supply and market adjustments for cotton, both in the United States and in the Free World. The carryover in the United States has been reduced to a manageable level and Free World consumption of cotton has been outstripping production in recent years," Cortright said.

**Ole Miss 'Sit-Ins' Keep Library Open**  
UNIVERSITY, Miss. (AP) — About 75 University of Mississippi students, backed in spirit by school administrators, stayed an after-hours sit-in at the school library.

The students studied through the library's 5 p.m. closing time about an hour before campus police ordered them out Friday night.

A spokesman said they were protesting the library's abbreviated weekend hours.

Saturday about 200 students again "sat-in" after closing hours; officials relented and announced the library would remain open to 10 p. m.

Chancellor J. D. Williams said he was "tickled to death at the protest. I'm all for it."

**Federal Prisons Have Trouble With 'Black Muslims'**  
WASHINGTON (AP)—A tough Negro group of Black Muslims is giving federal prison authorities an extremely difficult time.

"I have been in this business a long time and have never met a more aggressive, hostile group," director James V. Bennett of the Bureau of Prisons told Congress. "They are a very . . . hate-conscious group."

Bennett said the Muslims "believe in the ultimate dominance of the colored race" and "refuse to acknowledge anything from the white man or . . . accept any kind of leadership from our officers. They are anti-authoritarian in every way possible."

Bennett said there had been a number of what he called "strong-arm punch-outs" at Terre Haute last year among the Muslims. "We have had a number of efforts of one prisoner to knife another because he would not join up with this group," he said.

### Charge Truck Driver With Rape Of Child

CRYSTAL SPRINGS (UPI) — A white truck driver has been charged with attempting to rape a 9-year-old Negro girl, it was revealed Saturday.

He was arrested Thursday after some Negroes reported he had picked up the girl in his truck and raped her.

However, Sheriff Woodrow Purser said two doctors examined the child and found no indications of rape or attempted rape. Authorities said the charge would probably be reduced to fondling.

The man was released under bond. Officers did not reveal the identities of the man or the girl.
