WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Suhrawardy of Pakistan said today international Communism continues to be a "major threat" to the security of the free world.

### Urges Dulles Trip

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont) proposed today that Secretary of State Dulles visit eastern Europe for a "first-hand exploration" of changes behind the Iron Curtain.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Democratic and Republican floor managers joined today in predicting House passage without major change of the foreign aid bill approved by the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

### Act Held Illegal

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—The U. S. 4th Circuit Court of Appeals today held as unconstitutional Virginia's pupil placement act. Attorneys for the school authorities said promptly they will seek a review by the U. S. Supreme Court.

### Long Probe Likely

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Long (D-La.) said today the Senate Finance Committee's investigation of the country's financial condition may last longer than the two-year term of the present Congress.

## Extension Opponents Get Busy

The tempo of the drive for city limits extension picked up today — and so did the opposition.

The Monday vote is expected to be large and all-out efforts will be made over the weekend by both groups.

Opposition groups popped up in the perimeter area yesterday and today. Opponents have vowed to stage a heated campaign during the 48 hours before the polls open.

Mimeographed letters have been circulated and an advertisement appears in The News today. The ad was signed by the "Perimeter Citizens Committee" and sponsored by 10 perimeter residents.

While yesterday's News poll showed strong sentiment for extension within the city limits and a sizeable vote for extension in the perimeter area, Carl G. McCraw warned, "We must not slacken our efforts to get out a large vote and to make certain all of us go to the polls on Monday. We can't have a false sense of security despite the encouraging results of The News survey."

Mr. McCraw is chairman of a special Chamber of Commerce committee which was organized to help put over extension. More than 23,000 letters were mailed by the volunteer workers—who number more than 2,000—and 45,000 post cards were mailed to another group of registered voters.

Monday 20,000 residents will receive telephone calls.

## Boys, Police Shoot It Out

GREENSBORO (AP)—Two 18-year-old Greensboro youths suspected originally of auto theft, reckless driving and speeding are in more serious trouble today.

One is in a hospital here where he is being treated for two bullet wounds, one self-inflicted and one from a police pistol. He is Raymond (Rocky) Payne.

The other is J. E. France, who surrendered after the pair waged a gun battle with police in a wooded section near High Point.

Highway Patrolmen and Greensboro police tell this story of the chase and subsequent gun battle.

## 3 Dead In Six-Inch Rainfall

CHICAGO (AP)—Boats plied flooded streets today in the swamped Chicago metropolitan area after a 6.24-inch rain took at least three lives and drove hundreds from their homes.

The downpour, concentrated in a severe six-hour electrical storm, flooded tens of thousands of basements, blocked streets and underpasses, and cut power and communications lines.

In Chicago, itself, airline traffic was held at flooded Midway airport where at least 1,000 stranded passengers and motorists spent the night, splashing through foot in waiting rooms or catnapping in chairs or atop newsstands and counters.

**300 REMOVED**  
Joliet, a city of 51,900 just southwest of Chicago, 200 persons were taken from their flooded homes by boat, and a refugee center was set up in the Veterans of Foreign Wars Hall. Coast Guard craft were trucked to Wheeling, northwest of Chicago, where a number of houses were inundated.

The bodies of three persons were recovered in flooded basements. William Lenn, 38, was electrocuted in his flooded basement on Chicago's South Side. Atella Toney, 7 months old, was drowned in shallow water that covered the floor of a basement apartment.

At New Lenox, 5 miles east of Joliet, Richard Campbell was found dead in the flooded basement of his home. The cause of death was not immediately determined.

## SITUATION WORSENS

The flood situation at Joliet, where 1,000 houses were partly inundated, worsened today as waters from Hickory and Spring Creeks continued to spread.

The Weather Bureau said that 2.49 inches of rain at Midway Airport set an unofficial record for a six-hour period.

More than 30 persons were injured, none seriously, when gusty winds knocked down a tent theater on the Southwest Side during an evening performance. About 250 persons were watching a play when the canvas roof and supports came crashing down.

The battering winds and rain played havoc with transportation and communication. Hundreds of cars stalled in deep water.

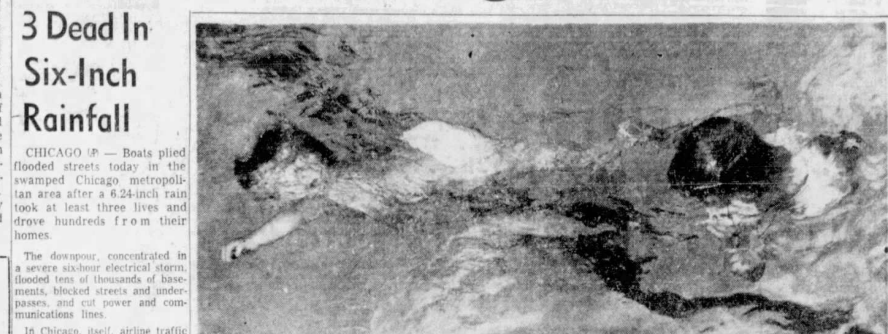
Two of the city's main transportation arteries—the Outer and Lake Shore Drives and the Congress Street Expressway—were closed for a time when as much as four feet of water piled up in spots.

The Illinois Bell Telephone Co. reported 5,800 telephones out in the city limits and 2,000 more in the suburbs.

Public power companies said power lines were down in at least 300 places in the Chicago area.

## Rights Measure Cutting Urged

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) urged the Senate today to strike out of the Eisenhower administration's civil rights bill its most controversial provision—a section which backers call the heart of the measure.

"I was never more serious in my life," Russell told his colleagues as he proposed three major changes in the House-passed bill. One would give the Senate a measure of control over the proposed civil rights investigation committee.

Another would delete from the bill the proposed authority for the attorney general to go into federal courts and seek injunctions against violations or threatened violations of voting or other civil rights.

Supporters of the bill maintain that without such a provision the measure could not be enforced.

Business, quarterback of Southern Democrats fighting the bill, proposed the changes as the Senate met in an unusual Saturday session to give members a chance to spread their views on the record.

Backers cleared a first hurdle yesterday, when no objection was raised to a Senate vote late Tuesday on a motion by Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) to bring the bill up for a vote.

That did not foreclose the possibility of a Southern filibuster against the bill later. Much appeared to hinge on the results of compromise moves.

Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.) said he is consulting with colleagues of both parties about a possible substitute for the administration bill.

## Choice Of Wayne Nick Upsets Guardsmen

High officers of the North Carolina National Guard expressed disappointment today over the appointment to the state's top military job of a man with a limited military background.

Gov. Hodges yesterday named veteran politician Capus Wayne Nick of High Point to the \$9,700 year position of state adjutant general.

He succeeds John Hall Manning who served in the Army Reserve from 1918 to 1929.

## TEMPERATURE FORECAST IS STILL 90-PLUS

A long stretch of 90-plus temperatures is expected to last over the weekend, but there is a slight chance of cooling thunder showers tomorrow night.

Yesterday the mercury went all the way to 97. Today should be 97 degrees with 95 seen for Sunday.

Tonight temperatures are expected to drop to 72, three degrees higher than the lowest temperature last night.

Skies are expected to be partly cloudy tomorrow and Monday. All of today — clear and warm.

## Judge Studies Riot Newsreels

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—U.S. district Judge Robert L. Taylor was studying three newsreel films today, preparatory to deciding whether the government may use them in the trial of the "Clinton 15" and John Kasper, fiery Negro segregationist.

"Not all of what the films contain has been disclosed. But it appeared that defense attorneys were fighting hard to keep the all-white jury from seeing them. By agreement, they said, lawyers on both sides declined to discuss this point."

Taylor saw the newsreels in his chambers after yesterday's session of the trial — the last until Monday — ended. Attorneys were closed with him more than an hour.

When they came out, they said only that the judge would rule on the admissibility of the pictures "at a subsequent date."
