Truck Lines Face Charges

ASHEVILLE — Criminal charges against eight motor carriers, charging them with violations of the Interstate Commerce Act in the transportation of textiles from western North Carolina to New York and other points were filed here today by U. S. District Attorney James M. Bailey Jr.

Names on the list were Homer S. Robinson, an individual doing business as W. R. Candler Transfer Co., Asheville; Akers Motor Lines Inc., Gastonia; Associated Transport Inc., Charlotte; Carolina Freight Carrier Corp., Charlotte; Harris Express Inc., Charlotte; Johnson Motor Lines Inc., Charlotte; Southern Motor Express Inc., Gastonia; and the Mason and Dixon Lines Inc., Kingsport, Tenn.

The charges were filed as a result of an investigation conducted by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The investigation disclosed a widespread disregard on the part of both the motor carriers and the shippers, Bailey said.

BURGLAR LIKES 'THE STEALTH AND THE DARK'

SEATTLE (AP) — "If I had \$100,000, I'd still pull burglaries," a salacious youth said Tuesday as he told how he burgled more than 100 Seattle homes after throwing rocks through the windows.

"It just sort of came natural, used to like to throw baseballs," Walter E. Kinnell, 22, told newsmen and police.

"I got a big thrill out of it," he said. "I like the stealth and the dark. I could easy be 160 places."

Kinnell was arrested last November and admitted 160 burglaries. Because he had no prior record, sentencing was deferred for three years.

Driver Of Speeding Car Apprehended

CONCORD — A 19-year-old Negro, picked up by sheriff's deputies as he walked along Highway 29 this morning, has admitted leading police officers on a high-speed chase through two counties last night.

Chatham sheriff's deputies Hoyt Smith and Earl Allen said Eddie David Andrews of Harrisville, S.C., has admitted stealing the car and fleeing from the police officers.

The deputies said Andrews at first denied being the driver of a 1958 Chevrolet Impala that was wrecked near here last night. The car was stolen yesterday afternoon from Dr. Reece Funderburke of Lancaster, S.C.

Andrews lost control of the car on a curve on W. Depot St. It spun around in the road and slammed into a bridge.

HID IN JUNK

The Negro youth told officers he jumped out of the car and hid in a nearby junk yard until the federal police subsided. He then built a fire to keep warm until daylight when he left his hiding place and began walking.

He was picked up about two miles from the wreck scene.

Andrews told deputies he had served six months in a federal prison on charges of transporting an automobile across a state line and had spent a year in a South Carolina prison on charges of breaking and entering and grand larceny.

He said he was headed to Pennsylvania when the police began chasing him last night.

Deputies said Andrews will be turned over to Charlotte police and the FBI.

Tots Found Dead At Rural Home

HIBERNIA, N. J. (AP) — The bodies of two babies were found jammed into a clothes basket in a rural home last night. One had been bludgeoned, the other suffocated.

The children, Katherine Church, 2, and her brother, Kenneth, 6 months, were found swathed in a blanket.

Police Chief Ernest Powers said the mother, Ellen Church, 38, a former schoolteacher, will be given a psychiatric examination. No charges have been filed.

Brooks Church, 40, a microbus driver, came home from work to find his wife and two other children, Elizabeth, 14, and Stephen, 9, under the influence of drugs. The children later told police their mother gave them sleeping tablets and told them they were calcium pills.

Powers said Mrs. Church told Robert Burdge, a friend of the family, that she had killed the babies.

NEVER COMING BACK

Her husband quoted her as saying: "They are gone away and are never coming back."

Church told police: "I can't believe it. She was a wonderful wife and mother."

The Churches moved here several years ago from Youngstown, Ohio. Church, 40, works for the Warner-Lambert Pharmaceutical Co. at nearby Royal Plaines.

The bodies of the babies were found in a playhouse 30 feet from the Church home.

Police said Katherine had been bludgeoned with a blunt instrument but they had not determined what it was. Kenneth died of suffocation, police said.

Hibernia is about 40 miles west of New York City.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — A 19-year-old student and his bride spent their first day at home yesterday beating off demands of the bride's children that they end their marriage.

Paul Dunn and Mrs. Lola Tipton Dunn, 69, said they were wed Monday in Covington, Tenn., by County Judge Stanley Shoaf and intend to stay that way.

"I told them I have already promised before God and witnesses to stand by him always, and I will," said Mrs. Dunn.

They met about a year ago when Dunn, studying accounting at a business school, rented a room from his future wife. "I was lost within the world and had no one to care," he said. "She looked to me to be the same."

Mrs. Dunn, a widow 19 years, said she first felt "very sympathetic to him. And later we fell in love. We tried to fight it. He moved out for a month. And then we gave in."

Mrs. Dunn declined to identify her son and daughter, both of whom are married. She said her son is in his mid-thirties and her daughter about 40.

"They told me they're afraid of all the humiliation and he thinks he'll lose his position," Mrs. Dunn said.

Youngsters' Prank Leads To Charges

SAN FRANCISCO — Two little boys who invaded a branch of the world's largest bank on a holiday note, hoped to be cleared of attempted robbery charges today.

Little Dan McKay, 9, and big Danny Husk, 13, school boys on Easter vacation, simulated a bank holiday deposit, seeking some play money.

Trouble is, officials of the Bank of America—the world's largest—looked seriously. And a dragnet of 15 policemen and FBI agents took the bank seriously.

So, when the youngsters returned home from a movie, they were arrested and turned over to the San Francisco Youth Guidance Center. The charges: attempted bank robbery.

"They cried when we surrounded them," said Inspector William Porter.

Big Dan's mother, Mrs. Wilma Husk, said "The boys meant no harm, although they shouldn't have done it."

"Danny has never been in any trouble," she said. "He hasn't even been absent from school without my knowing of it. I gave him a dollar to go to the movie."

President Says U. S. Will Not Be Forced

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower said today he believes the Western allies will have to meet at the summit with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to get any sort of valid agreement on German problems.

But no one is going to command the United States and the other Western powers to show up at a top level conference, the President told a news conference emphatically.

"The West will not be bluffed or blackmailed into going to the summit," he said.

Eisenhower said this anew, although indirectly, that his attendance at any summit meeting will be contingent on progress at an earlier conference of East-West foreign ministers.

The President was asked specifically whether he attaches any conditions to meeting at the summit with Khrushchev and this country's Western allies.

BRITISH REPORT

At the time of Eisenhower's talk with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan there were reports from British quarters that Eisenhower had agreed unconditionally to go to a summit meeting.

Today the President noted that the reply of the Western Allies to a March 2 Soviet note regarding a summit conference has now been coordinated with the North Atlantic Treaty organization. The reply, he added, will be made public soon, and the answer to the matter of any conditions in connection with a summit meeting will be disclosed in that note.

But he went on to say that his convictions concerning a summit conference have been known for years and that he never has changed them.

He added he doesn't expect to change them unless something cataclysmic develops.

That was an obvious allusion to his statements, as recently as a week ago, that he would go to a summit meeting if developments in the meantime should warrant it.

At another point Eisenhower was asked to explain just what he had in mind when he said last week in a nationwide television radio address that there must be justification for a summit meeting.

He replied that he meant progress — obviously at an earlier foreign ministers conference — would justify a top level conference.

Still later at today's session with newsmen, Eisenhower said whether he felt anything worthwhile could come of a meeting with Soviet representatives at anything less than the summit was a question he was not checking with Khrushchev.

The President replied it is perfectly clear that Khrushchev is the only man with sufficient authority to negotiate for the Soviet Union with the West and make it stick.

As Russian of lesser status, he said, would have to be on the telephone to Moscow all the time checking with Khrushchev.

The President went on then to say if we are going to get anything of substance from the Russians—if we are going to get a deal agreement—then Khrushchev has got to be in the picture.

Posse Hunts Gunman Who Shot Officer

BROWNVILLE, Ore. (AP) — Armed posses searched warily today for a gunman who abetted one police chief, then shot another before fleeing in the timbered foothills of the Cascade Range.

The gunman, said Sheriff George Miller, is Richard Allen Hunt, 27, a Harrisburg, Ore. dairy worker armed with a pistol, a .30 caliber carbine and 300 rounds of ammunition.

More than 100 policemen were pressed into the search for Hunt, and later they were joined by FBI agents from Portland.

The FBI said the 5-10, 160-pound Hunt once was an inmate at the Montana State Prison, and was sought on a federal warrant that charged interstate transportation of a stolen car.

At Harrisburg last Tuesday, police chief Ernest McPhee sought to arrest Hunt for having improper license plates on his car.

McPhee was taken prisoner at gun point. He was released 19 miles out of town.

McPhee phoned ahead to Brownville, alerting police chief Robert Kennow and state police Gene Richardson.

A few minutes later, they spotted Hunt retreating his car in a service station here, and gave chase as the dairy worker sped out of town.

It was on the outskirts of Brownville, a little town in western Oregon, that Hunt's car veered out of control into a ditch.

Hunt raced from the car into the shelter of a nearby barn.

In the exchange of shots that followed, Kennow slumped to the ground, a bullet wound in the head.

As the state police rallied for help, residents of the area saw Hunt flee from the barn, splash across a waist-deep creek and vanish into a timbered ridge.

Later, on the other side of the ridge, police found fresh footprints. They led into a clump of brush and then stopped.

Bands of armed men roamed through the forest. Cascade Mountain foothills until darkness fell, then they set up mobile patrols along backwoods roads.

Firemen Rescue 'Locked Up' Cop

The tables were turned on City Policeman W. R. Sellers last night.

He got locked up. "I wanted tooller for help," Sellers said, "but I was too embarrassed."

Sellers was walking his beat around midnight when he came upon an open door in an office building at 232 N. Tryon St., near E. 7th St. He went in to investigate. Nothing was wrong — he thought.

DOOR LOCKED

But when he went to the

door to leave it was locked.

"Somebody locked that door with a key," Sellers said. "I sure wish I knew who it was."

"I was trapped. I couldn't get out and I couldn't get to a phone."

"I just decided to stand there and wait for a beat man to come around and check."

"After about 25 minutes one came around and shone his flashlight through the door and saw me."

"What in the devil are you doing in there?" he bellowed.

JUST GET ME OUT

"I told him just to get me out and quit talking."

The only way Sellers could get

out was through a second-story window.

So a call was put into the fire department to send a "fire truck" with a ladder.

"The only trouble is," fireman R. L. Cooper said, "we ain't got a little truck with a ladder so we took a big truck."

The firemen took off with their siren blaring.

By the time they got there about 10 policemen were standing on the street razzing Sellers.

"The cap'n knows where you are," one officer yelled, "but he says you ain't worth getting down."

Sellers said, "That ston on

the fire truck was the loudest thing I've ever heard."

The policemen wouldn't let the firemen go to the rescue until they could get pictures of their trapped buddy.

"Our first aim is the preservation of life," Cooper said. "So we dispatched two men up the ladder immediately with orders to help policeman any way they could."

"I don't know if that guy is normally red-faced or not, but if he isn't he sure was embarrassed."

"I told the boy when he came down that we'd help the policeman any time we can except at the policeman-firemen baseball game."
