West, Soviets Resume Talks On Nuclear Control

U.S. Would Divide Test Suspension Problem Into Two Parts

GENEVA (AP)—The United States and Britain asked the Soviet Union today to agree to prompt completion of suspension of nuclear weapons tests on or near the surface of the earth—leaving the problem of other types of blasts for later negotiations.

Informants said the proposal for splitting up the test suspension problem. It was advanced as the three-power talks resumed after an Easter recess. First Soviet reaction was reported to be negative.

Under the new Western plan, agreement would be reached at once on banning surface and atomic nuclear tests—the ones which cause dangerous radioactive fallout.

Such an agreement would not cover very high altitude and underground atomic and hydrogen weapons blasts. Such explosions are difficult to police in any event—could be covered in some subsequent agreement reached after the first problem had been solved.

U.S. Ambassador James J. Wadsworth and British Minister of State David O'Malley proposed dividing the nuclear problem into two parts with the idea of getting quick agreement on the types of tests easiest to detect. The ending of such tests also would avoid any health hazards to the world's population.

The sources pointed out that the United States and Britain would prefer an agreement covering the entire range of tests. But Western powers recognized that this conference, which began its work on Oct. 31, was bogged down on East-West differences about controls.

Presumably the limited agreement suggested as a first step would require less elaborate policing arrangements than a total ban. The Western powers would have to build in foolproof controls built into any type of agreement they sign.

Not Acceptable
Soviet Delegate Semyon Tsarapkin told reporters after today's session that the Soviet Union "it is not acceptable, we have got to stop everything."

Nye Back Home in Whiting, Ind., After Being Given Suspended Death Sentence by Cuban Military Court

WHITING, Ind. (AP)—Alan Robert Nye was back home with his family here today and said he wants to return quickly to his imprisonment in Cuba and suspended death sentence for the alleged plot to kill Premier Fidel Castro.

The 31-year-old former U. S. Navy flier landed at Midway Airport in Chicago Sunday night on the flight to his home. Less than 20 hours after a Cuban Military Tribunal pronounced a death sentence for hundreds of civilian prisoners held by Fidel Castro's government.

Meeting in Santa Clara during the weekend, the Rotarians said conditions in Cuba have returned to normal. Nye was released from prison, which prevents police from holding prisoners for long periods without formal charges should be re-established as a university recognized human right.

However, the Tribunal suspended the sentence on condition Nye leave Cuba within 48 hours. Nye, who steadfastly maintained his innocence during his 106 days in jail and at the trial, was greeted at the airport by his mother, Mrs. Joseph Lynch, 51.

"We're all right now, mom, aren't we?" Nye asked while embracing his mother. "Don't cry. We're safe now."

Then the gangling Nye, appearing jubilant, turned and kissed his stepfather, Daniel Lynch, who had attended Nye's trial in Havana and flew back with him and his attorney Joseph P. Sullivan of Whiting.

Both Nye and Sullivan declined to comment on Nye's conviction on charges of conspiring to kill Castro, the rebel leader, while Castro was fighting to overthrow the Cuban Dictator Fulgencio Batista. Nye was arrested last December and was a prisoner in the grim La Cabana Fortress overlooking Havana since January.

Pressing in khaki trousers, a tan cloth jacket, blue sports shirt and black combat boots, Nye told reporters in Chicago: "I'm just glad to be home. I'm going to Whiting and get a good rest."

Sen. Kennedy To Decide In '60 If He Will Run

Massachusetts Democrat Confers With Indiana Leaders

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) said today he will decide "early in 1960" whether he will seek the 1960 presidential nomination.

Asked at a news conference about reports that many party professionals are not for him, Kennedy said, "I find no unanimity of opinion among professionals as to the nominee."

Kennedy lunched here with Frank E. McKinney, Democratic national chairman under former President Truman; Frank M. Hale, former national committee chairman; former Gov. Henry F. Schricker, Prosecutor Philip L. Bay and Mayor Charles Boswell.

The senator said he received no pledges of support at a dinner Sunday night with Bay, Boswell, Sheriff Robert A. O'Neal and Deputy Prosecutor Patrick J. Barton. Kennedy said he wants a yes support program to equal 90 per cent of parity, probably through "some sort of production payment."

Speaking to the United Negro College Fund meeting, Kennedy said the U. S. is facing "a bigger danger by failing to aid groups of friendly and neutral nations."

"The vast majority of these people are colored, poor, and in need of economic development," he said, "and so far we have been failing them."

Kennedy warned that the nations of Asia, Africa and South America are looking for leadership. It is not enough to talk grandly of agnizing reappraisal, and the tactics as similar to those which helped put Willie over. Campaign Like Willkie's Working For Rockefeller

Business, Professional Men, Amateur Politicians Enlisted

WASHINGTON (AP)—The same old campaign that landed the 1940 Republican presidential nomination for Wendell L. Willkie apparently is under way for Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York.

Responsible Republicans brought to last week's meeting of the GOP National Committee here reports that supporters of Rockefeller are seeking to enlist businessmen, professional men and other amateurs as Rockefeller backers.

A GOP national committeeman who has participated in several presidential campaigns described the tactics as similar to those which helped put Willie over. Connie Completes Her Testimony In Teel Murder Case

State Winds Up Cross-Examination After Only 16 Minutes

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Connie Nicholas completed her murder trial testimony today, telling the jury her playboy lover was killed as she drew her small revolver to shoot herself.

After the state wound up its cross-examination in only 16 minutes, the defense attorney Charles W. Symmes got the 45-year-old divorcee to pin her story in court. She said she made with her gun in Forrest Teel's white Cadillac.

"I want my life," she replied. "I told him I wouldn't be around to bother him any more. I wanted to scare him—the fact that I was going to kill myself."

"Were you afraid of further beating?" Symmes asked. "I was afraid because he had struck me and had thrown me across the seat of the car."

Deputy Prosecutor Francis E. Thomson asked for one last question on cross-examination: "Was this the first time he had beaten you?"

Mrs. Nicholas was followed on the stand by Dr. Charles Bonsett, a neurologist who testified her nervous breakdown was caused by physical violence.

Shown a picture of the pretty divorcee sprawled across the front seat of her car after she had taken a sleeping pill, the doctor said: "I don't think the injuries to her back and neck would have been caused by this."

Thomson read a report issued by Dr. Bonsett Aug. 6, a week after the shooting, which said the divorcee's injuries probably were caused by pressure and unconsciousness.

No Resignation So Far; Decision On His Future Role Hedged Up

Dulles Looks Haggard, Gaunt

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower conferred for 45 minutes today with all State Department officials. They put off any decision as to Dulles' future official role pending "additional medical observation and treatment."

No resignation has been submitted, the White House said. Eisenhower flew in from Augusta, Ga., this morning and drove immediately to Walter Reed Army Hospital to see the secretary.

Afterwards, White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty made the following statements: "The President met this morning at Walter Reed Hospital with the secretary of state. They discussed the secretary's physical condition. They also discussed matters relating to world affairs."

"The secretary of state has returned to Walter Reed for additional medical observation and treatment. "He is expected to remain at the hospital for some days."

"Pending additional medical evaluation there will be no further statement from the President at this time."

Dulles broke off a recuperative period in Florida to return Sunday to the hospital where he previously has had a month and a half undergoing radiation and other treatment for a recurrent abdominal cancer.

At the time Dulles went to Florida, there was no indication that he would return to the hospital for additional treatment. Hagerty told reporters he did not know the nature of this new treatment or whether surgery or radiation would be involved.

He said those are medical questions to be answered by the doctors. Hagerty was asked whether he could say if Dulles had submitted a resignation.

"Yes, I can say that," Hagerty replied. "I can say there has been no resignation. I think this statement bears that out."

He declined to say whether Dulles at any time since his illness had turned in a resignation. Eisenhower and Dulles talked for an hour after the President's return to the White House.

Afterward, in a maroon dressing gown, Dulles walked down the stairs with Eisenhower by the elevator. The two shook hands there, and said goodbye.

At the time of the conference some of those in Washington closest to Dulles were asked.

Allen W. Dulles, head of the Central Intelligence Agency and brother of the secretary of state, arrived at Walter Reed five minutes after the President's return.

Already with Dulles were his State Department aide, Joseph N. Greene, and his secretary, Phyllis Berman. They had gone to the hospital earlier in the morning.

Among other things, they brought with them an elevator. The time of the conference was some of those in Washington closest to Dulles were asked.

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Charge French Army With Torturing, Executing Moslems

PARIS (AP)—France's Armed Forces Ministry says it is investigating new charges by five Roman Catholic chaplains that the French army is torturing and summarily executing Moslems in Algeria.

The priests, reservists recalled to duty with the French army, wrote their bishop that "the number of prisoners and suspects is too often carried out 'with means that must be called torture.'"

The priests conceded that military authorities in several areas of Algeria had forbidden such practices and that some responsible for such acts were punished. "Nevertheless," the letter added, "such acts are widespread in Algeria."

Army Finds It Costs More To Dress a Woman; It's Those Extras

WASHINGTON (AP)—Just in case anybody has any doubts about it, the Army has proved with elaborate figures that it costs more to clothe a woman than a man.

The current initial allowance for an enlisted man totals \$168.20. For an enlisted woman, the figure is \$232.36. The figures, which hundreds of others, given by House Appropriations subcommittee in testimony made public today.

It's the little extras that count. There's not a thing issued to a GI, for example, that's equivalent to the long blond leather handbag the taxpayers provide for Wacs. At \$8 each.

True, the girls don't get some boots, (two pairs to a man), \$13.40 total. But neither do the men get pumps (\$12). Aside from these items, each Wac gets other pairs of shoes, each GI one. Last these get muddy, the Army provides over shoes for women only.

It must be noted the girls' rations don't cost a cent more than the men's wool socks—40 cents a pair.

The Army budgets \$5.45 for what it starkly describes as "drawers, men's, thigh length, cotton, white, 6 each" and "length sleeve undershirt, men's, cotton, quarter length." On the distasteful side, there's a single item with no elaboration: undergarments \$30.
