



Sen. Capehart Tells Newsmen Of Censure Move

Capehart Suggestion

Censure Of Morse Lacking Support

WASHINGTON (U)—The possibility appeared remote today of any Senate censure of Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) for his actions in the controversy that led Clare Boothe Luce to quit as ambassador to Brazil.

Republican leaders indicated privately they want no part of a proposal by Sen. Homer Capehart (R-Ind.) that the Senate officially reprimand Morse for ignoring Mrs. Luce's physician whether she had received psychiatric treatment.

Influential Democrats laughed off the Capehart suggestion as just another attempt to rekindle the feud between the Indiana Republican and the Oregon Democrat.

Morse said he would welcome a censure attempt by Capehart. He said he was in Portland, Ore., reported Morse said in a telephone call.

OLD TRICK
"This is an old favorite trick for Homer. He's perfectly free to offer such a resolution, and I'm perfectly willing to let the Senate be the jury, which under the rules they would be. I would welcome him trying it."

Capehart said a news conference Friday he believed Morse acted with "the height of irresponsibility" in calling Dr. Michael Rosenblatt of New York to ask about treatments directed for his patient.

Morse has contended he sought to reach Dr. Rosenblatt's father, in the belief that the elder doctor was no longer Mrs. Luce's physician. He got the younger doctor, who informed him his father had died.

Thriftly Gent Did Well In Stocks Field

DETROIT (AP)—George Alfred Smith, a thrifty gentleman's gentleman, settled his case with the U.S. government Friday and a lot of folks who heard his testimony wished they had bought American Telephone and Telegraph Co. stock in 1924 when salesmen peddled it from door to door.

"Nobody ever gave me a tip," said Smith whose employees included the financier J. Pierpont Morgan. "They'd say, though, George, do you have any shares of such and such a stock."

Smith, 71, entered a plea of no contest before federal Judge Clifford O'Sullivan and was fined \$6,500 for not paying enough income tax for 1952. Four other income tax charges against him were dismissed after he paid \$18,489 in back taxes and penalties.

Smith, a Butler for Western Securities, a Detroit financier, makes about \$100 a year in salary.

When a bystander estimated he must have realized \$200,000 in the last 10 years on the stock market, Smith replied coolly: "Born in Britain, Smith came to the United States in 1920. From his modest savings he began to invest."

Polio Victim Aboard Ship?

NOYFOLK, Va. (U)—The Coast Guard today plans to remove a polio victim, said to be a child, from a ship from the Maine Lakes cruise ship Santa Paula.

The vessel radiomed early today one of its passengers was ill and was changing course for Norfolk. The Coast Guard said the ship's doctors believed the passenger had polio. The ship was en route from New York to the Netherlands West Indies.

Identity of the stricken passenger was not immediately known. The Coast Guard said it knew only the victim was a U. S. citizen.

Coast Guard officials said they would either bring the patient to the U. S. Public Health Service Hospital here by surface craft or by helicopter. The removal would probably take place in mid-afternoon, the Coast Guard said.

At latest report the Santa Paula was 100 miles off Norfolk in the Atlantic.

The Coast Guard said it had no immediate information on possible quarantine of crew or passengers of the vessel when she makes port.

The number of passengers on board was not available immediately.

Herter Back With Paris Agreements

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of State Christian Herter flew in from Western strategy talks at Paris today and said he will report to President Eisenhower at Gettysburg this morning.

Herter called his talks with the foreign ministers of Britain, France and West Germany "very successful" in laying out the Western position for negotiating with Russia at Geneva on German problems.

"Both in spirit and in substance," he said, "we reached complete agreement on a highly important Western position. This should assist us greatly in making progress at Geneva. If the Soviet Union demonstrates an honest desire to negotiate."

Herter's plane landed at Washington airport at 7 a. m. EST. He told newsmen he was going from the airport to the White House where he would board a helicopter for the brief flight to Gettysburg. The President is spending the weekend at his farm there.

FULL AGREEMENT

Herter was asked whether the "complete agreement" he reported at Paris was reached because the Western foreign ministers made no attempt to settle many details.

"We settled every detail that came up," Herter said.

Asked whether he was optimistic that the Paris talks would lead to an agreement with the Russians at the Geneva foreign ministers meeting which will open May 11, Herter replied:

"I know what frame of mind the other fellow was in. I could answer that better."

Herter was met by Under Secretary of State Douglas Dillon, Deputy Under Secretary Robert Murphy and Deputy Under Secretary Loy Henderson — his chief officials in the State Department organization. He said he plans to confer with former secretary of state John Foster Dulles during the weekend. Dulles is a Walter Reed Army Hospital suffering from cancer.

REPORT TUESDAY

Herter also is scheduled to report Tuesday to a closed-door session of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Thursday evening he will tell the nation by radio and television about Western plans and prospects for the Geneva Big Four foreign ministers meeting which will open May 11 and continue for possibly a month or more.

The impression among Washington officials was the Herter had done a good job in his first international conference as secretary of state. He met with the foreign ministers of Britain, France and West Germany in Paris Wednesday and Thursday.

FLY TO GENEVA

At the end of next week Herter will fly to the Geneva meeting. This conference is due to cover the whole range of outstanding German problems, including the Soviet's demand for withdrawal of Western occupation forces from West Berlin.

The Western foreign ministers reached full agreement at Paris in their opening position in the negotiations with the Soviets.

Bloodless Surrender Ends Panama War



Crowd Demonstrates At Brazilian Embassy

PANAMA (U)—About 80 discouraged Cubans who feared Panama with an invasion were lodged today in the same jail that recently held British famed ballerina, Dame Margot Fonteyn. After questioning, they probably will be deported.

The Cubans, who meekly surrendered their arms without firing a shot, were brought to Panama City in eight heavily guarded buses late yesterday from their invasion beachhead at Nombre de Dios as an unruly crowd demonstrated around the Brazilian Embassy here.

The crowd was demanding that the embassy hand over Roberto Arias, Dame Margot's prominent Panamanian husband. He has been accused by the government of attempting to start a rebellion with the aid of the Cubans.

Arias, a political foe of President Eusebio de la Guardia, has taken refuge in the embassy. Dame Margot was arrested April 20 and held 24 hours for questioning about her husband's suspected revolutionary activities.

MUCH NOISE

The unruly crowd around the embassy shot off fireworks, shouted, honked automobile horns and set up floodlights. But armed police surrounded the embassy and no disorders developed.

By contrast a crowd of several hundred silently watched the Cuban captives as they entered Panama's jail.

The government said 87, including one woman, surrendered at Nombre de Dios, a Caribbean coastal village without a road link to the outside world.

Correspondents and observers, flown to the village by helicopter, watched the surrender that had been arranged by a five-man mission of the Organization of American States (OAS).

The unshaven Cubans, slacked their arms in the old postoffice and marched around a landing craft while singing the songs of Fidel Castro's Cuban revolution. The townspeople, many of whom had welcomed the invaders, stood along the streets lined with cacti and banana trees and tropical flowers. Some of the girls just inside the door. Rogers was arrested Friday shortly after the brutal attack on Mrs. Lumley Guillory, 36, in her husband's general store at Red Bank, 30 miles south of Alexandria, Dist. Ariz. L. O. Frazier said he planned to charge the man with rape and murder as soon as the Evangeline Parish grand jury could be called into session. He indicated the session might come Monday.

HOME ASSAULT

Dr. Frank Savoy Sr., Evangeline Parish coroner, said the assailant beat Mrs. Guillory, stabbed her in the chest, strangled her and sexually assaulted her while her husband was away driving a school bus. Her young daughter was sleeping in another room at the time.

State police arrested Rogers in a taxicab as he headed for the parish prison.

He was at first put in the 30-year-old jail at Ville Platte, then hustled under heavy armed guard to the parish prison at Alexandria to disclose.

Officers at the prison later said Rogers was questioned, then taken to a halfway which they refused to disclose.

Savoy said Rogers would not live through the day if he had remained at Ville Platte, west of the south-central Louisiana parish.

Rebellious activity apparently was partly spurred by the kidnapping last Saturday of Mack Charles Parker from the jail at Poplarville, Miss. A band of 8 or 10 hooded and masked men dragged Parker, a Negro, out of his cell the weekend before his trial on charges of raping a young white mother. His abduction is still on the minds of the police.

A neighbor to the Guillory family reported seeing the 200-pound 6 foot 2 Rogers enter the little store shortly before Mrs. Guillory was slain.

Officers said Rogers hunched to his mother's home in Ville Platte with \$600 taken from the store safe, later bought a new suit and clothing and a set of diamond rings in Opelousas, and then headed for his girl friend's home at Melville.

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
