RALEIGH — Cousin Wayland Spruill of Berrie is grading the boys on their speechmaking.

Rep. Bradford Powell, Rockingham—98½
Rep. Sam Burrows, Randolph—94

Spruill, no slouch as an orator, gives his reasons for the grades as follows:

"Snett began to wax eloquent, he had a little data there before him and was right well prepared so I gave him 96 for effort — Of course, I didn't agree with a word he said."
Then came "the next dude," Uzzell, who "got a little tetchy vicious" and had to be graded down.

Kemp, on the other hand "stepped on the puppy's tail and starved the cat to death."

Sen. Humphrey Seeks U. S. Seven-Year Plan For Peace

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.) proposed today that the United States immediately launch a "grand design for peace—a seven year plan for our own."

One goal would be to free technical and economic aid to free peoples to cost at least 14 billion dollars, or 2 billions a year for 7 years.

The need was laid for decades, Humphrey said.

Other goals, he said, would be winning a just and durable peace and realization of dignity, well-being, and equality of rights for every American.

Humphrey, in a keynote speech prepared for the 12th annual convention of the Americans for Democratic Action, said the Soviets had put this country on notice with a seven-year plan in communism's competition with capitalism.

"We have laughed off five-year plans and seven-year plans in the past—and to our sorrow," he said. "We will laugh off this one."

SEEK GOALS

"I propose that we set the goals which are the price of survival and that we set ourselves to meet them," said Humphrey, an ADA vice chairman and possible

contender for the 1960 Democratic presidential nomination.

ADA describes itself an independent, organization of political liberals with a membership of 44,000 in 38 states.

I do not propose that we imitate the Soviet Union, either its goals or its methods," Humphrey said.

I propose that as they have set their goals for the triumph of communism, we set our goals for the preservation of peace and security and for the extension of human freedom and individual welfare everywhere on earth.

They have set authoritarian priorities by dictate. We must set our goals by consent through democratic processes. We must demonstrate the superiority of the methods as well as the goals of freedom and democracy."

Humphrey said that Soviet Russia is growing stronger—and therefore bolder. He said there is abundant evidence of what he termed the "solid and substantial performance and plans of the Soviet economy and the Soviet military."

In spite of the President's denials, the Commerce Department's business advisory council here

Jobless Total Under 4 Million

HOT SPRINGS, Va. (AP)—Government officials today reported a striking improvement in the nation's employment picture, with the jobless total dropping well below the four million mark.

It was indicated that unemployment may have declined by as much as half a million in April while employment registered a growth of 200,000.

This advance word on the monthly job report, due to be issued Monday by the Commerce and Labor Departments, was obtained privately from officials attending the spring meeting of the Commerce Department's business advisory council here.

Gromyko's Optimistic At Geneva

GENEVA (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko arrived today for next week's Big Four foreign ministers meeting and declared "we shall make every effort for this conference to be crowned with success."

Gromyko, first of the foreign ministers to reach Geneva for Monday's conference opening, was greeted by a big turnout of Soviet blue diplomats.

Stepping from a gleaming white limousine at the head of a 12-man delegation, Gromyko repeated Soviet assertions that the most urgent problems for the conference are a peace treaty with Germany and liquidation of the Allied occupation in Berlin.

It is for a positive solution of these important questions that the Soviet delegation has arrived here," he said. "Our intentions are serious. We shall make every effort for this conference to be crowned with success."

"The Soviet government is confident that at present there exist the necessary conditions to prevent war and insure a lasting peace."

The Communists appeared in a confident mood, and Western diplomatic sources were rather pessimistic. Western sources cautioned against raising high hopes for success of the conference.

They pointed to prospects of contention at the outset on such routine matters as agenda and procedure.

HERTZ STOPPED

Death Of Quarles Confuses Outlook

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower's choice of a successor for Deputy Secretary of Defense Donald A. Quarles will be closely scrutinized by Democrats in Congress.

Quarles, 64, died unexpectedly Friday in his sleep.

The former communications industry official had been mentioned prominently as a possible replacement for Secretary of Defense Neil McElroy, who had told Eisenhower he wanted to leave his Pentagon post late this year.

Some of the congressional Democrats had looked on Quarles as one of the administration officials who had resisted their demands for more spending to close the missile gap with the Soviets.

Highway Patrol Quits Strike-Battered Town

HENDERSON (AP)—A Greensboro National Guard unit was poised today to move into this strike-torn city in the event of new violence around Harriet-Henderson cotton mills.

Highway patrolmen, some of whom have been here since the middle of February, pulled out today to return to their duties as traffic watchmen on Tar Heel highways.

In announcing their withdrawal from the strike scene, Gov. Hodges said Friday that any new strike-connected flareups around Harriet-Henderson cotton mills would be met by the immediate call of National Guard units.

Adj. Gen. Capus Wayne said the state's only military police unit, a 71-man detachment in Greensboro, has been placed on a standby alert.

The unit's assistant provost marshal, Capt. James Pimm, reported the detachment could be on the way to Henderson within two hours after being notified to move.

2-WEEK ALERT

WAYNICK said the Greensboro unit and others have been on the standby alert for about two weeks. He declined to mention the other units.

Hodges decided to withdraw the patrol contingent, which numbered between 150 and 200 since the strike scene.

It was quiet Friday when the plants closed for the weekend. Police reported no disturbances during the night changes.

Hodges told his news conference Henderson and Vance County officials informed him about 35 local law enforcement officers are available. "This should be an adequate number of officers to maintain law and order under existing circumstances."

This marked the second time the patrol was pulled from Henderson. The troopers left in mid-April when the mills and the Textile Workers Union of America appeared to have reached an agreement.

However, when the pact fell apart and rifle bullets began whizzing around the plant areas, the patrol speeded back.

Hodges said he was notifying union officials that he would use guardmen if it again becomes necessary for the state to step in to maintain order.

He said he would "emphasize to them that the state expects every person in Vance County whether a striker or not of the picket line, or a worker going to work, to be a law-abiding citizen."

The union and the company in the midst of an apparently hopeless deadlock over job rights of non-strikers have been at odds since last Nov. 17.

Violence has flared sporadically.
