THE SONOMA RANCH.

All the mining veins and nearly all the agricultural valleys of Northern Nevada are hidden from the gaze of travelers over the Central Pacific Railroad. In crossing the State of Nevada on the cars, the Big Meadows at Lovelock, about the only agricultural community to be seen, and the Winnemucca Reclamation Works, is the only quick and observable. The mines are situated in the mountains away from the road, and the agricultural valleys, with one or two exceptions, are screened by hills. In passing over the sage-covered sandhills west of Winnemucca, passengers would scarcely believe that a few miles south of the road, in what is known as Grass Valley, one of the finest ranches in this or any other country is situated, and which is being cultivated.

THE SONOMA RANCH.

Two years ago it was purchased by its present owner, John Guthrie, of Frank Slav, who held possessory title to some of the land in Nevada, and cultivated a few acres of land in the valley. Then there was nothing to distinguish it from the surrounding country, except that the trees were more numerous and the springs. Now, it is a veritable paradise. Trees are growing everywhere, some of them a foot in diameter, though not more than six inches high. The principal popular—Carolina and Lombardy—though locust, elm, maple, box-border and the prospect for a beautiful orchard. Fifteen acres of land were enclosed in an orchard, containing 1,700 fruit trees, such as apple, pear, peach, plum, cherry, apricot and quince. Notwithstanding the backwardness and severity of the season, nearly all of these trees are covered with young fruit. The yearling and consequently will bear more fruit.

VENOR'S PROGNOSTICATIONS

for the Summer and Fall. Henry G. Venor, the Canadian weather prophet, in forecasting the weather of the coming season writes as follows:

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for the Summer and Fall. First—A season that will merit the designation of cool, to cold and wet, generally. Not that there will not be a few hot days, but that the general character of the season will be such that the heat for periods, but rather, these last will appear in the retrospect as of comparative insignificance, or as a mere relief to the general coolness. Second—The season will be marked by not only great precipitation, but by a mugginess of atmosphere, generally caused by the resting condition of the earth and the long continuance of cloudy and the long continuance of cloudy sky. This will result in periods of heavy drizzle and heavy weather during the summer months. Third—The season will be the reverse of clear and dry.
