Duvalier Rallies Terrorists

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti — Mass arrests of suspected anti-government insurgents Tuesday by President Francois Duvalier in the wake of an invasion of exile rebels aimed at overthrowing the

regime of the Haitian dictator.

"There are many arrests being made in the open with no attempt to conceal them," commented a diplomatic observer in Port au Prince, capital of the Negro republic.

He said that government troops have thrown up a

roadblock between the capital and Cap-Haitien, on the north coast of Haiti near the Dominican Republic border where the invaders struck early Monday.

"People here in Port au Prince are excited — but wary," the diplomat said. "They apparently are waiting to see how things develop."

A flurry of military activity also is going on in the capital, including flights of the Haitian air force planes headed north toward the invasion site.

Duvalier, facing a serious threat to his six-year reign, has mobilized his 5,000-man army and his feared Tontons Macoute, a fiercely loyal

cadre of terrorists and spies whose numbers are estimated as high as 20,000.

Thus far, it is difficult to determine the size and significance of the landing but it appears it is big enough to require an extensive military effort by the government.

Leading the attack force is

Gen. Leon Cantave, former Haitian army chief of staff who broke with Duvalier.

It is believed that the invasion may have been launched from the Dominican Republic, which shares the island of Hispaniola with Haiti.

FBI Eyes Phone Sabotage

TAMPA — (UPI) — The FBI moved in Tuesday to investigate a brazen act of sabotage in the locked basement cable vault of the guarded General Telephone Company main office building at Lakeland Monday night.

General Telephone officials said Tuesday that the cutting of seven cables, including one long distance cable owned by Southern Bell, was done by someone who knew the building and who knew his way around.

The FBI moved into the case because Federal Aviation Agency lines between Grand Field in Lakeland and Tampa International Airport were severed.

The cable cutting left 90 per cent of downtown Lakeland without telephone service, but did not affect the police department or hospital.

The company said it had not been determined if the person, or persons, had a duplicate key to the vault door, or if it had been jimmied. The door had not been forced.

Company officials said no decision had been made on whether to increase the number of guards on company property. There were two guards on duty at the Lakeland site at the time of the sabotage.

"There are not enough guards in Florida to cover all of our property," a company spokesman said.

The Lakeland incident was the largest and most damaging to be reported in the six counties during the night. Additional cable cuttings were reported in all counties.

Robert Mount, president of striking Local 284, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, AFL-CIO, said that the union refuses to accept the blame for the widespread acts of sabotage in the 27-day-old strike.

The union refuses to accept the blame for the acts of individuals who may be aggravated against General Telephone Company and there is, of course, a possibility of almost anyone being involved," Mount said.

Dick Buckingham, public relations director for the company, said repair crews had made good progress at restoring service, particularly in the Tampa area. Six to 26,000 telephones remain out in Tampa, compared with 45,000 Monday. System-wide, 46,000 telephones were out compared with 52,000 Monday.

Bid to Keep Perez In U.S. Rejected

A federal judge Tuesday turned down the plea of a young Miami woman that she would have confined ex-Venezuelan President Marcos Perez Jimenez to this country and tied up his assets.

Lona Marita Lorenz, 26, lost the initial round in her battle to force the one-time dictator into keeping an alleged oral contract to support her and her daughter as he would his own wife and family.

Judge Charles E. Fulton, after hearing an hour's argument, said he was "not satisfied" that the complaint "is legally sufficient to justify this order for temporary relief."

Miss Lorenz, a slim red-dish-blond who appeared in a demure high-necked green dress, is suing to prevent the U.S. from extraditing Perez Jimenez.

She wanted him held here,

she said, and his reputedly huge assets frozen until she can bring suit to force Perez Jimenez at least to meet the terms of a promised \$600 a month trust agreement.

Miss Lorenz said Perez Jimenez talked her into signing the agreement, but refused to sign it himself.

"I am of the opinion," Judge Fulton said, "that it does not clearly appear from the specific facts that immediate and irreparable damage, injury or loss, would be sustained by this woman if this relief is not granted."

In her complaint, Miss Lorenz said the former dictator has set her up in an apartment with a \$100 allowance, and this proves his intention to care for her.

Perez Jimenez himself is in Dade County jail awaiting a decision by Secretary of State Dean Rusk as to whether he will be extradited to Venezuela to face embezzlement charges.

Rusk's decision is due before Aug. 17.

Inlanders Seeking To Bisect Country

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic — (AP) — Invading Haitian rebels seeking to topple the government of Dictator Francois Duvalier have massed in front of Cap-Haitien, Haiti's second city, a rebel spokesman said Tuesday.

There had been previous unconfirmed rumors here that Cap-Haitien had fallen to the invaders.

In the first news from the front to reach Santo Domingo, Paul Verna, the rebel spokesman, said the ranks of the 500 invaders who landed Monday at Fort Liberté on the north coast of Haiti, have been swelled by regular army deserters.

Verna said the rebel columns bypassed Cap-Haitien, the northern port city of 25,000 which is 90 miles north of the capital, Port au Prince.

The plain faces the Citadel, a fort built at the beginning of the 19th century by King Henri Christophe, who then ruled North Haiti.

About 32 Americans on a plantation in the area did not appear to be affected, a U.S. State Department official said in Washington.

Verna said the rebel strategy now is to isolate North Haiti.

Haitian government charges that the invaders came from the adjoining Dominican Republic were aired by the Council of the Organization of American States at an emergency meeting in Washington, called on the plea of Fern D. Rapin, Haiti's OAS representative.

The Dominican Republic has insisted that it has barred the use of Dominican soil for bases of the political foes of Duvalier. But Rene Chalmers, Haiti's foreign minister, sent a message to the OAS charging that the exile invaders "departed from the Dominican Republic."

He said the OAS must deal with a situation "that could affect the hemisphere's security."

Chalmers' message said it was established that the troops, headed by ex-Gen. Leon Cantave and aided by former officers of the Haitian army, had attacked the border town of Humananville.

He put the invasion number at about 300.

Verna, who said the original force numbered 500, said the men, well-armed and trained for guerrilla fighting, used an unidentified island off the coast as a staging area for the invasion.

Cantave, their leader, is a tall, lanky, white-haired Negro who has been in political exile for six years. He lived in LeMorne, the Congo and New York City during his exile. Mrs. Verna was slightly injured by Cantave in New York now.

Murphy said he telephoned the sisters' manager, Murray Kane, in Hollywood.

The sisters are headquartered in New York. "I understand that the sisters will not work for a couple of months," said Murphy.

Senate OKs Military Pay Boost

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate Tuesday overwhelmingly passed and sent to the House a bill for a hefty pay boost for most of the persons now serving in the nation's fighting forces.

On the roll call there were 84 votes for the bill and none against.

Only recruits and lowest ranking privates and apprentice seamen with less than two years service would fail to benefit from the first general military pay boost since 1958.

Reservists, National Guardsmen and those already drawing military retirement would share in the increases which are estimated to cost taxpayers \$1,238,536,000 additional annually.

Sen. Howard W. Cannon (D., Nev.), floor manager for the complex measure, said it is designed to make military careers more attractive to the skilled and younger officers, both commissioned and non-commissioned, among more than 2.6 million on active duty with the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines.

He said that for officers with less than two years service, a lieutenant would get a raise of \$20 a month, a first lieutenant \$30, a captain \$40 and a major \$50 a month.

For officers with more than two years service, he said, the increases would average 24 per cent for a first lieutenant, 22 per cent for a captain, 18 per cent for a major, 14.5 per cent for a lieutenant colonel, 10 per cent for a colonel and five per cent for general officers.

For enlisted men, Cannon said, the raises would range from a minimum of \$5 a month for E-4 grade to \$120 for E-9 (sergeant major), 10 per cent pay would go up to \$560 a month.

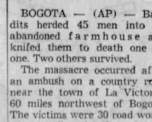
