

Frost Says K Thinks We Wouldn't Fight

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. —(UPI)—It was about as unlikely a meeting as you could imagine.

On one side was a hard of hearing, white-haired poet. Across the way was a stern dictator.

Topics of discussion: poetry and people; freedom and Communism; war and peace.

Participants: Robert Lee Frost, unofficial poet laureate of the United States, and Nikita Khrushchev, Soviet premier.

That was the picture drawn by the 89-year-old Frost on his return home yesterday from a 10-day visit to Russia—a visit he called "the time of my life."

Frost, winner of four Pulitzer prizes for his verse, sounded a note of warning.

Khrushchev believes the United States will not fight to protect itself.

Frost said the Soviet leader "thinks we will sit on one hand and then the other."

"He said he feared for us because of our lot of liberals. He thought that we're too liberal to fight," the poet said.

But Frost said he did not tell Khrushchev the last word. "I said to them that you could tell from their poetry that they were humanizing a little down from the severity of their ideal—easing off toward democracy. They let me get away with it," he chuckled.

I am not a Communist and I feel quite hard to strain up to Socialism. I go slow about it. I drug my feet. But I have about decided that Socialism is the only way to handle the billions being born now," Frost said yesterday in New York.

I see that ahead, but I'll be dead by then. I told the Russians that they're easing down to Socialism and we're straining up to it."

Frost said Khrushchev gave him a message for President Kennedy, but declined to elaborate. As to whether planned to visit Kennedy, the poet said, "I don't plan. I wait for the President."

Frost has only one word of regret—that he referred to Khrushchev in a Moscow news conference as a ruffian.

All Guild productions are presented at the Playhouse, 3001 19th St.

Hartke Stands Firm Against War on Cuba

WASHINGTON—Senator Vance Hartke (D-Ind.) reaffirmed his own position against war with Cuba when asked about the stand of his senior colleague, Senator Homer Capehart (R-Ind.), on the TV program "Opinion in the Capital" broadcast here and in New York last night.

Reached at his apartment here before he left for his Indiana campaigning today, Capehart declared that "even President Kennedy shares my viewpoint about the Cuban crisis now, or why would he want the congressional approval of calling the reserves?"

"With all due deference to my colleague from my home state, Hartke replied to the TV question, 'the responsible Republican, as well as the responsible Democrat, have repudiated the stand which means that we should go to war at this time.'

Hartke said he doesn't favor a blockade because "we might as well declare war on Cuba as to have a blockade."

He explained on the TV program that a blockade under international law is an act of war. "There isn't any question about U. S. ability to go in and take Cuba by force," Hartke continued.

"But you know if Americanism means anything at all, it means that we are not advocates of the use of force in order to put our way of life upon somebody else. If the least that we can offer to people is a stronger military might than the Russians, this is a sorrowful thing."

The proposal of President Kennedy and Secretary of State Rusk to bring the Latin American countries together is a better idea, he asserted.

It doesn't represent a change in administration policy but a continued process of bringing people in Latin America closer to the United States in this thing with Castro," he concluded.
