

Ground to Be Broken Friday

A turn of a spade will signal the start of construction next Friday of a \$210,000 wing for Our Lady of Grace Convent in Beech Grove. Ground-breaking ceremonies will be at 11:30 a.m.

The four-story building will house 72 women during their five years of religious and academic training to become Sisters of St. Benedict. The present building houses 31 nuns.

The Most Rev. Paul C. Schulte, archbishop of Indianapolis, will preside at the program.

The convent adjoins Our Lady of Grace Academy, a school for high school girls. There are 129 Benedictine Sisters who teach in 16 elementary and two high schools in the Archdiocese of Indianapolis. There are an additional 16 young women in training at the convent.

The new wing, designed by Charles Brown, will be added to the northwest side of the convent and is expected to be completed by next spring.

Rebels Take Over Yemen

LONDON (UPI)—The Army rebels who killed the Imam of Yemen announced formation of a new government today as Prince Seif al Islam al Hasan flew home from New York in an attempt to regain the throne.

The title Imam, meaning priest, is used for Yemen's king.

The rebels proclaimed the new government of the republic of Yemen in a broadcast over Sanaa radio. The revolutionary "supreme command" said the new regime would be dedicated to furthering Arab ties, establishing diplomatic relations with all countries "which honor our freedom and independence," and would accept foreign aid if it came without strings.

Governor MATTHEW WELSH said today at Auburn that he's perplexed at how inconsistent Republicans can get.

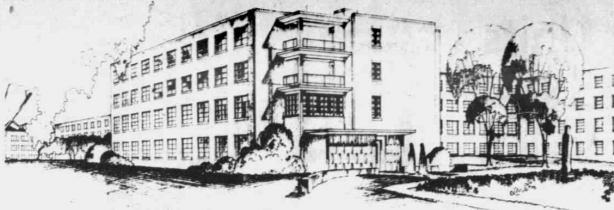

Capehart, Bayh said, is playing politics with the Cuban situation.

Conviction Too Late, Says Percy

"The citizens of Marion County want to know why the prosecutor's office and the Criminal Court judges have waited so long to get that first conviction," Percy said. "Is it because they don't operate efficiently or is it because they are playing politics?"

"It seems a bit strange that the Democrats wait until just before an election to get their first habitual criminal conviction, while all the time the crime rate has continued to rise until it is out of hand," he said.

Falling Plank Severs Navy Captain's Arm

NEW YORK (UPI)—Navy Capt. Robert Selmer, 40, of Falls Church, Va., suffered the loss of his right arm yesterday when he was struck by an 8-foot plank which fell from a 27-story building under construction in midtown Manhattan.

Police said Selmer and two other men were walking along 47th Street when the plank and other debris were blown from the building by high winds. The Navy officer's arm was severed in the accident, authorities said.
